production of Cotton Yarn and Manufacture of cloth

During May, 1972, Mills in Bombay City produced a total of 1,49,22,000 of yarn, 1,70,000 kgs. of Miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery and knitted fabrics and packed 42,36,000 metres of cotton goods mixed silk, wool, terenc, etc. and packed 10,00,61,000 metres wearable and non-wearable cloth and those in rest of Maharashtra produced 44,08,000 kgs. of yarn 1,01,000 kgs. of miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery and knitted abrics and packed 2,31,38,000 metres of wearable and non-wearable cloth. The total production of cotton yarn, miscellaneous goods and mixed with silk, wool, terenc, etc. packing of wearable and non-wearable cloth for the whole State of Maharashtra amounted to 1,93,30,000 kgs., 2,71,000 kgs., 43,81,000 metres and 1,23,199 metres respectively.

Shri Giri Lauds Voluntary Arbitration

The President Shri V. V. Giri, on November 6, described compulsory judication as "enemy Number One" of the working class. It not only roll workers of their initiative to try for a settlement by themselves, but a involved them in a costly dose of litigation.

Inaugurating a conference of the Indian Society of Labour Economics Shri Giri suggested that as far as possible industrial disputes should be entat the plant level itself. He wanted the Government to assist in establishing various industries a panel of conciliators from among whom both the work and the employers could choose a conciliator or a board of conciliation.

Shri Giri said the concililators should be entrusted with the task of brings about greater area of agreement to explore the possibilities of solving disputations the contending parties.

As an additional measure to solve the differences or disputes between the employers and workers, he wanted tripartite and bipartite machinery of the Indian Labour Conference to play their part by converting themselves in permanent machinery at the State and all-India level instead of merely benefit and hoc bodies.

If, for any reason there remained some points still to be settled, he suggested voluntary arbitration.

Finally if the different processes did not produce a settlement of the dispute "the parties should be left free to resort to direct action," he felt.

I am happy to be here on this occasion of inauguration of the Second Asian Conference on 'Trade Union Education', being organised by the Asian Trade Union College on its 20th Foundation Day. I am glad that it is being held in India and that a large number of leading trade unionists and educators from different Asian countries are participating in this five-day Conference.

I am sure your deliberations will be of vital importance in influencing economic and social perspectives and priorities in the developing countries of Asia.

The Third World to which we belong, is in a process of metamorphosis. It has become imperative that either we have faster rate of development of

prepared to face economic stagnation, poverty for millions and social pulitical upheavals. India today shares the same ideals and aspirations as other developing nations of Asia.

lice, it was believed that economic development depended mainly on investments. It has now been recognised that beyond the physical sthere are certain basic factors which contribute substantially to growth these is the education of workers.

my mind, the workers' education meets to a great extent the social and minimic challenges inherent in the present day conditions. This education is only a functional concept considered merely as an instrument or economic depment. A worker needs to be educated in order to promote in him greater areness of the social and economic responsibilities and his own contribution these spheres.

tore than half of the World population and a major portion of the labour is in Asia. As leaders of these workers, your responsibilities are heavy unions have acquired great significance in developing countries and the most productive and vocal sections of the society; their activities effect toly industrial matters, but the whole gamut of society. Passing through the phases and growing steadily through many challenges, the trade union wement in Asia today has acquired wide social acceptability and international three increasingly it is accepted as an assential part of the industrial and anomic administration of the country.

In India, trade union representatives participate and discuss in the Indian labour Conferences, the Standing Labour Committees and Industrial committees and various other tripartite bodies set up by Government. Trade unions are associated with economic issues of importance and they participate in formulating developmental plans and policies that shape control thinking.

With the changing shape of the economy in Asian countries on socialist linesthink, we should try to find out how best the trade unions can help in the process of accelerated economic development while fully safegurding and promoting workers' interests. There is growing realisation that unless trade unions in developing countries also contribute and participate effectively in nation building activities, the trade union movement itself it bound to remain weak. On the other side, strong unions represent a viable instrument to ensure such participation.

In developing countries where all human and other resources are required to be mobilised towards the achievement of different targets of development

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it is also very much true that real development cannot be achieved without structural change in the society and systematic social transformation of The process of structural change and social transformation is a painful process. This becomes much more painful when efforts are required to be made to bring percolation of this growth to the weakest sections of the society. Active constructive cooperation of the trade unions is necessary for any dedicated Government to implement its socialist policy. I hope, the expansion of workers education will not only strengthen the trade unions but it will also make them more productivity conscious.

The trade unions in Asian countries have to develop their own patterns organisation in order to suit their own needs. Here a large majority of the working population live and work in rural areas. Their involvement in the trade union movement is essential. You would, therefore, consider how the rural workers can be organised more systematically and the fruits of continuing education brought to them. Educational programmes for rural workers have to be planned on the basis of in-depth investigation of their needs and aspirations, Urban trade unions may provide educational programmes to workers of rural origin who drift to the cities; in addition they can contribute to the training of rural leaders in trade union methods and techniques.

We in India started a comprehensive programme of Workers' Education in 1958 by setting up a semi-autonomous Board known as Central Board for Workers' Education. Within a period of 14 years, this Board has set up 30 Regional Workers' Education Centres, spread all over the country. Over 15 lakhs workers have been trained through the worker-teachers sponsored by trade unions and trained by the Board. The programme has aimed at the development of trade union leadership from among the rank and file of workers. I understand that quite a number of trainees are now holding responsible positions in their respective unions. While working in the field of workers' education, the Board has kept in view the fact that trade unions themselves must play a leading role in organising educational programmes. The Board assists them by giving grants-in-aid.

We have reached a certain level of self-sufficiency in our programmes and are now set on a massive expansion both in quantity and quality. But in social experiments like this, there is great scope for mutual assistance and sharing of experience with our Asian neighbours which have common social and cultural background and represent similar economic conditions and challenges.

