The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class

The Bombay, Sholapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of May 1972 with the average prices for the year 1960 equal to 100 were 196, 192 and 197 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Poona and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of May 1972 with the average prices for the year 1961 equal to 100 were 211, 181 and 198 respectively.

Industrial Disputes

During March 1972, there were 91 strikes involving 27,967 workmen and a time loss of 2,04,311 working days, as compared to 85 disputes in February 1972 involving 33,651 workers and the time loss of 2,39,088 mandays. Further particulars of industrial disputes are given at pages 2054 to 2055 and 2077 to 2086 of this issue.

Absenteeism

During April 1972, the average absentecism in the textile industry in seven important textile centres in the State viz Bombay City, Nagpur, Sholapur Jalgaon, Nanded, "Akola and Aurangabad amounted to 18.53 per cent. as against 19.65 per cent. in March 1972. For further particulars see page 2057 of this issue.

Production of Cotton Yarn spun and manufacture of cloth

During January 1972, Mills in Bombay City produced a total of 1,47,73,000 Kgs. of yarn, 2,03,000 Kgs. of Miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery goods and knitted fabrics and packed 27,86,000 metres of cotton goods mixed with silk, wool, terene, etc. and packed 9,96,400 metres wearable and non-wearable cloth and those in Best of Maharashtra produced 45,94,000 Kgs. of yarn 1,88,000 Kgs. of miscellaneous goods such as blankets, hosiery and knitted fabrics and packed 2,47,04,000 metres of wearable and non-wearable cloth. The total production of cotton yarn, miscellaneous goods and mixed with silk, wool, terene, etc. packing of wearable and non-wearable cloth for the whole of Maharashtra amounted to 93,67,000 Kgs., 3,91,000 Kgs. 28,63,000 metres and 12,43,44,000 metres respectively.

Wages Act covers salt pan Industry

The Government of Maharashtra has extended the Minimum Wages Aq to the employment in the Salt Pan Industry.

Minimum Wages Committee for Wooden Photo frame Industry

The Government of Maharashtra has appointed a committee under the chairmanship of Shri Y. R. Deogade, of Nagpur, to advise Government in the matter of fixation of minimum rates of wages in respect of the employees in any industry in which wooden photo or picture frame making and other similar work or any work incidental to such process is carried on in the State

The other members of the committee are: Shri Sardar Ajitsingh, proprietor B. B. Metal Works, Nanded; Shri P. S. Soni, Fine Framing Works, Jalgaon-Shri Dayaram Wadey, Managing Partner, Nagpur Picture Frame Works (Wade Company), Nagpur (All employers' representatives); Shri Vithal Jadhav, General Secretary, Marathwada Rashtriya General Machinery Mazdoor Sangh. Nanded; Shri W. H. Tulpule, General Secretary, the Poona General Employees' Union, Poona and Shri G. M. Khode, President, Rashtriya Lakud Kamgar Sangh, Nagpur (all employees' representatives).

Shri B. G. Jadhav, Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Nagpur, will be the secretary of the committee.

Saw Milling Industry Committee for Minimum Wages

The Government of Maharashtra has appointed a committee under the chairmanship of Shri Ramrao Balbudhe of Nagpur to advise Government on fixation of the minimum rates of wages for employees in any industry engaged in saw milling in the State.

The other members of the committee are: Shri R. L. Ballewar of Messrs. Apparao Gadam and Co., Nanded: Shri M. G. Shedji, President, Timber Merchants' Association, Sangli; Shri R. L. Bangade, Secretary, Saw Mill Owners' Association and also Proprietor, Bharati Saw Mills, Chandrapur; Shri Baljitrai Kohli, Kohli Brothers Saw Mill, Nagpur; Shri Shivajibhai Shah. Devchand and Co., Nagpur (all employers' representatives); Shri Manohar Jalgaonkar, General Secretary, Jalna Mazdoor Union, Jalna; Shri G. M. Khode, President, Rashtriya Lakud Kamgar Sangh, Nagpur; Shri R. M. Naik, General Secretary, Hamal Panchayat, Poona; Dr. Ranganath Mishra, Nagpur; and Shri R. C. Pande, President, General Workers' Union, Chandrapur (all employees' representatives).

