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

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The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the month of December 1976 with the average price for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 300, 318 and 295 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Pune and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of October 1976 with the average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 294, 312, 285 and 313 respectively.

Industrial Disputes

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During October 1976 there were 76 strikes involving 91,635 workmen and a time-loss of 207,017 working days, as compared to 22 disputes in September 1976 involving 4,083 workmen and time-loss of 19,309 man-days. Further particulars of industrial disputes are given at pages 580 and 581 of this issue.

Bonus formula under study to end injustice

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Prime Minister Indira Gandhi declared here today that the Bonus Formula would be suitably amended to remove the injustice done to the working class in the country by linking bonus with productivity.

She said official committees were busy examining proposals on the question. A new bonus formula had been evolved for workers in the steel industry and the Government would study it in detail to see whether the same could be made applicable in respect of all industrial workers, she added.

Addressing a mammoth rally at Shivaji Park on December 11, soon after her arrival from Pune, Smt. Gandhi said the financial position of industrial units would be examined to prevent employers from depriving the workers of their legitimate dues in the form of bonus though they made profit. Referring to a statement made earlier by BPCC and RMMS President Rajni Patel, who presided over the rally, the Prime Minister said she was aware of the hardships faced by workers who had contributed to increase in production during the period of emergency.

She said there were complaints from the working class that some of the industrial units did not maintain proper accounts and always showed losses. Such cases should be looked into and injustice against the working class should be removed. The bonus formula evolved earlier compelling all units, irrespective of profit or loss, to pay minimum bonus had its own shortcomings. However, where an industry made profit, the workers should be the primary beneficiaries, she said.

Referring to Mr. Rajni Patel's remarks that prices of certain commodities were showing upward trend creating an atmosphere of discontent among the people, the Prime Minister admitted there was indeed such a trend in respect of a few essential commodities and stressed the need for some mechanism to prevent it.

She said that the Centre has directed the State Governments to take stern action against petty officials who took advantage of emergency conditions to harass the common people. People should bring instances of misconduct even on the part of Congressmen to the President of the PCCs. "People should not tolerate any form of misuse of power", she said.

She appealed to people to maintain unity and fight disruptive forces as the danger from alien forces was still not over.

Welcoming the Prime Minister on behalf of the working class of Bombay, Mr. Rajni Patel said that the working people acknowledged the historic fact that "she is the saviour of the nation at a critical moment and is a symbol of national unity".

Mr. Patel said that despite the measures taken by the Centre to contain inflation, prices of essential commodities were going up and unrest among the people was mounting. But the working class was confident that the Prime Minister would find a just solution to their problems.

ntre to contai rest among by that the Prior Mr. Patel cited the instance of an industrial undertaking making a profit of over five crore rupees but denying bonus to its workers. The RMMS had already demanded amendment to the Bonus Act on the basis of lining bonus payment with productivity.

He was happy over the announcement of the Prime Minister at Pune in this connection and said that the Bonus Act should be amended to increase the quantum of allocable surplus to workers.

Chief Minister S. B. Chavan said that as a result of power cut the State had been suffering loss in production to the tune of one crore rupees. However, the working class had maintained optimum production. He urged the Prime Minister to speed up clearance of the power projects proposed in the State. He also urged the Prime Minister to consider the State's plea for setting up turbine stations for using the natural gas generated at the Bombay High.

Mr. Vasant Hoshing, President of the Maharashtra INTUC also spoke. The rally was jointly organised by the BPCC and the INTUC, Mr. P. K. Sawant president of the MPCC, were among those present.

Shri G. Ramanujam, General Secretary of the INTUC, in a statement issued from Kerala, was happy over the announcement of the Prime Minister.

P. F. Act to cover Construction Workers

The Government is proposing to extend the coverage of the Employees, Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 to establishments of engineers, , engineering contractors and other contractors engaged in building and construction industry and employing 20 or more persons.

At present the Employees Fund Act applies only to engineers and engineering contractors and does not cover establishments which are engaged in building and constructions industry. The question of extending the scope of this category has been under consideration for some time.

The Associations of contractors in the two metropolitan cities of Delhi and Bombay when consulted some time in 1970, opposed the proposal on the grounds of seasonal nature of occupation of a high proportion of workers and their frequent migration from one employer to another.

The incidence of immigration is found only among the lower grade employees in individual building construction and the union Ministry of Labour is of the view that to extend the scope of the Act to a large number of establishments of engineers, engineering contractors and building and construction employing regular employees along with other labourers through Jamadars and petty contractors. The intention is to extend the coverage of the Act to establishments who employ 20 or more persons and thus extend some social Security measures to these categories of workers who do not enjoy any alternative benefit under any law.

Wages in T. N. Magnasite Mines revised

The Central Government have, by an Order Issued on December 4, regu the Wages and Dearness Allowance, in respect of different categories of wor

According to the order :

(i) The minimum basic daily wage of unskilled workers, who are at pr drawing less than Rs. 2.60 shall be brought up to Rs. 2.60.

(*ii*) Out of the variable dearness allowance of 145.68 per month or Rs. per day, which the unskilled workers are drawing at present, an amount Rs. 4.40 per day shall be added to the daily-wage, making the new minimum basic wage of an unskilled worker Rs. 7 per day.