I do not wish to take more of your time and thank you for giving me this opportunity to meet you all. I hope your dicussions will concretise steps in the four areas listed in your agenda and would provide suitable guidelines for the development of workers' education programme in Asian countries.

Minister's plea at Asian TU Education Conference—Raport between Government

Union Labour Minister, Shri R. K. Khadilkar on November 9, advocated port between the Governments and trade unions in Asia in their common removal of poverty through economic development. "We must consty make the necessary mental adujstments so that such a relationship ames a reality" he said.

the Khadilkar was delivering the Validictory Address at the 2nd Asian Trade Union College of the ICFTU,

tracing the root of conflicts between trade unions and Governments in newly emerged Independent nations, Shri Khadilkar said that compulsions of the Government were more wider in their sweep than those operated on the trade unions.

the conscious democratic Government has to do all it can to supplement the linear revolution by an economic one as fast as possible", he said, adding the trade unions are ready to respond with co-operation and underding conflicts may occur".

The Labour Minister exhorted the trade unions to reach out even to the unployed and the under-employed in agriculture and unorganised occupations. Though a process of rethinking has started in Asian trade union circles on the line, Khadilkar pleaded "unless a reorientation took place with speed and time the development efforts, in free societies at least, run the risk of being arrivhelmed and the freedom, not of the trade unions alone, might be in popartly.

Referring to the phenomenon of political leaders occupying position of ladership in the trade union movement, Shri Khadilkar stated that one of the easons for this was "scarcity of leadership material" as in other spheres. In his context, he said leadership development was an accepted objective of workers' education. The Minister did not believe it would be possible to insulate the trade unions from the political process, nor was it desirable. "In a free society there is no reason why the trade union movement should not make use of the political process for achieving its economic objectives." Continuing lessid. "the functional demarcation between the two should not get blurred as it does so often today."

The Conference which opened on November 5, 1972 was inaugurated by the Union Finance Minister, Shri Y. B. Chavan and attended by 26 delegates, 13 faternal delegates, 3 special observers, and 43 observers from 16 Australia, Bangla Desh, Fiji, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Nenal, Shri Lanka and Singapore. The fraternal delegates came from Mauritius,

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Nigeria, Sonegal and Ghana. The International Labour Organisation (It which cooperated in organising this Conference also participated in the deliberations.

Pension Scheme for Non-teaching staff

Retirement benefits like those of pension, gratuity, etc., which are admissible to the Maharashtra Government servants, will be made applicable to the fultime non-teaching staff in recognised and aided non-government secondar schools in the State who retire on or after April 1, 1966 according to a State Government directive.

The scheme will cover the non-teaching staff in non-Government secondar schools including Indian English Middle Schools, middle schools declared a secondary schools, multipurpose higher secondary schools, vocational or technical high schools or higher secondary schools, managed by private bodies and recognised as such for grant-in-aid from Government. It will not cover secondary schools run by Zilla Parishads or other local bodies.

The Government has also advised Municipal Councils and Corporations in the State to extend this scheme to the full-time non-teaching staff in the Government aided secondary schools who have retired or will retire on or after April 1, 1966

The Municipalities adopting the pension scheme from April 1, 1966 have also been advised to give an option to the members of the non-teaching staffing the schools, who were in service on March 31, 1966 and the members of the non-teaching staff who were due to superannuate before April 1, 1966 but who were granted extension in service for a period beyond April 1, 1966, to elect either to continue under the contributory provident fund scheme of the Municipal Councils and Corporations or to come under this scheme.

Members of the non-teaching staff who have retired on or after April 1966 but prior to August 31, 1972, as also those in service on March 31, 1966 and who have not retired on August 31, 1972 have to exercise their option before

Shops Act relaxed

The Government of Maharashtra has suspended certain provisions of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act, 1948 for Diwali festiva! from the period October 25 to November 7.

The suspension is for all the shops.

Accordingly, shops can remain open up to 10-00 p.m. If any employee has to work in excess of the prescribed limit, he is entitled to wages for such overtime work. But the spread-over should not exceed 14 hours a day.

The employee losing prescribed weekly holidays will be given equal number of holidays in exchange and the wages for such work done during holidays,

unfies too to produce crop

industrialists in Thana-Ambernath belt have decided to bring the open in their factory areas under cultivation. Accordingly, about 500 hectares will shortly come under the rabi crops.

decision was taken at a meeting of the industrialists convened by the Zilla Parishad, 2nd October 1972. Shri H. G. Vartak, Minister for venue, presided.

The Zilla Parishad will help the industrialists in their efforts by supplying them fertilizers etc.

per cent ex-gratia payment to Government controlled mills employees,

shri M. Tidke, Minister for Industries, announced on 12th October that the cabinet sub-committee for Textile Industry has decided to pay per cent as ex-gratia payment to the employees of the mills which are either owned by the Government or run under authorised controller or taken loase.

This decision will benefit about 48,000 employees of the mills and an amount Rs. 1.21 crores will be paid to them before Diwali.

The Minister issued the following statement today in this connection:

"The Government of Maharashtra has been giving its earnest thought to the payment of bonus for the year 1971-72 to the employees of the Textile Mills under the control of Government. These mills have incurred losses in the financial year 1971-72. These mills are not covered by the Payment of Bonus Act, even as amended by the recent ordinance issued by the Government of India. However, the Cabinet Sub-Committee for Textile Industry presided over by Shri M. D. Chaudhari, Minister for Finance, has in its meeting on 12th Oct. 1972 decided to pay 81 per cent ex-gratia payment to employees of these mills which are either owned by Government or run under authorised controller or taken on lease. This will benefit about forty-eight thousand employees of these mills and the amount of about Rs. 1-21 crores will be naid as ex-gratia to these employees. This payment will be made before Diwali. While approving the ex-gratia payment, Government appeals to employees of the Government run mills to put in greater efforts in production and profitability. This is the only way to save the mills from suffering a set back, which will be bad both for employees and the management. Government trusts that the employees will give a positive response to this gesture and make extra efforts in all directions and give full co-operation for better working of the mills ."