Shri B. G. Jadhav. Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Nagpur, will be the Secretary of the Committee.

Display fair rates conspicuously-Hoteliers to note

Managers and owners of all the hotels and lodging houses in Greater Bombay, in respect of which fair rates have been fixed or revised by the Controller of Hotels and Lodging Houses, are advised to display, in a conspicuous manner, the notices showing the fair rates and other particulars.

Under the Bombay Rents, Hotel and Lodging House Rates Control Act, 1947, it is obligatory to display notices showing the fair rates, number of lodgers allowed to be accommodated in each room or accommodation, services to be provided and the relevant provisions of the Act in a conspicuous manner in the establishments and in each of the room concerned.

Government takes a serious view of the breach of these instructions which may result in a punishment provided for in the Act.

International Labour Conference to meet in Geneva from 7th to 27th June

The 57th session of the International Labour Conference will open at the Palais des Nations, in Geneva, on Wednesday 7 June, and will close on Tuesday 27th June.

Each of the 122 member States of the International Labour Organisation is entitled to send two government, one worker and one employer delegate to the Conference.

The agenda of the session is as follows:

- I. Report of the Director-General.
- II. Programme and budget proposals and other financial questions.
- III. Information and reports on the application of Conventions and Recommendations.
- IV. Minimum age for admission to employment (first discussion).
- V. Social repercussions of new methods of cargo handling (docks) (first discussion).
- VI. Labour and social implications of automation and other technological developments (general discussion).

VII. Substitution, in the provisions of the Constitution of the International Labour Organisation relating to membership of the Governing Body, of the figures "fifty-six", "twenty-eight", "eighteen" and "fourteen" for the figures "forty-eight", "twenty-four", "fourteen" and "twelve".

Entitled Technology for Freedom; the ILO Contribution, the report of ILO Director-General Wilfred Jenks will form the basis for the general debate in plenary session. It discusses some of the major social issues arising out of rapid technological change, including its effects on the environment, social relationships, human freedom, working conditions and development. The report also examines the role which the ILO might play in the formulation of a concerted world policy to control technology with the support of employers and workers.

The Organisation's programme and budget for the 1972-73 biennium having been approved at last year's session, the Conference will only consider such other financial and administrative matters as the Governing Body may refer

The Conference will examine reports which member States are required to submit regularly on the manner in which they apply Conventions they have ratified, as well as reports on certain selected international labour standards, For 1972, these are: The Employment Policy Convention and Recommendation, the Seafarers' Engagement (Foreign Vessels) Recommendation and the Social Conditions and Safety (Seafarers) Recommendation.

Two agenda items minimum age for admission to employment and social repercussions of new methods of cargo handling in docks will be discussed with a view to determining whether new ILO standards should be worked out in those fields.

As for the labour and social implications of automation and other technological development, a general discussion will take place concerning a coordinated set of guidelines for programmes to help workers adjust to such changes.

The proposed amendment to the ILO Constitution, under item VII of the agenda, would if adopted have the effect of increasing the membership of the ILO's Governing Body from 48 to 56.

Delegates will also receive a special report on the application of the Declaration concerning the policy of apartheid of the Republic of South Africa.

In addition the Conference will be called upon to elect the members of the Governing Body and of the Organisation's regional advisory committees for a period of three years

shops Act Relaxed for Banks

The Government of Maharashtra has suspended certain provisions of the nombay Shops and Establishments Act, 1948, for completion of the accounts ad stock-taking for the half yearly and yearly closing in June and December 1972, in the banks throughout the State. The period of suspension is June to 30 and December 28 to 30, 1972.

If any employee is required to work in excess of the prescribed hours, he will be entitled to over-time wages for such work. But the spread-over of such work is not to exceed 16 hours a day.

International Labour Conference elects New Governing Body

Delegates to the annual Conference of the International Labour Organisation elected on 15 June 1972 a new Governing Body of the International Labour Office for a three-year term.

The Governing Body comprises 48 members—Government representatives of 24 countries, 12 employer members and 12 worker members.

Ten of the Government members hold permanent seats by virtue of being states of chief industrial importance (see list below).

