# ILO Meet on Collective Bargaining

The industrial relations specialists exchanged views and experience only for their own benefit but also to provide the ILO with pointers future work in industrial relations.

The Specialists dealt with five main areas:

- 1. How collective bargaining is organised in different countries
- 2. How it regulates wages, working conditions and labour mana relations.
- 3. Problems of co-ordinating collective bargaining at different lenterprise, industry-wide and national.
  - 4. Methods of handling disputes related to collective bargaini
  - 5. Collective bargaining and inflation.

#### WIDER SCOPE

ILO research shows that collective bargaining has spread far beyond its use as a means of settling wages and basic working conditions.

Collective agreements have recently been arrived at in many coun protect workers in the event of a cut back in production. Others now investment policy and work organisation among the subjects for nego Moreover, detailed clauses governing the relations between the parties collective agreement have become a customary feature in many coun

Collective bargaining is also covering increasing numbers of workers. recently spread to the nationalised industries in France and to far parts of the United States.

In the United States in 1976 more than 2,00,000 collective agreement is gned. In the Federal Republic of Germany the total was about 8,000 c more than 90 per cent of all the workers in the country.

About 15 per cent of British workers and more than 50 per cent of workers were covered.

An ILO background paper for the Vienna meeting declared, "Inflation definitely has an effect on collective bargaining, at least in so far as it to wages and other financial benefits. To start with, bargaining is more during periods of inflation because it is not so easy to forcast the exof the economic situation especially that of prices. Moreover, inflation it more difficult to respect existing agreements, especially where it has rated unexpectedly during the period of validity of the agreement. # President Assents BIR (Amendment) Bill

The President has given his assent to the Bombay Industrial Relations (Amendment) Bill, 1977. The Bombay Industrial Relations (Amendment) Bill, 1977 seeks to carry out certain amendments in the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 which have been found necessary due to afflux of time to remove certain lacuna noticed in the course of implementation of this Act. It also seeks to bring its provisions in line with recent amendments made in other labour laws and also to expand the coverage of the Act in certain respects. (The Act is published at pege 387)

Legal Sanction for Job Security favoured—Consensus on Industrial Relations Law.

State Labour Ministers have with near unanimity favoured provision of legal sanction for security of all those in employment, uniform minimum service conditions and aid aggrieved unemployed during the pendency of adjudication of disputes.

The Ministers gave their views at their 20th Conference called by the Labour Ministry, the first after the recent assembly elections as the final phase of the exercise aimed at evolving a consensus on a comprehensive industrial relations Bill.

The Ministers had before them a report on the comprehensive industrial relations law based on the views expressed by the special tripartite committee. appointed for the purpose. Now that the Labour Ministry has ascertained the views of all the concerned agencies, it will set forth its decisions in the form of the proposed Bill to be introduced in the next session of Parliament.

The Bill is expected to be introduced in the next session of Parliament.

The general point said to have been stressed by the State Ministers for giving widest coverage of the Bill so that none in employment should be left to the mercy of employers.

Another important development was that the State Ministers were opposed to the setting up of industrial relations commission. The State Ministers would like the conciliation machinery to be left with the State Governments. also expressed themselves in favour of one man labour tribunals.

As regards the definition of workman, the consensus is to be in favour of giving widest coverage including in it all persons including managers provided they are not occupying substantive posts of management. Similarly, the term industry" is proposed to be given widest coverge.

As regards the definition of appropriate authority the idea was to adopt the same definition as in the Industrial Development and Regulation Act. The labour ministry sources stated that there was no conflict between the Centre and the States as to the definition of the term appropriate authority.

The proposed Bill is expected to incorporate the basic components of the existing laws. It will also lay down the minimum service conditions and incorporate a provision for subsistence allowance to be paid in all cases of

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It was also suggested by the conference for powers to be given to the conciliation officers to summon the parties as at present it was felt the aggrieved employees were put to much hardship because the employer's representatives fail to turn up for conciliation talks.

The objective of the proposed Bill, according to the Labour Minister Shri Ravidra Varma, is to "delineate a legal framework that promotes condiality and peace in industrial establishments, protects the legitimate interests of workers and industry so that industrial harmony and co-operation may lead to increased production and productivity, an increased flow of goods and services and a consequent acceleration of economic development and improvement in the standards of living of our people".