(iii) On similar lines as at (i) and (ii) above, the basic daily wage of s skilled and skilled I, II and III workers will first be brought up to the l of the category-wise ' highest ' starting level and to this shall be added Rs. per day (same variable dearness allowance is available to all workers in category) to arrive at the new daily basic wage payable to them. The minimum basic wages of semi-skilled, skilled III, II and I workers shall be Rs. 7.43, Rs. 7.96, Rs. 8.16 and Rs. 8.44 per day, respectively.

(*iv*) Rs. 114.40 per month from the present variable dearness allow of Rs. 145.68 per month shall be merged into the basic wage and the rema amount of Rs. 31.28 per month (that is Rs. 1.20 per day) will be treat fixed dearness allowance for all categories of workers and will not be aff by changes in the Cost of Living Index.

(v) In addition, a sum of Rs. 39 per month (that is Rs. 1.50 per da the daily rated workers on the basis of 26 working days) shall be allow variable dearness allowance. The companies referred to in this Order change over from Madras cost of living index base 1936=100 to the All Consumer Price Index (1960=100). The revision of dearness allow shall be quarterly as against the existing practice of monthly adjustr and also future adjustments of the dearness allowance shall be at the ra Rs. 1.30 per point on All India Index. The quarterly average to be add would be on the basis of the average of the Consumer Price Index Nu for the months of December 1975, January 1976 and February 1976, v average works out to 298, for the quarter beginning with 1st April Increases or decreases for the subsequent quaters would be at Rs. 1. per point. If the quarterly average Consumer Price Index drops to 26 variable dearness allowance shall drop to nil and the worker will receiv basic pay at the minimum of Rs. 7 and fixed dearness allowance of Rs. 1 per day.

(vi) The pay scales of all categories of workers would be restruct maintaining the existing inter-se differences both in the daily basic rate well as in the pay scales. The detailed restructuring including incremental as well as the length of pay scales shall be locally settled on a uniform for all the three companies. This Order shall not upset any other sp arrangements that may be in vogue in any of the companies referred to h which are more advantageous to the workmen.

(viii) Where, in respect of any period on and from the lst day of April 1976. and the date of publication of this Order in the Official Gazette, any worker to whom this order applies was paid wages and dearness allowance at rate lower than the rates to which he would have been entitled to were this Order in force on and from that date, he shall be paid forthwith, in relation to the period aforesaid, the difference between the wages and dearness allowance actually paid to him and the wages and dearness allowance to which he would have been entitled to were this Order in force on and from the 1st day of April, 1976, and such payment shall be in addition to the amount he would otherwise be entitled to under this Order.

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Swedes lead trend to Industrial Democracy

Traditional principles of massproduction held that workers should have no part in planning their own work, but instead be assigned simple, repetitive tasks which they had to carry out exactly as they were told.

Recent sociological studies have shown, however, that this system has many drawbacks, producing apathy, absenteeism and shopfloor tension, and that making workers' jobs more responsible, varied and productive pays off in decreased sickness rates and labour turnover.

Even so, most industry today follows traditional paths. ' But experiments are being carried out to help make work more human, especially in Sweden, where job reform has probably gone further than anywhere else in the western industrialised world.

A new Swedish law on industrial democracy will give all workers in public or private enterprises the right to a say in a range of areas that used to be the employers' sole preserve; the direction and allocation of work, work studies, working methods and equipment, and personnel policies such as transfers, promotions, dismissals and disciplinary action.

The new law will only come into force on January 1, 1977-yet there are many companies in Sweden which will be virtually unaffected because they have already voluntarily granted their workers most of the new rights included in the law. More than 500 Swedish companies, including some of the very biggest have been conducting experiments in "job reform", which has two main components; giving the worker more control over his work, and enriching it at the same time.

One of the Swedish firms that has progressed furthest in this direction is Saab-Scania which started the process at its truck division at Sodertalje in 1969. The several years of experience here show where many Swedish firms will be going after the new law becomes effective and offers a hopeful model for other countries to follow.

Staving off boredom

A plethora of joint worker/management groups and committees ensures that the workers have a considerable measure of control over their work and its environment. Most of the factory workers at Sodertalje are organised into 165 separate production groups. These are the basic work units of 5 to 15

members, all engaged in related or adjacent tasks. As long as it meets quality and productivity targets, the group is free to divide up its own work in any way it likes.

Many groups have used this freedom to enrich their own jobs by increasing the number of tasks a worker carries out to lengthen the "cycle time" within which he completes his operation ; the bordom of repetition is staved off. This is job enlargement. Or, the group may decide to swap jobs every so of ten to prevent the individual worker from becoming mechanised into a single simple movement. This is known as job rotation.

Groups at Sodertalje have chosen both methods. In the petrol engine factory, for example, the women engine assemblers decided that each one would assemble an entire engine—a sequence of around 200 separate operations taking half an hour. In the chassis works, the group assembling axles decided to rotate jobs twice a month, with the exception of one elderly worker with heart trouble who is allowed to stick to the most comfortable job.