Cut in D. A. restored in Two Mills

The Government of Maharashtra has decided to restore the cut in dearness allowance in the Osmanshahi Mills, Nanded, from October 1, 1972. This will fill up the gap of rupee one per worker per day in the mills.

The Government has also decided to restore the cut in dearness allowance by rupce one in the New Castle Mills, Bombay, by paying additional run one per worker, per day, from October 1, 1972.

Small Industries should form sheet Anchor of Nation's economy

Shri N. M. Tidke, Minister for Industries, said on 11th Oct. 1972 that in a developing country like India where capital was costly and scarce and where labour force was plentiful, small scale industries should form the sheet anchor of the nation's economy. Proper nurturing of small scale industries would thus enable us to tackle the formidable problem of growing unemployment which was staring us in the face and solution of which brooked no delay, he added.

Shri Tidke was delivering a concluding speech at the two-day Maharashtra State Small Scale Industries Conference. The Conference was organised jointly by the FASII and the Vidarbha Industries Association to review the progress made by the small industries in Maharashtra. More than 600 delegates from all parts of Maharashtra and India and the representatives of Governments and the banks participated in the conference.

Shri Tidke said that such conferences, no doubt, enabled us to take a review of the progress made and prepare for the work to be done in times to come.

Referring to the survey report of the representative units from the small scale sector presented to the conference, Shri Tidke said that the survey had made available a fund of valuable data on various aspects and agencies of assistance, the extent to which the facilities offered by the Government were being availed of and the modifications called for to meet the aspirations and the needs of the small scale entrepreneur. He stressed the need for including in the training programme of the Small Industries Service Institute, a larger number of programmes of short duration for the entrepreneurs who were already in the field. He expressed satisfaction over the work done by the corporation established by the State Government to assist entrepreneurs in the field of large, medium and small scale industries. In order to achieve better publicity, the S. I. C. O. M. would organise an industrial assistance centre in its office at Bombay, where all information about State Government agencies which give assistance to entrepreneurs would be available. The Government was considering a proposal for graded incentive to industries in the undeveloped area and also a proposal for a special incentive to employment oriented industries, he added.

Expressing his views on the problem of employment of technicians and engineers. Shri Tidke said that unless the educated unemployed were encouraged and reassured by those who had practical experience in the field, they did not venture to enter into the industrial field. He requested successful entrepreneurs to guide and nurse them and to attract them to their respectable class of selfemployed industrialists. Shri Tidke hoped that by proper staggering of holidays and hours of rest and work it should be possible for industries to maintain the production level and employment level inspite of the 8 per cent power cut enforced due to the shortage of power.

ed performance of Labour aids U. S. Inflation Fight

releration of gains in productivity combined with a slowing in wage increase ant months has resulted in a dramatic reduction in the rate of increase in clabour costs, according to the U.S. Federal Reserve System.

labour cost per unit of output is a key factor determining price levels, an encouraging development in the U. S. fight to hold down the rate of make its goods more competitive in international markets, and thereby balance and stability to the international economy.

For the first half of 1972 the increase in unit labour costs from a year earlier gred 2.2 per cent." an article in the latest issue of the Federal Reserve nation reports. "These increases in unit labour costs were less than oned as large as those in 1969 and 1970." The bulletin is published by the Reserve System, the U.S. Central Bank.

the article cautions that the continued improvement in unit labour costs will and to a large extent on further slowing of increases in average hourly comaction. It warns that "increases in productivity as large as those in the athree quarters are not likely to be sustained, "since these large productivity were caused at least in part by the recevery from the 1970 economic slow-

in the private nonfarm sector, productivity or average output per hour work—surged ahead by 4.2 per cent from the first half of 1971 to the thalf of 1972 with greater growth coming in 1972. This compares with int of less than one per cent. in 1969 and 1970. During the 1971-1972 period growth of hourly compensation dropped nearly a percentage point, to 65

The most pronounced slowing in wage increases has come in the construction dustry. During the recent decade gains in hourly wages of construction workabecame increasingly large with a peak average gain of 9 6 per cent. in 1970. ksof August, 1972, the annual growth of average hourly earnings in the industry per to 5.5 per cent., according to the Federal Reserve.

Anart from the building industry, the deceleration of wage gains have been nost apparent in services, finance and trade. These three fields, to a large then composed of smaller firms, are less unionised and wages in their arrears are most sensitive to changes in economic and institutional conditions.

"In contrast, growth of wages in the highly unionised manufacturing sector as slowed less dramatically," the Federal Reserve study explains. "In the pasportation and public utilities industry group, growth of wages actually creased."

However, in both these industries many of the wage increases that went into effect in 1972 has been negotiated before President Nixon began his economic stabilisation programme in August 1971. New contracts negotiated in manu-

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facturing in recent months, though few in number, have provided smaller incr. ase than those agreed upon before the stabilisation programme began.

During 1973 employers in such major fields as trucking, construction, electrical equipment, and autos will negotiate contracts with more than four million workers, twice the number of 1972.

"If price increases continue to moderate, a less inflationary pattern of wape increases may be establised in these important industries, "the Federal Reserve Bulletin says.

Following a 90-day freeze on prices and wages, imposed in August 1971, the U.S. Government established controls over both wages and prices. The Pau Board, given the task of reviewing proposed wage increases adopted a general guideline that the wages subject to controls should not increase by more than 5 5 per cent per year.

Employees of small firms are exempt from the controls, on the theory that the better organised workers of large firms usually set wage patterns for the economy in general. Most low-paid workers are also exempt.

The Pay Board does not stick rigidly to a 5.5 per cent. guideline for all cases. It approves increases of up to seven per cent. in some cases. However, it has rejected more than half of the pay increase proposals it has reviewed.