Earlier inaugurating the 20th Conference of the State Labour Ministers, Shri Varma made an appeal to the State Governments to launch a massive drive to identify, release and rehabilitate the bonded Labour.

Though there was evidence of the existence of the system in one form or another in almost all parts of the country, he regretted, only eleven State Governments had so far reported action on the implementation of the Bonded Labour System (Abolition) Act. He said lukewarmness in implementing this aw would only expose this section of the community to the continued hazards of economic and social exploitation.

The Minister spoke of the lack of attention given to the implementation of the Contract Labour (Regulation and Abolition) Act, and pleaded for concreted action both by Centre and the States to make a dent on this problem.

Referring to the Centre's recent note drawing attention of the States to the "miserable conditions" of Dadan labourers (a type of contract labourers) he said, "Our joint inspection teams had given harrowing reports about their sufferings".

Shri Varma urged the State Labour Ministers to revive the tripartite consultative machinery in their States even by promoting bilateral negotations for the settlement of disputes.

Inspite of the removal of all the major causes of irritation to the working class, he admitted, there were certain areas where unrest seemed to have become endemic and not only a trial of strength on the economic plane but also ugly instances of gheraos and physical violence as well.

He said this was a 'most unfortunate trend'. "No Government therefore, can connive at the use of violence".

# Supreme Court Ruling on Maternity Benefit

By a ruling given on October 12, 1977, the Supreme Court has stated that under the Maternity Benefit Act, 1961, a woman worker was entitled to full maternity benefits for all the 12 weeks of maternity leave absence, including the non-working wageless holidays like Sundays and other rest days. The computation of maternity benefit has to be made in a manner so as to ensure that a woman worker gets for the maternity leave absence period of six weeks before delivery and six weeks afterwards—not only the amount equalling 100 per cent of the wages, which she was previously earning in terms of Section 3(N) of the Maternity Benefit Act, but also the benefit of wages for all the Sundays and rest days falling within the two periods.

# Married Workers' Role in Labour Force Declines

Married persons still make up the largest share of the nation's workforce but their proportion is gradually declining while that of unmarried persons is increasing, the Bureau of Labour Statistics reports.

In a new study of the marital composition of the labour force BLS said that married persons in the workforce dropped from 69.2 per cent in March 1970 to 64.7 per cent in March 1976. Over the same period, the proportion of persons who have never married grew from 20.1 to 23.2 per cent and that of divorced and separated persons rose from 6.8 to 9.2 per cent.

BLS attributed the gradual change in the profile of the labour force to several factors. During the Seventies, the long-term decline in the participation rate of married men continued, while the rate for married women rose at about the same pace as it had during the last half of the 1960s.

Over the year ended in March 1976, the participation rate of married men edged down to 82·1 per cent while the rate for married women rose slightly to a new high of 45 per cent.

Other highlights of the report

There were 14.9 million mothers in the labour force in March 1976, of whom 11.7 million were married and living with their husbands.

Wives in the labour force with children continued to experience greater joblessness than childless wives, and the younger the child, the more likely the mother was to be unemployed.

Reflecting the increased labour force participation of wives, well over hal of the country's 47·3 million husband-wife families in March 1976 had been multi-earner families in 1975.

Minimum Wage Boost called critical for poor

Congress should act promptly to raise the federal minimum wage from \$2.30 to \$2.65 an hour, and provide for automatic adjustments thereafter, the AFL-CIO Executive Council declared.

The federation is supporting a bill expected to come up in the House in mid-September and later in the Senate that would lift the minimum to that leveland raise it to 53 per cent of the average manufacturing wage by January 1, 1980. Supported also by President Carter and the Coalition for a Fair Minimum Wage, the bill is admittedly a compromise measure, and "not all that we had sought," the council acknowedged.

"But the working poor cannot wait much longer," it said in a statement.

In calling for the bill's speedy passage, the council urged Congress to reject employer group arguments that a youth "sub-minimum" wage would substantially reduce teenage unemployment.