The 14 other Government members, the 12 employer members and the 12 worker members were elected by the Government, employer and worker groups respectively. In accordance with the ILO Constitution, the 10 permanent members did not take part in the election to the Government group.

As a result of the elections, membership of the Governing Body for the period 1972-75 will be as follows:—

provide Mobile Homes for Labour-Smt. Jung's Call to Builders

Smt. Ali Yavar Jung called upon the contractors and builders of Bombay to provide mobile homes for their labour with provision of certain basic needs of living. It was primarily their responsibility and social obligation to ensure the welfare of their labour, she said. Smt. Jung was inaugurating a mobile creche for the children of construction labour the first of its kind in the city at Nepean Sea Road, in Bombay on 22nd June 1972.

The creche was started jointly by the Shah Construction Co. and the Builders Association of India, to provide nutrition, health care, basic education and recreation for the children of their labour.

Complimenting the sponsors on introducing a unique scheme, Smt. Jung hoped that the creche would cater to the needs of the neglected children of migrant labour who generally remained uncared and unloved and growing into undesirable elements of society while their parents worked at sites.

PRODUCTIVITY AND LABOUR WELFARE

BY

G. SAIBABA *

At present the concept of Labour productivity is widely accepted and is recognised as an indispensable factor for rapid economic development. We have now reached a stage in which we are seriously pursuing the efforts for generating productivity consciousness. The different partners in productive activity must do every thing jointly and in harmonious co-operation with one another to ensure optimum productivity.

A rise in productivity makes direct contribution to the growth of National Income, by increasing the amount of per capita wealth produced. Agricultural and Industrial production can be increased mainly through higher productivity of the labour in the respective industries. The aims of self-sufficiency and selfreliance in agriculture as well as industry can be reached through higher productivity techniques. Higher productivity of a sector resulting in higher profits can lead to investment in other sectors and continuity of such process will materialise as full employment situation. It will generate virtuous circle constituting more production, more income, more savings, more investment and more employment opportunities. In a full employment stage no income groups becomes income groups and income groups become higher income groups. If measures of economic equality are deliberately enforced in such a situation, incomes not only go to many but at a higher level to more people than would have such measures are not implemented. The consequent reductions in poverty and economic inequality raises the marginal utility of money income. This leads to an annulting of negative utilities, creation of positive utilies and consequently maximasation of positive utility and ecomomic welfare. If the gains due to higher productivity are judiciously divorted to channels of higher wage, labour welfare and fringe benefits, our cherised goal of establishment of the welfare state can be achieved more quickly with minimum disturbances. According to J. S. Mill, higher wage leads to higher productivity and thus labour cost become cheaper. Thus higher productivity leads to labour welfare and labour welfare leads to higher productivity, economic growth and development. They have a mutual cause and effect relationship.

Factors contributes for Higher Productivity:

Greater productivity can be achieved only in an atmosphere of harmonio and constructive labour-management relations. Harmony in industry relations is thus a requisite to higher productivity. Employers as we as employees must be willing and capable to contribute to higher productivn. This will not happen in an atmosphere of suspecion, conflict, distrust insecurity. Hence it is necessary to respect and concede the legitimate right of workers. The First Five-Year-Plan recognised this and stated, "The worker is the principle instrument in the fulfilment of the targets of the plan and the achievement of economic progress, generally. His co-operation will be essential factor in creating an economic organisation in the country which will best subserve the needs of social justice. Certain rights and obligations are associated with this distinct role". Some attempts were made to implement these assurances in the subsequent Five-Year-Plans.

Apart from the role played by labour, the following factors will also contribute significantly to productivity; (1) Quality of raw materials; (2) Scale of production; (3) Machinery and equipment; (4) Continuity of operation; (5) Supervision and management; (6) Capacity utilization. Therefore, it is reasonable to say that productivity exclusively on account of labour cannot be measured on scientific basis. The so-called labour productivity is simply an average product calculated on the basis of labour force employed at a given point of time with a definite quantity and quality of capital. It has been found by experience the workers interest in contribution to productivity is limited by a number of factors connected with industrial relations: (1) Labour faith in the ability of the management; (2) Measures of labour welfare actually provided by the management; (3) Job security; (4) An agreable scheme of sharing gains due to increased productivity; (5) Joint consultations; (6) proper communication of all policies and programmes of rationalisation and development of labour; (7) Personnel policies mainly relating to recruitment and promotion and (8) Procedure of grievence redressal.