The control programme is not the only reason cited by experts for the slowing in wage increases. Economic conditions have led to a moderation in wage increases in some industries, even industries whose wage decisions were not subject to Pay Board review.

AIR POLLUTION ANTIDOTES

H. P. SEERVAI*

Risa recognised fact that abuse of the air we breathe, can have harmful effects our health, comfort, property and crops. Hitherto, attention of the authoriis focussed on the sanitation of water, food, milk etc. But, the most portant element air, without which man cannot survive, and of which each of us daily requires about 745 kilogrammes which is almost comparatively times the weight of food and water consumed by each of us, certainly must rescape surveillance for an indefinite period. Air pollution control should be used on the fact that no one has the privilege to use the atmosphere as a recepthe of waste gases, which would adversely affect the health, well-being, comfort and property of the public.

The problem of air pollution must be tackled uniformly at Government level. fcourse, consideration should be given in respect of geographical and toporaphical features which may affect air pollution in local or regional areas.

The goal of Air Pollution Legislation should be to maintain purity of air ommensurate with local conditions and consistant with the following:

- 1. Health and well-being of the public.
- 2. Protection of plants.
- 3. Protection of property.
- 4. Visibility for safe air travel and ground transport.
- 5. Industrial and economical advancement.

Air pollution is a penalty of modern life and industrialisation and therefore it should be tolerated to a certain extent. Seaside air or resort cannot be expected where the industries are located. A solution of the problem lies in bringing smokeless heating agents within the reach of everyone. Electricity and town gas are admirable agents specially for small or cottage industries.

Unplanned parallel development of public residences and industrial same locality is certainly a share in air pollution. Residential coloni Chembur in Bombay where chemical complexes like Fertilizer Corpora Chemical Plants and Oil Refineries, is a case in point. A big residential was recently permitted to be built in Bombay in proximity of a cotton mill which was prevailing before. At Kumbharwada, foundries are proto carry on metal casting trades on the ground floors of buildings, where are residential apartments on the floors above them. The plight of ther sidential in the above cases due to heat, dust, smoke, fumes and grit may be image In such cases no tangible measures will give relief to the public nor such fun owners of limited means, working to eke out a living, are in a position adopt adequate measures, as besides killing their living it will not be practito abate the nuisances. The only practical method would be to segregate foundries and house them in an industrial estate away from residential zon and proper ventilation systems, hoods, trunks, vent pipes etc. are incorpora and dust-free process like wet process where water is thoroughly m into sand is encouraged. Nuisances cannot be completely eliminated with going in for economically prohibitive measures which would cause a set back the existing industries. If the expenses are no problem it may be possible. avoid air pollution otherwise this would cause greatest limitation to progress Of course, new industries must be made to comply with all the auxiliaries combat air pollution.

Where there is a concentration of heavy industries, and fuel consumption high, and large volumes of flue gases and process effluents are discharged the task of abating air polution will be difficult. But at the same time it must be borne in mind that the offenders are those which emit smoke and gases at low level namely domestic furnaces, locos, steamships and road transport vehicles. Therefore, the broad object must be in make nuisances innocuous with due regard to local conditions, climate, topography etc., so that the inhabitants do not suffer discomfort from smoke, dust, grit, soot, ash and abnoxious smell. The above object must be achieved in a practical and realistic manner at a minimum cost.

Wherever air pollution is to be dealt with, a good design and efficient operation of processes or equipments are of fundamental importance, and the plants must be maintained in good working order to give optimum pelormance. If the operational efficiencies are improved, there is no doubt that direct and indirect benefits will accrue. Thus, besides economic gains, amelioration of pollution will be the result. Engineering and certain consulting firm who undertake to carry out efficiencies of the plants may be consulted, who will suggest ways and means to improve plant efficiency and abate pollution.

Overloading of plants must be avoided as this is one of the causes of air pollution. Smoke is not the constituent of suels, but it is the result of incorrect combustion of volatiles. The emission of smoke means an opportunity lost to convert fuel resourses to useful energy. The essential criteria for efficient combustion are, that air must be brought in just sufficient quantity and not in excess in contact with the suel sufficient time must be allowed to complete chemical reaction between the suel constituents and the air. Intimate mixing of air and gaseous products of combustion must be assured by

urbulance within the combustion chamber, and the size of this chamber must ommensurate with fuel consumption. Appropriate temperature must be mainained to promote and substain ignition and to accelerate the speed of reaction. In short, conditions necessary for efficient combustion to avoid smoke ould be summarized in four words, namely, time, temperature, turbulance and contact.

Training of personnel in charge of furnaces is therefore essential to combat ollution of air, and achieve fuel economy. Smoke is a sign of waste of fuel and byiously money. Needless to say instruments and controls must be installed guide the personnel who man the furnaces.

In many instances attending to the following items will stop smoke and save

- (1) Avoid overloading of plants.
- (2) Stop leakages of steam, water, oil or air.
- (3) Repair broken grates and burnt out components of firing equipment.
- (4) Repair broken refractory and stop air leakages from brick work.
- (5) Carbon formation in oil burner and other nozzles, chambers and oil must be cleaned.
 - (6) Oil strainers to be cleaned periodically.
- (7) Dampers and other air control devices to be repaired and maintained in good working order.
- (8) Heating surfaces to be kept clean. Corroded trunk pieces and the chimney to be attended.
 - (9) Ash pit to be kept clean.
- (10) Top of the chimney must always raised well above the surrounding buildings.
- (11) Firing equipment must be of adequate capacity.
- (12) Instruct operators and train them for quick and correct operations.
- (13) For charging and discharging in certain ovens by providing telescopic connections at inlet and outlet ends.
- (14) Providing self scaling doors.
- (15) For dust controlling circular water sprays give a better quench and reduces dust emission than strong jets of water directed specially in coke ovens.
- (16) Clean the hoppers where dust or grit have collected which are separated from the gas stream.