- "Lowering wages does not create jobs, but it does create poverty," the council declared. "No link has ever been proven between youth unemploy ment and minimum wage increases."
- "Even the proponents of a youth subminimum wage do not deny that it will cause unemployment among older workers—20 to 24-year-olds just starting out their families, mothers and fathers fired so that their sons and daughters can be hired at a cheaper rate, and semi-retired workers seeking a few hours workweek to supplement pensions."
- "A government policy which moves tennagers to the front of the hiring line today, because they have the highest unemployment rates, may well have to legislate lower wages for young adults tomorrow so that they will be hired first.
- "Because a disproportionate number of minimum wage workers are minorities and women, a teenage subminimum would cause increased discrimination against these workers by employers who would hire teenagers at cheaper wages."

The council also urged the House to support a provision in the bill to reduce the "tip" credit in a series of stages to \$1 an hour. "We believe that so-called tipped employees should not have to depend on the generosity of customers for half of the minimum wage," the council declared.

"The working poor must have an increase in the minimum wage as soon as possible and a guarantee of an above-poverty wage in the future," the council emphasized. "The compromise bill we support would achieve both objectives".

Equal pay rule upheld for Public Employees

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The Equal Pay Act, which is part of FLSA, requires that men and women ich 1576 kg la receive equal pay for work requiring equal skill, effort and responsibility under The appeals court ruling resulted from an FLSA suit filed in U.S. District

Court, Charleston, S.C., by the Secretary of Labour in February 1976. The suit contended that the Charleston County school district and its superintendent were in violation of the equal pay minimum wage, overtime pay and recordkeeping provisions of the act and asked that back wages be paid affected employees.

In June 1976, the U. S. Supreme Court ruled in another case that FLSA minimum wage and overtime compensation provisions are not constitutionally enforceable against the traditional operations of state and local governments.

In the Charleston case, the district court rejected a motion that the high court ruling would preclude application of any provisions of the FLSA to state and local employees. The court dismissed only the minimum wage and overtime compensation allegations, but refused to dismiss the equal pay and related record-keeping allegations contained in the complaint.

In upholding the district court action, the appeals court found that equal pay provisions constitute an anti-discrimination measure and "as such may be viewed as an exercise of Congress's power to adopt legislation enforcing the 14th Amendment's guarantee of equal protection of the law."

The decision is the second in which a circuit court of appeals has ruled that state and local government employees are covered by equal pay provisions. The issue is pending in three other courts of appeals.

# Apprenticeship and Jobs

The Apprenticeship Programs we are celebrating are a part of the social revolution that got under way with the passage of the Civil Rights Act.

In the past, back to the dawn of history, apprenticeship programs have helped to preserve the status quo. There is a saying that goes back for centuries among those who live by selling their labor: "He that has a trade has an

In other words, the ability to make something or do something that others cannot make or do for themseelves is, quite literally, money in the bank. were what working men had to leave to their sons, and that explains why the mysteries of the craft " were so jealously guarded and why apprenticeships Were largely reserved for the sons and nephews of skilled craftsmen. were no more eager to share their inheritance with those less fortunate than landowners were.

American workers and their unions are convinced that the only way to preserve and increase what we have is to share it as widely as possible. convinced that no gains and no position can be secure while others are insecure.

And that is why the ranks of union membership are open to all, regardlessof face creed color cay politics or anything else. That is why our apprentice I don't claim that we have reached saintly prefection in this or any other area, but I do say that equal rights and equal opportunity are closer to full realization in our unions and our workplaces and our training and apprenticeship programs than in any other part of American society.

Members of minority groups make up nearly 20 per cent of our apprentices, and in many trades they are even more heavily represented. Figures published this month by the Employment & Training Administration show that 46 per cent of the cement masons' apprentices are minority workers. So are 38 per cent of the plasterers', 32 per cent of the roofers', 31 per cent of the opening engineers', 30 per cent of the cooks' and bakers', 27 per cent of the meatcutters', 25 per cent of the painters', and so on down the list.

Of the minority applentices and the minority journeymen in our ranks. And we are proud of the women who are moving in increasing numbers, through our apprenticehsip programs, into jobs from which women have been exluded since the beginning of history.

On this anniversary, discrimination is no longer a real barrier to occupational access and advanagement. Today the number one barrier is the shortage of jobs.