How it works

Two or three of these production groups make up a development group, comprising three or four experinenced workers, plus their foreman and a works study man. They meet about once a month to disucuss management problems, such as how to meet production targets or handle new products; and problems for workers like how to improve uncomfortable working positions, reduce noise and ease loads.

The development group for gasoline engine assembly, for example, has discussed how to rearrange the working area so that women won't have to use only this right arms to pull down overhead tools, which causes aches and pains.

Above this level, the works council structure starts. Works councils are joint worker/management bodies which were set up in all Swedish firms after a 1948 agreement between the Landsorganisation (LO), the Swedishh trade union confederation, and the Svenska Arbetsgivareforeningen (SAF), the employers' confederation. Following later agreements between the LO and the SAF, the works councils and their subcommittees now deal with a wide range of topics which, in most other countries, concern only management. Among them, rationalisation, increasing productivity, improving job satisfaction, inspecting company finances, safety.

Saab-Scania and their workers have expanded theworks council structure even further. There are joint committees for suggestions, which can award a worker who comes up with a successful idea, upto half the savings it produces in the first year. The personnel committee discusses policy on recruitment, training and promotion, and the blue collar workers have been using it to push for equalisation of privileges with the white collar staff.

In addition to these functional committees there are three collaboration councils for each of the plants and offices at Sodertalje. The main subjects they discuss are improvements in the working environment. Most of the plants, through these councils, have now asked for and got stands selling foods and drinks, coffee break areas with screens of indoor plants and even fountains, small branch libraries and so on. But the councils can also discuss productions topics involving the whole plant, such as new products.

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e collaboration e main subjects Most of the ds selling foods even fountains, ductions Finally ther are reference groups of key workers, foremen, designers and managers, set up whenever a major new product is being planned. A reference group originally devised the whole idea of production and development groups another reference group planned from scratch the new gasoline engine factory at Sodertalje which was specially designed (like Volvo's Kalmar factory) to incorporate the ideas of job reform.

Teething Trouble

There have of course been teething troubles in the spread of democracy at work in Sweden. One of the most difficult transitions faces the foreman, who has to change his role from boss to discussion leader. Some foremen have gone on in their old ways. The opposite danger of anarchy is present too : if foremen abandon all authority, there is no one who can make sure that every-one abides by group decisions. And democracy does of course take up time. Some workers spend ten hours a week or more in meetings of the various groups.

Benefits

The benefits for both sides have been clear cut. Conflicts that arise can now be handled almost immediately through any one of the many channels of co-operation that exist. There have been no strikes since 1964 at Sodertalje. Labour turnover on the chassis line has dropped from 70 per cent in 1969 to 20 per cent in 1975. The company, has prospered and with it the job security and wages of its employees, who now earn between \$195 and \$230 for a 40-hour week.

The Swedish experience makes it clear that reforms of this kind, advocated by the new ILO programme to improve the quality of working life, can offer a great deal to industry everywhere. The workers gain in responsibility and job satisfaction, management gains from lower rates of sickness, absenteeism and labour turnover, and also has access to a previously untapped fund of practical knowledge, since every worker is usually the greatest living expert on his own job.

New Bonus Formula for Steelmen: Industry to Initiate talks with TU The Steel industry is ready with a new formula for computing bonus linkedto production and productivity has initiated discussions with the representatives of steel workers.

It may be recalled that the Prime Minister, Smt. Indira Gandhi while addressing the INTUC led RMMS rally at Bombay earlier this month, had announced that exercises were being conducted in the steel industry for working out a fresh bonus formula.

The discussions at the Steel Consultative level are important because they may set the pace for the evolution of principles on the basis of which this question may be thrashed out in other sectors of industry also.

According to available indications, the proposed formula is based on a two-

With the evolution of a fresh formula on bonus for steel industry, now nearly complete, the Ministry of Steel and Mines may once again become pace setter in resolving a difficult issue causing continuing concern in the recent period in the sphere of the country's industrial relations.

For the steel industry as such, this complex task of working out a practical formula may be easier because of modernisation of management techniques and successful working of the bipartite machinery for over half a decade. Once a carefully considered formula is placed before the Steel Consultative Committee comprising representatives of managements and trade unions, it should be able to resolve whatever differences that may appear on the surface.

Apart from being a pioneer in developing bipartite industrial relations especially in public sector, the Steel industry is now in an enviable position of having registered a record capacity utilisation, averaging 90 percent, with steel plants like Bhilai and Rourkela achieving above 100 percent capacity utilisation during the last six months.

That the Steel Ministry has scotched all talk of reducing production in view of stock piling of steel will be reassuring for workers in that the gains accuring to them in the form of bonus will by and large not be allowed to be undone.

It is understood that the industry has indicated a set base of percentage of capacity utilisation and also of manpower above which the bonus will be computed on the basis of increase in production and productivity. The workers' representatives have been asked to take into account the exercises that have been conducted on this basis.

These exercises at the Steel Ministry level in particular, and in some of the other public sector industries in general, have come to assume special importance in the light of Prime Minister, Smt. Indira Gandhi's recent reference to the fact that a new bonus formula was being worked out. This, as Smt. Gandhi has said, may seek to undo the injustice done to the workers under the formula provided in the Bonus Amendment Act.