A simple method of minimizing local pollutions and reducing the harmful flects of gaseaous effluents such as sulphur dioxide without incurring serious echnical problems and recurring monetary cost is to increase the height of effluents discharge. Except where prohibited by air-port authority, installation of a tall chimney is a simple and obvious method to reduce air pollution.

Any obstruction adjacent to a chimney causes down draught and hence height if raised to two and a half times higher than any adjacent building gas and solids will not be brought down quickly but will be dissipated in thair. Thus, higher the chimney greater will be the dispersion and smaller we be the fall out. Therefore, the best palliative for preventing air pollution by smoke, dust, grit and gases like sulphur dioxide, carbon mono-oxide carbon dioxide, hydrogen sulphide etc., is the high discharge of the effluent is a good practice to connect all effluent producing units in a plant a single chimney.

Another line of attack to prevent air pollution is to install washers, scrubbe filters, cyclones, electrostatic precipitators, settling chambers, hoods ventilation and recuperators which will remove pollutents at the end of process. The above subsidiary equipments are to be installed according the nature of the effluents causing pollution. It pays to install efficient equipments of ample capacity.

Another method of minimizing nuisance is by changing fuels, their firmethods and also the process. With the rapid advance of scientific knowled new processes could be introduced by replacing orthodox ones. Specifierence could be made of petteries where smoke nuisance is unavoidate where coal-fired bottle kilns are in service. By eleminating such kilns installing continuous tunnel kilns the nuisance could be abated. Potter as far as possible must not be permitted to be operated in towns as smeat gases are at times essential for the production of the required colour on us products produced.

By re-designing the old and narrow flue passages of a boiler through whus the gases pass pollution could be eliminated. When modern boilers fitted the efficient firing devices and automatic controls, specially to modulate fuelld ratio are installed after discarding old boilers and their firing devices, chance of air pollution are remote. For oil fired boilers additives are now availate which if added to oil in main storage tank in certain proportion, impropring firing efficiency and reduce contamination by sulphur dioxide gas.

Domestic fires and other furnaces which discharge smoke at low level congested areas are worst offenders. For sake of comparison it has be ascertained that nuisance caused by one ton of coal burnt in a domestic furn, would be equivalent to that caused by consumption of 20,000 tons of fuel in power station boiler. A steam locomotive is found many a time dischargic clouds of smoke and also emission of grit and dust which at times is intolerable. With skilled firing and precautions taken during starting up, smoke can reduced to a reasonable amount. Loco drivers are not aware of the statuand they must be informed about the smoke nuisances law, and training are instructions imparted to them. It is gratifying to note that in following from years diesel and electric loco will replace the steam ones, and this will be of vincing answer to the air pollution arising from present locomotives.

Nuisances from domestic fires and other petty trade furnaces could be eliinated by using smokeless fuels like electricity and gas which must be made allable and within the reach of all.

plotor vehicles are also one of the worst offenders as regards air pollution is næmed. If the vehicles are well maintained and the engine tuned and recily adjusted, the nuisance would be minimised. Smoke from vehicles diesel oil is due to malfunctioning or choking of the injector equipment. Schage of nozzles could be prevented by installing good filtering devices, deare must be taken to determine that air inlet filters are not choked. In the injector equipment in internal combustion engines.

Air pollution due to emission of smoke, grit, dust and fumes must therefore stopped through a skilled handling of plants which should be of adequate pacity, maintained in good working order, and by employing trained permet. For healthy atmosphere, the industrialist must keep aside their selfish lives of extra expenditure and show sincerity to co-operate in abating air plution. Nothing is more embarrasing to the public when their complaints eignoid. At the same time public must realise that industries carnot permagical feats by abating nuisances overnight. Industries must be given to improve their plant efficiencies or to incorporate devices to abate sances. Incentive schemes by the Government or certain associations pull be introduced, or loans given to induce management to combat air flution. New industries must not be permitted to function unless devices abate air pollution are incorporated in their plants.

Like clean food and water, the public is conscious of the necessity for clean and it is their privilege to demand it for their health and well-being and to event damage to their crops and property. Thus, good relations between distries and the public, and exercise of co-operation, sincerity and good-will all concerned, the air pollution could be cortrolled. If the above virtues one succeed, heap penalties could be laid on offenders including cancellation the heapes etc.

MATCHING JOBLESS AND JOBS BY COMPUTER

At a time when there is wide discussion about ways of reducing the present level of unemployment in Britain, the government is taking advantage of modern techniques and equipment as part of its strategy to reduce the numbers

Although the jobless total is relatively high, the situation is really batter than it appears as there are considerable job vacancies in some parts of country.

If a effective means could be found to match workers from areas of high unemployment with the job vacancies in other areas, the unemployment figure, would register an improvement.

Co-ordination

In its bid to match the requirements of jobless workers with vacancies, the government has turned to computers, which are playing an increasing part in employment work in storing, handling and co-ordinating the flow of information and in compiling statistical and management data.

Computers offer the attractive prospect of maintaining lists of vacancies and job seekers in a central register and automatically providing suitable lists of applicants for vacancies and of jobs for applicants.

Althity in Little a computer-compiled job bank is providing daily lists of vacancies to offices in the area. The ex ent of the flow of information about jobs, the number of offices involved and the mobility of workers within the area puts London in a unique position.

Feasibility Study

Taking the use of computers a step further, the Department of Employment has now commissioned a feasibility study into an "on-line" computerised vacancy matching system for its local offices.

An on-line system directly links visual display screens to a central point. Its use would give employment office staffs direct links to a continuously updated computerised record of jobs on offer and people wanting jobs.

The Department sees this feasibility study, which is already under way, as an important prelude to commissioning a pilot project.

The Department's initial thinking is that an on-line vacancy matching system, if feasible, would be most likely justified for the London area, where employment exchanges handle some 400,000 jobs a year.