America and all its citizens of both sexes and all races can and will make a great deal more progress if and when the Congress adopts a full employment policy.

Only under such a policy will the full potential of the National Apprenticeship Act of 1937 be realized. Only such a policy can create the integrated society of self-supporting and self-reliant citizens that was envisioned when the foundations of the Republic were laid 200 years ago.

Minimum Wages Fixed for Employees in the Employment of Legal Professionals. The Goernment of Maharashtra has, with effect from December 1, fixed the minimum rates of wages for the employees in the establishments maintained in connection with their legal profession by advocates or attorneys of the High Court of Judicature at Bombay or by any association, society or other body formed by such advocates or attorneys in the State.

The notification has been published in the Maharashtra Government Gazette, Extraordinary of Novmber 28, 1977 (Published seperately in thisissue).

#### **Essential Services**

The Government of Maharashtra has declared all services and employment borne on the establishment of the Engineering and Maintenance Divisions and Operations and Maintenance Divisions and the Chief Engineer and the Superintending Engineer I and II of the Maharashtra Industrial Development Corporation, to be essential service for the purposes of the Maharashtra Essential Services Maintenance Act. 1970.

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in Chillaurg is composed of 95 per cent rural youngsters and only 5 per cent urban youngsters. In this context, it is worth noting that the proportions of rural and urban population in 5 to 14 age-group to total rural and urban population of the State are more or less the same i.e. 28.50 per cent and 28.17 per cent respectively. However, in rural areas every 11th person of this age-group has turned to be a worker while in urban areas only 2 out of every 100 persons are workers. As a result, the urban minors form only 2.46 per cent of the total urban workers while the rural lads share more than 8 per cent of the total rural working force. Moreover, as may be seen from the table below, there is also a wide gap in the patters of employment of these child workers between rural and urban areas. The urban minors are found to be concentrated, besides agriculture, in household activities, processing and repair works, construction activities etc., while the rural minors are mainly engaged in agriculture and rearing of livestock and production of livestock produce.

Agriculture is the mainstay of the child labour. Bulk of them accounting for three-fourths of the total are either employed independently or assiting their families in such agriculture operations as ploughing, bunding, irrigation, weeding, protection of crops in the fields etc. Their next highest participation is noticed in rearing of livestock. Seventeen out of every hundred minor workers are engaged in rearing of livestock and production of live-stock produce. A major portion of the residue is employed in cities and towns where they are mainly engaged in domestic services, printing and dyeing of cotton textiles, tailoring, repairing and assembling of cycles, repairing of footwear and leather goods, running petty shops, serving in the restaurants and hotels, and doing other sundry jobs.

No district in the State could disown these unfortunate saints as they hail from every district. Each district contributes tens of hundreds to this segment of working force. However, the proportion of these workers in the district's population of 5 to 14 age group differ widely from one district to another

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Bundi and Chittaurgarh which are contiguous have higher proportion of workers in their population of 5 to 14 ages. Similarly, on the west of Aravalli hills, the districts Barmer, Pali, Jalor and Sirohi which form a pocket contribute more workers from their population of 5 to 14 age group. The other two districts on the sandy plains which also posses higher proportion of workers in their population of 5 to 14 ages are Churu and Nagaur.

Eventhough every district contributes to this section of work-force, the magnitude of contribution by Jaipur district is much higher followed by Udaipur, Nagaur and Bhilwara. Out of 587·39 thousands workers of this type, as much as 49·14 thousands workers are from Jaipur district. The next highest contribution to the tune of 41·67 thousands are from Udaipur district. Nagaur and Bhilwara districts provide 39·75 and 39·57 thousad labourers respectively. Besides, the districts Ajmer and Ganganagar also contribute in large number to this section of workers. Jaisalmer being an outback district its contribution to this category for wroking force is the lowest.