It is yet to be seen how the question of those Industrial units is to be resolved over whose capacity underutilisation workers have no control. One suggestion is that the element of productivity for the purpose of computing bonus should come into operation after the concerned unit reaches what is called the "Cut-off" point as percentage of rated capacity and also of manpower utilisation.

These problems may not pose intractable difficulties in the Steel industry where a high degree of labour parcticipation in the management has already been achieved and therefore both sides have come to appreciate each others' approaches.

It may also be mentioned here that in old plants of the steel industry, there used to be annual payment of bonus based on several factor including performance and production, which was in addition to the payment due under law. In TISCO workers were getting bonus since 1939 and IISCO since 1948.

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NAB to Review Bipartite System. G. R. asks Discussion on Productivity Bong The INTUC General Secretary, Shri G. Ramanujam has asked for a discussio on bonus linked to production in lieu of profit sharing bonus in the meetin of the National Apex Body (NAB), scheduled to be held tomorrow (December 28).

If the item on bonus, as suggested by Shri Ramanujam is taken up for dis cussion, the representatives of both the sides in the bipartite body will have t take into account the announcement of the Prime Minister on the bonu issue, in the recent INTUC rally at Bombay, giving an indication that effort are underway at the official level to evolve a new formula on bonus which wi seek to undo the injustice done to workers under the amended bonus Act.

In a communication to the Union Labour Minister last month, Shri Ramanu jam had in this context said: "If productivity bonus agreements are possibl under the Act, it should not be negatived by unjustified interpretation as if th employers both in the private and public sector are keen in denying bonu under one pretex or another."

The communication further adds: "Workers who have contributed to increase ed production/productivity have a right to their share in the gains of such increased sed production/productivity, and they should not be denied such rights simple because they first increased production/productivity and then asked for a share in it.

The NAB, which is meeting for the eleventh time with 15 items on its agenda is also scheduled to review its performance since its inception and the outcom of its decisions in its nine meetings held earlier. On the basis of the data or industrial relations and the effectiveness of the NAB and the National Industria Committees, the meeting will be taking stock of the efficiency of the bipartite industrial relations system that had come into being at the national, industria and state levels after the promulgation of emergency.

INTUC President urged P.M. for early revision of Bonus Formula.

The INTUC Working Committee, by a resolution, had expessed its dis appointment over the performance of these bipartites and has urged the Govern ment to accord legal sanction to the decisions of the NAB.

The two left-over items of its last meeting viz, the memorandum on absenteeism submitted by the Employer's Federation of India and the recognition of unions under the code of discipline are also likely to be taken up for dis cussion.

Government's Say in Company Management

The Union Minister for industry, Shri T. A. Pai, announced here or December 20 that the Government was contemplating amendment of the Industries (Development and Regulation) Act, 1951, so as to empower it to issue directions requiring a company owning an industrial undertaking to remove from office incompetent or dishonest chairman of its board of directors managing or whole-time director or manager and to appoint with the approvaof the Union Government any person in place of persons so removed.

Delivering the foundation day lecture of the Administrative Staff College of India on "Industrial development—our strategy". Shri Pai said it was also

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proposed that the Centre should have powers to issue such direction as in the opinion of the Government might be necessary to ensure proper and efficient management of the industrial undertaking or to prevent misapplication of its funds.

These steps, he said, were necessary to protect the interests of small shareholders and give them confidence that their investments were safe.

Earlier, Shri Pai said that since the coming into effect of the Industries (Development and Regulations) Act in 1951, the industrial structure of the country had witnessed a great deal of diversification in range and a degree of sophistication, a substantial broadening of the industrial base, an enormous expansion in magnitude as witnessed by the growth in basic metals and chemicals, heavy and light engineering and petrochemical and electronic industries.

However, in the course of implementation of the provisions of the Act over the years, a number of anomalies had crept in which would have to be rectified.

A major problem before the Government was in regard to sick industrial units and the measures to be taken for their reconstruction and rehabilitation.

It was, therefore, necessary, Shri Pai said, to tone up the management in respect of units likely to become "sick" and it would also be necessary to remove executives, managers and functional directors in cases where infficiency or misapplication of funds had led the units into a stage of sickness.

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C. M. assures revision of Farm Labour Wages

An early revision of the wages of agricultural workers in the State on the basis of the recommendation of Page Committee's Report was assured by Shri S. B. Chavan, Chief Minister of Maharashtra when a delegation of the State INTUC called on him on December 17.

The delegation, led by Shri S. W. Dhabe, M. P., General Secretary of the Indian National Rural Labour Federation, comprised Sarvashri G. M. Khode, Vice-President of the State INTUC, H. N. Trivedi, M.L.A. and Treasurer, M. M. Deshman, Working President, Nagpur Corporation Employees Federation, D. N. Lambat Rashtriya Mill Mazdoor Sangh, Nagpur, J. P. Apte, Secretary, National Co-ordination Council and Ghaneshyn Melag, Secretary, Ordinance Factories Karmachari Sangh, Ambazari.

The delegation pointed out that one of the important items in the Prime Minister's 20-Point Programme was the enhancement of the minimum wages of farm labourers and that though majority of the States had revised the rates, the wages of Rs. 3 to 4, fixed in 1974, was still being continued. The delegation pleaded for at least Rs. 5 a day.