Workers claims for an improvement of their economic and social status must be duly recognised and higher productivity must immediately reflect in their living standards. A labour policy based on the quantity 2nd quality of work, supported by a sound wage policy complemented by special bonuses and non-monetary incentives can serve as a powerful incentive to higher productivity.

Labour Productivity in India

However inspite of the limitations of industrial relations on labour inclination to work, growth of National Income, growth of Industrial Production, increase money wage, real wages, growth of Industrial Employment and Labour productivity, show a favourable trends as can be seen from the following Table:—

The Table clearly shows that there is a steady growth of Industrial production (col. 3) employment (col.4) and money wages. But money wages (col. 6) did not rise proportionately to industrial production.

The Labour productivity has also risen (col. 7). But the real wage (col. 5) has not only risen but maintained falling trend. This clearly indicates that justice is not being done to the share of labour in the National product or dividend. The trend of falling real wage presents an undesirable picture to the effect that though labour is working hard to increase productivity money

wage is not made to go up to the extent of meeting the needs of standard living and as such his welfare needs are neglected in a so-called social welfare Republic of India.

Some Proposals to achieve higher Productivity

All the parties in productive activity must realise their responsibility achieving higher productivity. Neither management nor labour can successin productivity drive unless the environment in which production operation take place are favourable. Hormony among management, labour, state and social environment makes available such a conductive environment.

- (1) Management.—The wage and welfare policy of the management should create an all round satisfaction in the workers so that their willingness to work and consequently their efficiency and productivity may increase substantially.
- (2) Labour.—Its role in creating favourable environment is quite significant. Here are some guide lines for formulating labour attitudes conducive to higher productivity: (A) Trade Union leaders should be honest; (B) Trade Unions should educate the workers to realise the economic importance and benefits of higher productivity; (C) Positive attitude towards rationalisation and automation; (D) Labours sincere faith in conciliation, arbitration, adjudication and full co-operation with related machineries, (E) Proper labour understanding with management and government in the sharing of the gains of productivity; (F) Labour should adopt democratic, constitutional and peaceful methods so that negative attitude towards work may not prevail and arrest lower productivity.
- (3) State.—As the guardian of the Nation, it has a crucial responsibility in creating favourable conditions conducive for increasing productivity Government's labour policy and its proper implementation will create such a favourable atmosphere. Its action in the following areas will achieve a significant results in securing the benefits of higher productivity: (a) Comprehensive legislation to meet the demands of the industry and labour and to establish harmonious industrial relations; (b) a satisfactory administrative machinery with proper procedures to deal with matters pertaining to industrial relations; (c) Rational monetary and fiscal measures to create incentives in labour and management for achieving higher productivity: relating to productivity and other economic indices needed for presenting the picture of relation between labour productivity and welfare; (e) Provision for education and Research in Productivity techniques; (f) Provision of a common platform for labour, management and experts to come together discuss and present labour productivity and welfare problems to the society so that social attitudes conducive for solving them can be evolved

(4) Social Environment.—Not only labour and management but also other citizens must be educated to understand the importance of productivity and the need to realise it so that a social atmosphere is created in which the concerned parties may harmoniously and ceaselessly work towards higher productivity.

The Philosophy of higher productivity will be of little value and concern to the workers without steadiness in employment and immediate increase in incomes and welfare. Experience shows that the period of transition to industrialisation involves economic difficulties and social strains on account of migration from the rural set up to the urban set up. These difficulties and strains are to be minimised so that they may not come in the way of advancement of productivity and welfare.

THE MAHARASHIRA RAW COTTON (PROCUREMENT, PROCESSION AND MARKETING) ACT, 1971

MAHARASHTRA ORDINANCE No. VIII OF 1972.

Agriculture and Co-operation Department

Sachivalaya, Bombay, dated 7th June 1972.

An ordinance to amend the Maharashtra Raw Cotton (Procurement, ocessing) Act, 1971.