The study however will also cover the feasibility of introducing such systems of the country.

estematic Search

The management consultants who are carrying out the study have been to advise on the scale and nature of an on-line quick response system, such is seen as offering most advantage in meeting the Department's long needs.

The main potential gains of an on-line system compared with existing systems that all offices on the computer network could be given immediate information about notified vacancies, making it easier to match people with jobs wider areas and ensuring a more systematic searching so that people with a still or experience know of suitable vacancies.

With employers notifying about two million vacancies to the Department's failunal net work of over 1,000 employment offices in an average year, such improved placing would clearly help alleviate unemployment.

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NEW SERVICES WILL ADVISE ON MEDICAL PROBLEMS AT WORK

With the rapid advance of technology safety at work has become of increasing concern to all major industrial nations. Stable industrial relations depend to a large extent on ensuring that the individual worker is happy in his job and long People's Welfare safe working conditions are of major importance in this respect.

In Britain the promotion of safer and healthier working conditions is achieved partly through legislation, partly through voluntary co-operation in selection matters between employers and trades unions and partly through making the worker himself more aware of safety needs.

Government Role

As more complex industrial processes are developed the government's role has grown in importance. Already the Factories Act, 1961 lays down requires ments for maintaining standards of safety, health and welfare in factories, warehouses, construction sites, ship yards and docks, while the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963 protects in other fields.

Recent action by the British Government emphasises its recognition of this steadily growing role. The Employment Medical Advisory Service Act erable the Government to set up an Employment Medical Advisory Service (I MAs) to study and give advice on medical problems connected with employment,

The service will be a focus for the development of occupational medicine in Britain and will be available to give advice to employers, trades unions, employees, general doctors and others with an interest in the subject. It is interest in safety and health problems. that the service will be in operation by the end of the year.

Study And Advice

The new service will study and advise on a number of subjects, including the effects of particular jobs on health; the medical precautions to be taken when working with poisonous or hazardous substances; the medical needs for different types of work; and the particular problems of the disabled.

It will have a special responsibility for the health of young people at work and will carry out medical surveys and other investigations. But it will not provide medical treatment.

The staff will also include who will assist in medical examinations and the surveys of occupational which the Service will undertake.

The Service will also co-operate with the Department of Employment's cing, training and disablement resettlement service and undertake medical Cryision, guidance and examination of workers attending Government Lining Centres and Industrial Rehabilitation Units.

Inder the new Act young people will be examined selectively. EMAs will the right to obtain med cal information from the School Health Service hich will, as part of its programme of health supervision in schools, let the MA know of any continuing medical advice.

In addition factory occupiers must notify careers officers when they engage young person. This will enable EMAs and careers officers to keep accial watch on unfit youngsters entering a factory environment.

The factory inspectors give a wide range of lectures on safety matters while permanent exhibition of good safety practice is maintained and kept uptothe at an Industrial Health and Sufety Centre in London.

aposure To Noise

Another example of the government's efforts to promote safer and healthier orking conditions is the recently introduced Code of Practice to reduce noise mosure in industry. This Code gives advice on how to keep noise within edified limits and how to protect workers who are exposed to noise above rese limits.

Excessive noise can damage the hearing.

And regular exposure to even low noise levels over a long period can le a loss of part of the range of hearing which is permanent and incurable.

The Code recommends that management should first aim to reduce at source. Where noise is above suitable levels areas should be adequired which ear protection is required. Entry into these areas should be contrained individual protection provided.

The Code also gives maximum noise levels which should never be exwithout ear protection in any circumstances and lays down noise limits exposure at determined levels below this.

- (e) not more than 25 employees at a time shall be allowed to gather at the place when such sums are collected;
- (f) collections shall be made on the usual pay day or days and on the subsequent three days and the day or days on which unclaimed wages are paid:

Provided that, (i) on the usual pay day or days, the collection shall be made during a hours of payment, and (ii) on any other days, the collection shall be made during such hours as may be mutually agreed upon between the employer and the union, subject to the condition that the period shall not be more than three hours on each of such days.

- 17. Mode of putting up notice.—The President, the Vice-President, the General Secretary, the Secretary, the Joint Secretary, the Assistant Secretary and the Treasurer of a recognised union, shall be entitled to put up or cause to be put up a notice-board outside the time-keeper office or at any other conspicuous place mutually agreed upon between the employer and the union and affix notices thereon during the hours the undertaking is open provided that,—
 - (a) the notice-board to be put up shall be of a reasonable size;
- (b) the notice to be affixed shall be signed either by the President, the Vice-President the General Secretary, the Secretary, the Joint Secretary, the Assistant Secretary, or the treasurer; such notices shall relate to the lawful activities of the union and shall not be of an offensive or provocative nature.
- 18. Permission to do acts under section 20.—Subject to the provisions of rules 19, 20 and 21, the President, the Vice-President, the General Secretary, the Secretary, the Joint Secretary, the Assistant Secretary and the Treasurer of a recognised union shall, for the purpose of he prevention or settlement of an industrial dispute be permitted by the employer to do all or any of the acts mentioned in sub-clause (ι) , (u) and $(u\iota)$ of clause (ι) of section 20.
- 19. Permission to hold discussion.—The officers specified in rule 18 shall be permitted by the employer to hold discussions on the premises of the undertaking with the employer concerned who are members of the recognised union:

Bombay Electricity (Special Powers) Act, 1946

Order

Industries and Labour Department No. SAC. 1072/Elec. II -4th October 1972. - Wh due to shortage of electrical energy, at the consequent necessity for its conservation expedient to control distribution supply, consumption and use thereof,

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 6-A and-6-B of the Roma Electricity (Special Powers) Act, 1946 (Bom. XX of 1946), the Government of Maharash, hereby makes the following Order, namely:

- 1. Short title and commencement.—(1) This Order may be called the Maharashtra Electrical Commencement. Energy (Regulation of Distribution, Supply, Consumption or Use) Order, 1972.
- (2) It shall come into force—
- (a) in relation to consumer who are required to work on Sunday the 8th day of Octob 1972 by or under any law for the time being in force in the State or otherwise, on the day of October 1972, and
- (b) in relation to all other consumers, on the 8th day of October 1972.
- 2. Definitions.—In this Order, unless the context requires otherwise
- (a) "consumer" means a consumer or group or class of consumers specified in Schedule 1
- (b) "licensee" means a licensee specified in Schedule II;
- (c) "week" means a week commencing on Sunday the 8th day of October 1972:
- (d) "schedule" means a schedule annexed to this Order.
- 3. Staggering of supply of electrical energy to consumers.—No licensee specified in column 3 of Schedule I shall distribute or supply electrical energy to any consumer specified against it in column 2 of that Schedule, and no such consumer shall consume or use electrical energy on the day of every week specified against them in column 4 thereof:

Provided that, the State Government may, by order in writing, specify in the case of any consumer, a different day of any week for the purposes of this clause.

- 4. Power of Licensee to discontinue supply to defaulting consumers.—Where any consumer consumes or uses electrical energy in contravention of the provisions of clause 3 of this Order the State Government thereby directs that the licensee shall discontinue forthwith the suppl of electrical energy for a period not exceeding 3 days, in the case of consumers receiving suppl at 3 phase 400 volts for motive power load and for one day in the case of consumers receiving supply at voltage exceeding 400 volts (H.T.S.)
- 5. Exemption.—Nothing contained in clause 3 shall apply—
- (a) in relation to the distribution of supply of electrical energy by any licensee to, or purpose, workshops, wireless installation, hospitals etc.
 - 1. Defence purposes (including Military Aerodromes and Aerodromes for military purpose, workshops, wireless installation, Hospitals etc.)
 - 2. Government Defence factories.
 - 3. Water-works and Drainage.
 - 4. Hospitals.

- (b) in relation to the supply of electrical energy required by any consumer—
- (1) for minimum lighting required for security purposes, or
- (u) for running auxiliaries of a plant which in the opinion of the Electric Inspection to the Government are essential, or
- (iii) for domestic lights and heating purposes.

Though the number of disputes and number of mandays lost due to strike activity in Maharashtra State during the month of July 1972 have decreased as compared to the previous months, there was rise in number of wokrers involved

The figures for the month under review show 101 disputes in progress involving 37,276 workers and a time loss of 2,63,998 mandays as compared to 112 disputes in June 1972 with 36,201 workers affected and time loss of 2,65,584 mandays.

Thirteen of the total disputes in progress during July 1972 were in the Textile industry, 35 in the Engineering Industry and the remaining 53 were in other industries.

Sixty-seven of the total disputes involving 22,402 workers were actually recorded during the month while 34 disputes involving 14,874 workers were carried over from the previous month.

"The word "disputes" in the official sense means interruption of work and it is hereby used in that sense as virtually synoymous with "strike". In compiling Statistics of the industrial disputes, however, disputes in which 10 or more persons are involved are included.

Thirty-six of the disputes arose over questions of "pay allowances and bonus "45 related to "retrenchment and grievances about personnel" 2 to "leave and hours of works" and the remaining 18 were due to "other reguses".

out of the 78 disputes that terminated during the course of the month 33 settled either entirely or partially in favour of the workers 31 in favour the employers, while the result of the remaining 14 disputes were indefinite.

PROGRESS OF IMPORTANT INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES IN MAHARASHTRA STATE DURING THE MONTH OF JULY 1972

Rombay

(1) Shakti Insulated wires Pvt. Ltd., Bombay. The Lockout in Shakti Insulated Wires Pvt. Ltd., Bombay which commenced from May 10, 1972, affecting 500 workers effected by the management on account of large scale indiscipline in the factory continued without any material charge throughout the month.

(2) Godrej Boyce Mfg. Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay. The strike following lockout affecting 6,506 workers employed in the Godrej Boyce Mfg. Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay which commenced from June 28th, 1972 on account of dispute over recognition of union ended on July 12th, 1972 through the intervention of labour Minister. Due to this lockout 1,23,891 man-days were lost.

(3) Jayant Paper Box Mfg. Co. Ltd., Bombay. Out of the total complement of 162 workers employed in the Jayant Paper Box Mfg. Co. Ltd., Bombay, 155 workers resorted to strike from June 1, 1972 protesting against show-cause notices issued to two workinen. The strike was in progress till the end of the month of July 1972.

(4) Bombay Metal and Alloys Mfg. Co. Ltd., and its sister concern, Bombay & Thana. Out of the total complement of 609 workers employed in the Bombay Metal and Alloys Mfg. Co. Ltd., and its sister concern, Bombay & Thana, 380 workers resorted to strike from June 10, 1972 demanding higher D. A. and Bonus. Due to this strike remaining 229 workers were affected. The strike was in progress till the end of July, 1972.

(5) Consolidated Pneumatic Tools Co. (India) Ltd., Bombay. There was a strike in the consolidated Pneumatic Tools Co. (India) Ltd. Bombay, resorted to strike from July 12, 1972 protesting against suspension of a worker. In this strike 582 workers were involved and 88 workers were indirectly affected. The strike ended on July 27, 1972 through the Intervention of Labour Commissioner office, Bombay. Due to this strike 9,279 man-days were lost.

Thana

(6) C. Ramon Pvt. Itd., Thana. The strike of 387 workers employed in a C. Ramon Pvt. Ltd., Thana which commenced from May 9, 1972, over workers demand for reinstatement of retrenched workers ended on July 1, 1972 as the workers resumed duties unconditionally. Due to this strike 15, 22 mandays were lost.

(7) United Wire Ropes, Thana. The lockout affecting 250 workers employed in the United Wire Ropes Co., Thana, which commenced from April 20, 102, on account of assault on Supervisory Staff ended on July 29, 1972. Due to this lockout 21,250 mandays were lost.