Unrecognised Unions

The deputationists also brought to the notice of the Chief Minister that against the Code of discipline for trade unions and principles of collective bargaining, unrecognised unions were allowed to hold meetings and collect subscriptions and also to negotiate with the managements of public sector undertakings, jeopardising industrial peace. They also complained that the police authorities

The Chief Minister assured that elements hampering the activities of recognised unions would be dealt with and that the police would be instructed to respect the rights of recognised unions.

The deputation submitted a memorandum urging the Government to evolv e a new housing policy to enable the workers and Government employees to become owners of the houses they occupy, revision of the wages of the employees of local bodies fixed in 1964 and opening of fair price shops in establishments with more than 300 employees, the introduction of workers' participation in management and representation to the workers in the District Committees for the implementation of the new economic programme.

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Workers' Participation in Management

According to a national survey conducted by Samachar two and a half million industrial workers have been covered under the centres' voluntary scheme of workers' participation in management in the country.

The States in which the scheme has been effectively implementd are Bibar, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Punjab, Karnataka, Haryana and Tamil Nadu. The position attained in some of the States is as follows :

ILO Tripartite Meeting Calls for Stabilisation of Plantation Product Prices The stabilisation of world prices for plantation products-such as coffee, cocoa, tea, sugar, cotton and rubber—is needed to improve living conditions for millions of workers, the International Labour Organisation's Committee on Work on Plantations declared when it met in Geneva (8-16 December.)

Delegates from the governments and employers' and workers' organisations, of 23 developing countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America took part in the meeting under the chairmanship of Dr. N. A. Agha, representative of India on the Governing Body of the International Labour Office.

In a unanimous resolution, the meeting asked the ILO to collaborate at every level with the United Nations specialised agencies concerned with problems of trade and economic development, so as to attain the objective of

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stabilisation. This should guarantee among other things greater emplyoment creation in the plantation sector and therefore a reduction of unemployment; technological development oriented towards the modernisation of the structure of plantations' production; the development of co-operatives ; and the creation and development of infrastructures for the education, hygience and social protection of plantation workers.

Agrarian reform and multinationals

In another resolution the Committee stressed its interest in the social aspects of agrarian reform, especially regarding full employment and freedom of association.

It also noted a recent decision by the ILO Government Body concerning the preparation of a declaration of principles on multinational enterprises and social policies due to be submitted to a triparatite advisory meeting next April.

The Committee asked in a resolution that the question of multinational enterprises should be placed on the agenda of the 1979 International Labour Conference.

The great majority of the employers' group could not support this resolution mainly because they felt that the question of Conference agendas was outside the competence of the Committee.

A unanimous resolution called for priority study by the ILO of training and retraining, the establishment of effective labour inspection on plantations; problems of working environment in plantations resulting from mechanisation and the use of chemical products; the problems of temporary and seasonal workers, including migrant workers; and partial unemployment, its causes and consequences.

Trade union rights and welfare

The committee considered that governments should, by legislation or any other appropriate measures, guarantee respect for the free exercise of trade union rights on plantations.

They should encourage the formation and development of independent workers' and employers' organisations, and should give special attention to collective bargaining, which should be regarded as a means for improving plantation worker's working and living conditions.

The Committee also underlined the need for programmes designed to improve the living conditions of workers and their families. It noted that some progress had been made in this regard.

Although the provision of housing for plantation workers should be the responsibility of national or local authorities, employers should provide housing when the nature of the plantation obliges the workers to live on the estate. The provision of housing, medical and welfare facilities by a particular plantation should in no way be regarded as a substitute for the payment of a fair salary, nor prejudice the basic rights of workers.

MANAGEMENT, MAN-POWER AND PERSONNEL MAN

N. K. VADHER*

In India, within the years of late, a rapid industrial development has made the greatest contribution to reach the economic target of the national growth. It industries, the words planning, execution, control and employee have take scientific meanings. More and more employment chances have been arising in Private and Public Sectors. Yet, to bring up a beautiful picture of the growth attitudes of managements right from the small-size industries have to be turned up towards man-management. Being a Personnel man my thoughts are central lized on "employees" and hence in this article I have tried to bring our characteristics of man-management in an industrial organization.

The both, manufacture and employees being vital important and inter-relate for the economic performance, the activities of an industrial organization hav mainly divided into two parts; Production and man-management. It is the sheer requirement of any industrial management to strike and maintain proper balance of the both to acquire speedy and steady growth of an organization.

Basically, no organization can run without employees and will not rise and set-up tall unless it has backing of effective and concious efforts of employee to improve continuously the standard of productivity. It is the employees whos ideas of minds, utilization of time and energy in meaningful work, bring up a healthy organization. In short, employees are not only essential and inveritable part of production but also an asset on organization. Economic growth o an organization through maximum productivity cannot attain until employee at work are taken proper care. It has experimentally proved that investmen in employees is as much necessary as in the plant and machinery. The invest ment can be practically made by strengthening Personnel structure through an effective system of reasonably satisfying their social and ego needs i.e. paying them fair wages. solving their personal and employment problems quickly giving them fullest opportunities to use their skills and endowmets, offering them respect, encouragement, esteem and employment safety, providing them satisfying working carriers etc.