Whereas, both Houses of the Legislature of the State of Maharashtra are not in

And whereas, the Governor of Maharashtra is satisfied that circumstances exist render it necessary for him to take immediate action for amending the Mahara kee Cotton (Procurement, Processing and Marketing) Act, 1971 (Mah. XLVII) of 1971 the purposes hereinafter appearing;

And whereas, the instructions of the President under the proviso to clause (1) of the Constitution of India have been obtained;

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by clause (1) of Article 2₁₃ Constitution of India, the Governor of Maharashtra is hereby pleased to make and gate the following Ordinance, namely:—

- 1. Shart title and commencement.—(1) This Ordinance may be called the Mahara Raw Cotton (Procurement, Processing and Marketing) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1979.
- (2) It shall come into force at once.
- 2. Amendment of section 4 of Mah. XLVII of 1971.—In section 4 of the Maharash Raw Cotton (Procurement, Processing and Marketing) Act, 1971 (Mah. XLVII of 1971) (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act "), in sub-section (1),—
 - (a) after clause (b), the following clause shall be inserted, namely:—
 - " (bb) the Registrar, ex-officio
- (b) in clause (h), for the words, "the Managing Director," the words "the Chairman shall be substituted;
- (c) in clause (p), after the words "East India Cotton Association" the letters "Lid shall be inserted.
- 3. Insertion of section 21.4 in Mah, XLVII of 1971.—After section 21 of the principal Act, the following section shall be inserted, namely:—
- "21A. Duty of every market committee to designate and maintain sufficient collection centres at convenient places.—(1) Notwithstanding anything contained in the Maharashin Agricultural Produce Marketing (Regulation) Act, 1963, it shall be the duty of every market committee to designate and maintain one or more convenient places as may be found not sary, for tendering kapas, by the growers and other persons holding stocks thereof.
- (2) If after making such inquiry as he deems fit, the Director of Marketing is satisfied that any collection centre designated by any market committee is not convenient to the growers and other persons who wish to tender kapas or that no collection centre designated by it or the collection centre designated by it is not sufficient for the needs of the locality, he may be order direct the market committee to designate and maintain such place or places as may be specified by him as the collection centre or centres, and the market committee shall comply with such direction.

(3) If the Director of Marketing is satisfied, on a complaint or otherwise, that any on issued by him under sub-section (2) is not complied with by the market committee within a reasonable period, he may, after giving a notice of at least 15 days and giving onable opportunity to the market committee of being heard, by order fix a period for a reasonable with the direction and communicate such order to the market committee.

If the direction is not complied with within the period so fixed, the Director of wheting may appoint some person to comply with the direction and may order that the ense for such compliance with a reasonable remuneration to the person so appointed, shall be paid from time to time by the market committee from its Market Fund. Any son payable shall be deemed to be a sums due to the State Government and shall be recoverable as arrears of land revenue.

Amendment of section 22 of Mah. XLVII of 1971.—In section 22 of the principal Act, the portion beginning with the words "In accordance with" and ending with the words of the market committee, the words in accordance with the provision of the rules made this behalf, "shall be substituted.

Amendment of section 62 of Mah. XLVII of 1971.—In section 26 of the principal Act, the words "the market committee" the words "or through any co-operative society person authorised by the State Government in this behalf" shall be inserted.

Amendment of section 27 of Mah. XLVII of 1971.—For section 27 of the principal Act, he following section shall be substituted, namely

"27. Deduction to be made from the advance price for dues of co-operative societies and market committee.—The market committee or the authorised co-operative society or person, as the case may be, may deduct from the advance price to be paid to a tenderer of kapas any sums due to any co-operative society, or any dues, which the market committee is authorised to deduct by or under the Maharashtra Agricultural Produce Marketing (Regulation) Act, 1963 (Mah. XX of 1964), in respect of any notified produce, to such extent and in such manner as may be laid down in that Act, and pay the balance to the tenderers:

Provided that, the deductions may be made in such instalments as may be deemed fit, keeping in view the quantity of kapas the person concerned is likely to tender from time to time in future."