(8) Herdillia Chemicals Ltd., Thana. The strike of 330 workers employed in the Herdillia Chemicals India Ltd., Thana which commenced from May 11 1972 over the workers demand of 42 Hours working in a week ended on July 25, 1972 through the intervention of Labour Minister. On account of this work-stoppage 19,954 mandays were lost.

(9) Caprihans India Pvt. Ltd., Thana. The strike followed by lockout affecting 242 workers employes in the Caprihans India Pvt. Ltd., Thana, which commenced from April 28, 1972 over confirmation ended on July 25,1972 as the matter was referred to the Industrial Tribunal. On account of this workstoppage 17,664 mandays were lost.

Ambernath (District Thana)

(10) K. T. Group of Industries, Ambernath. The lookout declared by the management of K. T. Group of Industries Ambernath which commencement from June 23rd 1972 on account of indiscipline behaviour of the workers ended on July 17, 1972, at the intervention of Commissioner of Labour Office Bombay. The total workers affected due to lockout was 697. Due to this lockouts 14,637 mandays were lost.

Pooda

Matchwel Electricals India Ltd., Poona. The total complement of 880 workers employed in the Matchwel Electricals India Ltd., Poona, resorted to strike from July 4, 1972 demanding reinstatement of a discharged worker. The management declared lockout from July 16, 1972. The strike and lockout was continued till the end of July, 1972 without any material change.

MAHARASHTRA STATE CO-OPERATIVE BANK EMPLOYERS UNION, MAHAL NAGPUR

The Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 section 13 (1)—Bankin Industry—Application for registration as a Representative Union under the Act for the local areas of (a) Nagpur Taluka excluding the area of the Municipal Corporation of the city of Nagpur, (b) Saoner Taluka, (c) Umraluka, (d) Ramtek Taluka, (c) Katol. Whether the Union was disqualified for registration as Representative Union. Held it was not.

After conducting the enquiries and having come to the conclusion that the condition requisite for the registration of the union as specified in section 13 (h of the Act and Rule 28-A of the Rules had been satisfied the Additional Registrar of Unions, Nagpur, in exercise of the powers conferred on him under section 14 of the B.I.R. Act, 1946 and Rules 26 of the B.I.R. Rules, 1947 registered the union as a Representative union for the local areas mentioned in the application.

Order

(Passed this 10th day of October 1972)

The Maharashtra State Co-operative Bank Employees Union, Mahal Nagpur (hereinaster called as the 'Union') submitted the applications on 29th January 1972 seperately under section 13(1) of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 (hereinaster called as the 'Act') for its registration as a Representative Union under the Act in the Industry engaged in Co-operative Banking for the following local areas of the Nagpur District:—

- (a) Nagpur Taluka excluding the area of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Nagpur.
- (b) Saoner Taluka.

- 3. The Union has also been registered under the Act as a Representative Union for the industry engaged in Co-operative Banking in the local area of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Nagpur on the 1st day of September 1956 under registration certificate No. 47.
- 4. The establishments where the Union is functioning have already been recognised as undertakings under section 11 of the Act.
- 5. The Applications, the resolutions and the statements of the Union were countried by this Office and they were found to be in order.
- 6. As provided under section 14 of the Act read with Rule 13 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Rules, 1947 (hereinafter called as the 'Rules'), the Union gedited a sum of Re. 1 each as fees for registrarion of union, for each of the santications made by the Union.
- 7. As required under section 14 of the Act read with Rule 28-A of the Rules an enquiry was fixed on 26th April 1971 at 11-30 a.m. in this Office. The Union was informed through this Office letter No. Dy. CL/BIR/7966-7970, dated the 10th April 1972, about the date fixed for holding an enquiry and the Union was given 15 days notice through the said letter as provided under Rule 28-A(2) of the Rules. Through the said letter the Union was requested to produce the following records:—
 - (a) Membership Register.
- (b) Counterfoils of receipt of subscription for nine Calender months immediately preceding the Calender months in which the Union made the applications i.e. for the period from April 1971 to December 1971 (both months inclusive).
- (c) Minute Book
- (d) Cash Book.
- (e) Bank Pass Book.
- (f) Audited statement of membership for each of the 9 Calender months immediately preceding the Calender months in which the Union made applications i.e. for the period from April 1971 to December 1971 (both months inclusive).

- 8. The General Secretary of the Union was further informed through had said letter that if he failed to be present before the undersigned on the date fixed for the enquiry or if he failed to produce the documents as required sub-rule (3) of Rule 28-A of the Rules, his applications would be as per sub-rule (5)(a) of Rule 28-A of the Rules.
- 9. On that day, the General Secretary of the Union requested for extension of time for submission of above records as the required records were with the Chartered Accountant and promised to produce the required records immediately after receipt of the same from the Chartered Accountant. The request of the Union was considered. On 21st June 1971 the required documents have been produced by the Union in this Office.
- 10. Through this Office Letter, No. Dy-CL/BIR/1527, dated 7th July 1972 the General Secretary of the Union was informed the date of the enquiry is 13th July 1972 for varification of the records. On 13th July 1972 the required records had been verified in this Office and they were found in order.
- 11. Through this Office Endorsement, No. Dy-CL/BIR 18945, dated the 17th August 1972, the General Secretary of the Union was informed the dates of the sport enquiry into the valid membership of the Union to be conducted at various branches of the establishments located in different local areas. spot enquiry some places where the branches of the Banks located, covered more than 25 per cent membership of the Union have been selected. The maximum number of the members of the Union from these Branches were interviewed at the time of the spot enquiry.
- 12. (a) Nagpur Taluka excluding the area of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Nagpur.—The spot enquiry for verification of the valid membership of the Union in this local area was conducted at Hingna on 25th August 1972 in the presence of the General Secretary of the Union and in the presence of the Agents of the respective Banks. In all 8 members of the Union were interrogated. Out of 8 members of the Union interrogated, they were all found to be the members of the Union during the relevant period.