As a result of the investment in employees the reasonably normal employed group will work in two ways. First, they will continuously add up their contributions towards maximum productivity and second they will learn a new to proceed towards self-actualization, which is, the supreme value in human life There exists a genuine potential for a linkage of self-actualization of an employed

with organization goals. The possibilities of such a linkage are not equal for every one but they are always present to some extent. Therefore management planning should take into account the investment, to lead both a better society and a more effective organization in mere economic terms.

Thus, the Personnel min became essential part of the structure. He has the responsibility of selecting and retaining employees. His cosmology has a direct effect on Personnel dealings. There exists an unseen amount of power around each person. The power is reality of the Person, which has a linkage with cosmology. For, first of all the Personnel min should be of colourful personality, practical, realistic and should have detailed knowledge of human nature, human needs and human motivations. He has to follow up a long term plan for the investment in employees, which should go along with size and structure of an organization. Recruitment, man-power-planning, welfare activities, implementation of labour legislations applicable to an organization etc., claim for vast practical experience, and presence of mind. Following up this plan his place is between minagement and employees whereupon he has to wholetime modify, rectify or re-adjust the actions and re-actions respectively by management and employees at right places directing them towards the both an organizational and individuals goals. And this is the fulfilment of his role.

However, an employee group at all not responding to the systems of the investment in employees, have to be dealt with appropriately otherwise this will affect to the whole organization negatively.

At last, we shall be able to muintain correct balance of economic performance and man-management, when true meaning of the Personnel management, importance and necessity of the Personnel Department and real value of the Personnel man are positively understood by managements, and if so, the rest will be solvely undertken by the Personnel men to add up their contributions unto the national Economic growth.



2. Amendment of section 2.—In section 2 of the Factories Act, 19 (63 of 1948), (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act),—

(1) in clause (k),—

(a) for sub-clause (ii), the following sub-clause shall be substitute namely :--

"(ii) pumping oil, water, sewage or any other substance; or ";

(b) in sub-clause (iv) and sub-clause (v), the word " or " shall be insert at the end;

(c) after sub-clause (v), the following sub-clause shall be inserted namely :—

"(vi) preserving or storing any article in cold storage;"

(2) in clause (l),—

(a) for the words "employed, directly or through any agency, wheth for wages or not", the words and brackets "employed, directly or or through any agency (including a contractor) with or without t knowledge of the principal employer, whether for remuneration or no shall be substituted;

(b) the following words shall be inserted at the end, namely :---

"but does not include any member of the armed forces of a Union;"

(3) in clause (m),—

(a) in the concluding paragraph, for the words "a railway runni shed", the words "a mobile unit belonging to the armed forces of Union, a railway running shed or a hotel, restaurant or eating place shall be substituted;

(b) the following Explanation shall be inserted at the end, namely :-

"Explanation.—For computing the number of workers for purposes of this clause all the workers in different relays in a day sh

be taken into account ;"

(4) in clause (n), the following proviso shall be inserted at the enamely :

"Provided that in the case of a ship which is being repaired, or which maintenance work is being carried out, in a dry dock which available for hire,—

(1) the owner of the dock shall be deemed to be the occupier the purposes of any matter provided for by or under—

(a) section 6, section 7, section 11 or section 12;

(b) section 17, in so far as it relates to the providing a maintenance of sufficient and suitable lighting in or around dock;

(c) section 18, section 19, section 42, section 46, section 47 section 49, in relation to the workers employed on such repair maintenance;

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(2) the owner of the ship or his agent or master or other officerin-charge of the ship or any person who contracts with such owner agent or master or other officer-in-charge to carry out the repair or maintenance work shall be deemed to be the occupier for the purposes of any matter provided for by or under section 13, section 14, section 16 or section 17 (save as otherwise provided in this proviso) or Chapter IV (except section 27) or section 43, section 44 or section 45, Chapter VI, Chapter VII, Chapter VIII or Chapter IX or section 108, section 109 or section 110, in relation to—

(a) the workers employed directly by him, or by or through any agency; and

(b) the machinery, plant or premises in use for the purpose of carrying out such repair or maintenance work by such owner, agent, master or other officer-in-charge or person ;".

3. Amendment of section 5.—In section 5 of the principal Act, the following Explanation shall be inserted at the end, namely :—

'*Explanation.*—For the purposes of this section "public emergency" means a grave emergency whereby the security of India or of any part of the territory thereof is threatened, whether by war or external aggression internal disturbance.'.

4. Amendment of section 6.—In section 6 of the principal Act,—

(a) clause (a) of sub-section (1) shall be re-lettered as clause (aa), and before the clause as so re-lettered, the following clause shall be inserted, namely :---

"(2A) The State Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint as many Additional Chief Inspectors, Joint Chief Inspectors and Deputy Chief Inspectors and as many other officers as it thinks

fit to assist the Chief Inspector and to exercise such of the powers of the Chief Inspector as may be specified in such notification.