- 7. Amendment of section 33 of Mah. XLVII of 1971.—In section 33 of the principal Act, in sub-section (2), for the words, "of rupees one crore as an initial contribution to the Fund" the words "of an initial contribution of rupees one crore and of such further contributions to the Fund as may be required from time to time," shall be substituted.
- 8. Amendment of section 38 of Mah. XLVII of 1971.—For section 38 of the principal Act, the following section shall be substituted, namely:—
- "38. Disputes regarding baled cotton sold by Government to be referred to the East India Cotton Association Ltd. and its decision to be final.—(1) Notwithstanding anything contained in any law for the time being in force, when ginned cotton pressed into bales is sold by or on behalf of the State Government to any person, and there is a dispute between the seller and the buyer, regarding the quality of the goods sold or regarding price or delivery of such goods or regarding any other matter connected with the sale, the dispute, unless resolved by settlement between the parties, may be referred to the East India Cotton Association Ltd. (hereinafter in this section referred to as "the Assocation"), by any of the parties to the dispute.
- (2) Where any such dispute is referred to the Association under the last preceding subsection, it shall be deemed to be submitted to arbitration of the Association and shall be decided in accordance with the provision of its Bye-laws. The award made or decision

given by the authority appointed under the Bye-laws of the Association to dispute shall be communicated to the parties concerned, and they shall have one or more appeals or provided in the Bye-laws of the Association.

- (3) The fees payable for surveys, arbitrations and appeals and the costs whe awarded and the period of limitation for referring to arbitration and appeals shall be in accordance with the provisions of the Bye-laws of the
- (4) Any award made or decision given by the authority appointed to decide subject to an appeal or appeals as provided in the Bye-laws of the Association an appeal is filed, the decision of the appellate authority concerned, shall binding on the parties concerned."
- 9. Amendment of section 42 of Mah. XLVII of 1971.—In section 42 of the principles for sub-section (2), the following sub-section shall be substituted, namely
- "(2) (a) The State Government may for the purpose of purchasing, selling processing, marketing and carrying of other business in cotton on its behalf agents for the whole State or any specified area, and any such agent may be more than one such area.
- (b) Any agent so appointed, if specially authorised by the State Governments behalf, shall be entitled to pledge, mortgage or otherwise dispose of all of stocks of cotton for the time being in his possession as such agent, for the purpose of ing any minies by way of loans or advances required by the agent for carrying on business in cotton, and any person, in whose favour any such pledge, mortgage or possal is effected, shall have by reason of such pledge, mortgage or disposal, the same as he would have had if the agent were the owner of the stocks of cotton so pledged, any gaged or disposed of, as the case may be.
- (c) The terms and conditions of appointment of agents shall be such as may be muhal agreed upon but ween the State Government and the agent concerned."

STATEMENT

The Mitharashtra Raw Cotton (Procurement, Processing and Marketing) Act, 1971, enacted in December 1971. The next cotton season begins on the 1st July 1972, ment has decided to bring into operation the scheme of monopoly procurement, process, and marketing of cotton as envisaged in the Act from the next cotton season, but has one across some major difficulties in the matter of implementation of the scheme effectively, remove these difficulties and to facilitate implementation of the scheme effectively, it is considered necessary to make certain amendments in the Act immediately.

- 2. Under sections 20 and 21 of the Act, there is an obligation on growers and other holders of cotton to tender it at a collection centre. To avoid any incor venience, it is necessary to east a statutory duty on the market committees to designate and maintain sufficient collection centres at convenient places.
- 3. Section 38 provides for referring disputes regarding baled cotton sold by Governmento authorities constituted for that purpose. Instead of constituting new authorities, it a considered more appropriate to refer them to a well established authority like the East Indu Cotton Association Limited.
- 4. Section 42(2) provides for appointment of agents. Government has decided that the Maharashtra State Co-operative Marketing Federation Limited should be appointed at the Chief Agent for the purpose of purchasing, selling, storing, processing, marketing and cattying on other business in cotton on behalf of Government. The Reserve Bank of India has agreed to teaction credit limits required by the Federation this purpose, through the

harashtra State Co-operative Bank Limited. With a view to ensuring the integrated of the co-operative movement and to enable the Chief Agent to raise the necessary by way of loans or advances, it is necessary to amend this section.

- Amendments to certain other sections are required to be carried out simultaneously.
- 6. As both Houses of the State Legislature are not in session and it is necessary to take make the formulate action for amending the Act for the purposes aforesaid in good time before the cotton season begins, this Ordinance is promulgated.

The number of wage affected and time loss due to strike activity in Maharashtra State during the month of March 1971, has been decreased as compared to the previous month.

The figures for the month under review show 91 disputes in progress involving 27,967 workers and a time loss of man-days 2 04,311 as compared to 85 disputes in February 1971 with 33,651 workers affected and time loss 2,39,088 of man-days.

Seventeen of the total disputes in progress during March 1971 were in the Textile industry 31 in the Engineering Industry and the remaining 43 were in other industries, 66 of the total disputes involving 15,923 workers were actually recorded during the month while 25 disputes involving 12044 workers were carried over from the previous month.

"The word "diputes" in the official sense means interruption of work and it is hereby used in that sense as virtually synonymous with "strike". In compiling statistics of the industrial diputes, however, disputes in which 10 or more perons are involved are included

Thirty-Five of the total disputes arose over questions of "pay allowances and bonus issues" 37 related to "retrenchment and grievances about personnel" 2 on leave and hours of work and the remaining 17 were due to "other causes.".

Out of the 68 disputes that terminated 34 during the course of the month 22 were settled either entirely or partially in favour of the workers in favour of the employers while the result of the remaining 12 disputes were indefinite.

1. Jalen Dycing and Bleaching Mills, Bombay—

The total complement of 852 workers employed in the Jalen Dyeing and bleaching Mills, Bombay went on strike from February 11, 1972 domanding permanency. The strike ended in unsuccessful on March 10, 1972. This strike continued for 25 days causing 21, 300 man-days lost.

2. The Century Spinning and Manufacturing Co. Ltd., Thana-

Out of the total complement of 160 workers working in the Century Spinning and Manufacturing Co. Ltd., Thana, 46 workers went on strike from January 12, 1972 protesting against charge-sheet given to a worker. Due to this strike 110 workers were indirectly affected. This strike lasted for 54 days and ended unsuccessfully. Due to this strike 3,955 man-days were lost.

3. Noble Paint and Varnish Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay—

Out of the total complement of 234 workers employed in the Noble Paint and Varnish Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay, struck work from January 4, 1972 protesting against the management for being partial to a worker allowing him to continue in the same shift. The strike continued till the end of March 1972 without any material change.

4. Crompton Greaves Ltd., Worli, Bombay-

The total complement of 757 workers employed in the Crompton Greaves Ltd., Worli, Bombay, went on strike from January 28, 1972, demanding higher quantum of bonus for the year 1970-71. The strike continued till the end of March 1972 without any material change.

Thana

5. Kiran Spinning Mills, Thana -

All 1,671 workers employed in the Kiran Spinning Mills, Thana, went on strike from February 20, 1972 due to quarrelling and assaulting between two groups of the workers. The management locked out the company on the same day, consequent upon the police firing, etc. The strike lasted for 15 days and ended on March 8, 1971. The management of the Company lifted the lock-out on March 8, 1972 as the negotiations took place in the office of the Commissioner of Labour and Director of Employment, Bombay and the strike was discontinued partially successful. Due to this strike 24,306 man-days were lost.

6. Strike of Kotwals in Maharashtra State -

The strike of 6,129 Kotwals out of total complement of 41,634 began from 10th February 1972 demanding revised pay scales and other facilities on par with Government employees. This strike lasted for 24 days and ended on March 8, 1972 unsuccessfully. Due to this strike 1,47,096 man-days were lost.

WHERE EXCLUSION

The statistics of absenteeism in the Textile Industry in the State of Maharashtra are compiled from the mills at seven important Textile Centres in State viz., Bombay city, Sholapur, Nagpur, Jalgaon, Akola, Aurangabad and Nanded.

Returns were received from 67 Mills i.e. 84.81 per cent. 79 of the Mills reported as working at these Centres during April 1972. The average absenteeism in the Textile Industry in these centres amounted to 18.35 per cent. as against 19.65 per cent in the previous month.