(2B) Every Additional Chief Inspector, Joint Chief Inspector, Deputy Chief Inspector and every other officer appointed under sub-section (2A)shall, in addition to the powers of a Chief Inspector specified in the notification by which he is appointed, exercise the powers of an Inspector throughout the State.";

(b) in sub-section (3), after the word, brackets and figure 'sub-section (2)", the word, brackets, figure and letter "sub-section (2A)" shall be inserted;

(c) in sub-section (7), for the words "Every Chief Inspector and Inspector" the words "Every Chief Inspector, Additional Chief Inspector, Joint Chief Inspector, Deputy Chief Inspector, Inspector and every other officer appointed under this section" shall be substituted.

7. Amendment of section 10.— In section 10 of the principal Act, in subsection (3), the following proviso shall be inserted at the end, namely :—

"Provided that the State Government may, by order in writing and subject to such conditions as may be specified in the order, exempt any person or class of persons from the provisions of this sub-section in respect of any factory or class or description of factories.".

8. Amendment of section 11.- In section 11 of the principal Act,-

(1) in sub-section (1), in clause (d),-

(a) in sub-clause (i), for the word "painted", the words "painted otherwise than with washable water-paint" shall be substituted;

(b) after sub-clause (i), the following sub-clause shall be inserted namely :---

"(*ia*) where they are painted with washable water paint, be repainted with at least one coat of such paint at least once in every period of three years and washed at least once in every period of six months;";

"Provided that for the purpose of determining whether any part of machinery is in such position or is of such construction as to be safe as aforesaid, account shall not be taken of any occasion when-

(i) it is necessary to make an examination of any part of the machinery aforesaid while it is in motion or, as a result of such examination, to carry out lubrication or other adjusting operation while the machinery is in motion, being an examination or operation which it is necessary to be carried out while that part of the machinery is in motion, or

(ii) in the case of any part of a transmission machinery used in such process as may be prescribed (being a process of a continuous nature the carrying on of which shall be, or is likely to be substantially interfered with by the stoppage of that part of the machinery), it is necessary to make an examination of such part of the machinery while it is in motion or, as a result of such examination, to carry out any mounting or shipping of belts or lubrication or other adjusting operation while the machinery is in motion-

and such examination or operation is made or carried out in accordance with the provisions of sub-section (1) of section 22.".

11. Amendment of section 22.—In section 22 of the principal Act, in subsection (1), for the opening paragraph and clause (a), the following shall be substituted, namely :---

"Where in any factory it becomes necessary to examine any part of machinery referred to in section 21, while the machinery is in motion, or as a result of such examination to carry out-

(a) in a case referred to in clause (i) of the proviso to sub-section (1)of section 21, lubrication or other adjusting operation; or

(b) in a case referred to in clause (ii) of the proviso aforesaid, any mounting or shipping of belts or lubrication or other adjusting operation,

while the machinery is in motion, such examination or operation shall be made or carried out only by a specially trained adult male worker wearing tight fitting clothing (which shall be supplied by the occupier) whose name has been recorded in the register prescribed in this behalf and who has been furnished with a certificate of his appointment, and while he is so engaged,-

(a) such worker shall not handle a belt at a moving pulley unless—

(i) the belt is not more than fifteen centimetres in width ;

(ii) the pulley is normally for the purpose of drive and not merely a fly-wheel or balance wheel (in which case a belt is not permissible); (iii) the belt joint is either laced or flush with the belt;

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(*iv*) the belt, including the joint and the pulley rim, are in good repair;

(v) there is reasonable clearance between the pulley and any fixed plant or structure;

(vi) secure foothold and, where necessary, secure handhold, are provided for the operator; and

(vii) any ladder in use for carrying out any examination or operation aforesaid is securely fixed or lashed or is firmly held by a second person.".

12. Amendment of section 24.—In section 24 of the principal Act, after sub-section (2), the following sub-section shall be inserted, namely :—

(3) When a device, which can inadvertently shift from "off" to "on" position, is provided in a factory to cut off power, arrangements shall be provided for locking the device in safe positon to prevent accidental starting of the transmission machinery or other machines to which the device is fitted."

(a) no portable electric light or any other electric appliance of voltage exceeding twenty-four volts shall be permitted for use inside any chamber, tank, vat, pit, pipe, flue or other confined appear and

(b) if any inflammable gas, fume or dust is likely to be present such chamber, tank, vat, pit, pipe, flue or other confined space, lamp or light other than that of flame-proof construction shall be p mitted to be used therein.".

17. Amendment of section 38.—In section 38 of the principal Act,—

(i) for sub-section (1), the following sub-section shall be submitted namely :---

"(1) In every factory there shall be provided such means of esca in case of fire as may be prescribed.";

(ii) after sub-section (7), the following sub-sections shall be inserted inamey :---

"(8) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-section (1) or su section (7), if the Inspector, having regard to the nature of the work carri on in the factory, construction of the factory, special risk to life or safe or any other circumstance, is of the opinion that though such means escape as may be prescribed have been provided in the factory, the san is not adequate to permit safe, easy or quick exit of the workers in case fire, he may, by order in writing, require that such additional means escape or other mesures as he may consider reasonable and necessa be provided in the factory before such date as is specified in the order.

(9) If any question arises whether or not the means of escape provide in the factory is adequate to permit safe, easy or quick exit of the worke in case of fire, the same shall be referred to the Chief Inspector, who sha after giving the persons concerned a reasonable opportunity to representheir views, decide the same.

(10) Any person aggrieved by the decision of the Chief Inspector under sub-section (9) may, before the expiry of thirty days from the date of which the decision is communicated to him, prefer an appeal to the State Government and the State Government shall after giving the appellant a reasonable opportunity to represent his views, make such order in relation to the appeal as it thinks fit.".

18. Amendment of sections 39 and 40.—In section 39 and section 40 of the principal Act, for the words "the manager", wherever they occur, the words "the occupier or manager or both " shall be substituted.

19. Insertion of new sections 40A and 40B.—After section 40 of the principa Act, the following sections shall be inserted, namely :—

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40B. Safety Officers.-(1) In every factory,--

(*ii*) wherein, in the opinion of the State Government, any manufacturin process or operation is carried on, which process or operation involves an risk of bodily injury, poisoning or disease, or any other hazard to health, t the persons employed in the factory,

the occupier shall, if so required by the State Government by notification in the Official Gazette, employ such number of Safety Officers as may be specified in that notification.

(2) The duties, qualifications and conditions of service of Safety Officers sha be such as may be prescribed by the State Government."

21. Amendment of section 45.—In section 45 of the principal Act,—

(2) For the purposes of sub-section (1) "ordinary rate of wages" mea the basic wages plus such allowances, including the cash equivalent of t advantage accruing through the concessional sale to workers of foodgrai and other articles, as the worker is for the time being entitled to, but do not include a bonus and wages for eventing

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(3) Where any workers in a factory are paid on a piece-rate basis, th time rate shall be deemed to be equivalent to the daily average of the full-time earnings for the days on which they actually worked on the sam or identical job during the month immediately preceding the calendar mont during which the overtime work was done, and such time rates shall b deemed to be the ordinary rates of wages of those workers :

Provided that in the case of a worker who has not worked in the immediatel preceding calendar month on the same or identical job, the time rate shall b deemed to be equivalent to the daily average of the earning of the worker fo the days on which he actually worked in the week in which the overtime work was done.

Explanation.- For the purposes of this sub-section in computing the earnings for the days on which the worker actually worked such allowances including the cash equivalent of the advantage accruing through the con cessional sale to workers of foodgrains and other articles, as the worker i for the time being entitled to, shall be included but any bonus or wages fo overtime work payable in relation to the period with reference to which the earnings are being computed shall be excluded.".

Provided further that where contravention of any of the provising of Chapter IV or any rule made thereunder or under section IV in resulted in an accident causing death or sectous fortily injury, the fine shall not be less than two thousand rupees in the case of an accident causing causing death and one thousand rupees in the case of an accident causing serious bodily injury. ";

(b) after sub-section (1) as so re-numbered, the following sub-section shall be inserted, namely:—

"(2) For the purposes of sub-section (1), no cognizance shall be taken of any conviction made more than two years before the commission of the offence for which the person is subsequently being convicted.".

42. Amendment of section 100.—In section 100 of the principal Act. in sub-section (2),—

(a) in the opening paragraph, the words " or in the case of a private company, any one of the shareholders thereof, " shall be omitted;

(b) in the proviso,—

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(i) for the words "a director, or in the case of a private company, a shareholder, who is resident in either case within India", the words "a director, who is resident within India" shall be substituted;

(ii) for the words "such director or shareholder, as the case may be,", the words "such director" shall be substituted;

(iii) for the words "ceases to be a director or shareholder", the words "ceases to be a director" shall be substituted;

(c) the following proviso shall be inserted at the end, namely:-

"Provided further that in the case of a factory belonging to the Central Government or any State Government or any local authority the person or persons appointed to manage the affairs of the factory shall be deemed to be the occupier of that factory for the purposes of this Chapter."

43. Amendment of section 106.—In section 106 of the principal Act, the following Explanation shall be inserted at the end, namely:—

" Explanation.—For the purposes of this section,—

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(b) where for the performance of any act time is granted or extended on an application made by the occupier or manager of a factory, the period of limitation shall be computed from the date on which the time so granted or extended expired.".

44. Insertion of new section 119.—After section 118 of the principal Act, the following section shall be inserted, namely:—

"119. Act to have effect notwithstanding anything contained in Act 37 of 1970.—The provisions of this Act shall have effect notwithstanding anything inconsistent therewith contained in the Contract Labour (Regulation and Abolition) Act, 1970.".

45. Amendment of the Schedule.—In the Schedule to the principal Act, the following serial numbers and entries shall be inserted at the end, namely:—

"18. Oil acne or dermatitis due to mineral oils and compounds containing mineral oil base.

19. Byssionosis.

20. Asbestosis.

21. Occupational or contact dermatitis caused by direct contact with hemicals and paints. These are of two types, that is, primary irritants and allergic sensitizers.

22. Noise induced hearing loss (exposure to high noise levels). ".

The index number for the food group decreased by 1 point to 310 due to a fall in the average prices of rice, bajri, groundnut oil, sugar and gur.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained steady at 347.

The index number for housing remained steady at 129.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group decreased by 3 points to 301 due to a fall in the prices of saree and coloured poplin.

The index number for the miscellaneous group decreased by 1 point to 239 due to a fall in the average price of pan-leaf only.