It is common phenomenon that major chunk of these workers in each district is engaged in agricultural pursuit. But the number of persons employed in other sphere of activities differ from district to district according to the nature of job opportunities and availability of other facilities. For instance, the number of persons employed in mining and quarrying industries are more in Kota, Udaipur, Bhilwara, Jaipur and Bundi districts where most of the industries are located. Persons engaged in domestic services are more in Ajmer, Nagaur and Jaipur districts. Thousands of youngesters in Bhilwara, Ajmer and Jaipur districts are engaged in livestock rearing. Large number of young wards are found to be engaged as coolies, vegetable vendors, petty shop owners, hotel servants and the like in Jaipur, Ajmer, Ganganagar and Udaipur districts. Hundreds of minors in Jaipur, Ganganagar, Ajmer and Nagaur districts have been employed in small manufacturing, processing and repair workshops.

Child labour is an inherent feature of any developing economy. It is more so in an agriculture dominated one. However, the peculiarity of physiography, climatic conditions, soil, the way of living of certain nomadic and seminomadic tribes, sub-standard living condition of certain groups of people and especially the ever increasing population intensify this problem in the State. The total population of the State has registered 27.83 per cent growth rate from 1961 to 1971. The persons within the ages 5 to 14 have grown at the rate of 38.01 per cent during the same period. No amount of Government's efforts seem to have checked up this high rate of growth of general population and thus of the population within the ages of 5 to 14. On the other hand, only less than one-tenth of this population is enrolled in the schools.

Here again, the children of ages 6 to 11—pupils in the primary classes constitute more than two-third of the pupils within the ages upto 14. In other words, the less proportion of the pupils in the middle classes who are normally

Under such circumstances, if the same rate of growth for this section of the population is taken for granted for another 10 years there will be about 102 lakhs persons at the beginning of 1981. Similarly, if the same proportion of this population as in 1971 continues to turn to be workers, by 1981, about 2.23 lakh more chiid labourers will be added to the present figure. This is a very unhealthy factor of the population and needs to be overcome at an early time. No doubt, the Government and several social institutions are striving hard since long to eliminate all those forces in our population which are harmful to the nation. Thanks to the 20 point programme which, interalia, banned the contract of child labour for cattle tending and allied jobs and also freed those who have so far been bonded.

There is also the law which prevents the employment of Child Labour in certain industries. In this context, the worth noting observation made by the Hon. Minister for Labour at the seminar on Child Labour held recently at New Delhi is that the "existing labour laws in India laying down a minimum age for employment did not cover a large number of industries particularly those in the unorganized sector, which accounted for bulk of the child labour. So the legislative measures could only tough the fringe of the problem. He further observed that the legislative approach would not be of much help in the caste-ridden society. The exploitation of the child labour would not end without a direct attack on the entrenched socio-economic inequalities. The real emancipation of the child labour could, therefore, be brought about only by ensuring equal opportunities to all children for their development."

From this, it is clear that just bringing out a legislation banning the child labour will not help to solve all the problems related to it. But what is actually required is that it has to be done away with stage by stage and through multi-prongued efforts. So the Seminar concluded that "a 1973 International Labour Organisation Convention abolishing labour by children below 14 years might for the present be regarded as a norm to be progressively achieved as it was neither feasible nor desirable to totally abolish child labour at the present stage of the country's economic development. Millions of families below the poverty line had to deploy children in Labour Market. A total ban on child labour would impose unbearable suffering on them."

It is, therefore, suggestive that multi-prongued attack has to be effected so that the child labour may be reduced on its own without either disturbing labour market and productive activities or causing much financial hardship to the families depending on it for their livelihood. Such efforts should be directed towards the rural areas which contribute maximum to this segment of workers. It is hoped that the 20 point programme taken by the Government will go a long way to remedy the socio-economic disabilities of the rural population. However, the Government may also think of (a) making the education compulsory upto a certain standard in the schools, (b) introducing mid-day meal system, (c) providing free text books and (a) opening of hostels wherever required and such other measures as it may feel fit to avert this appalling factor of population.

Bombay Industrial Relations (Amendment) Act 1977

The following Act of the Maharashtra Legislature, having been assented to by the President on the 14th October 1977, is hereby publish for general information.

# MAHARASHTRA ACT No. XLVII OF 1977

(First published after having received the assent of the President, in the "Maharashtra Government Gazette", Extra-ordinary, on the 24th October 1977.)

An Act further to amend the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946.

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946, for the purposes hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Republic of India as follows, namely:—

- 1. Short title and commencement.—(1) This Act may be called the Bombay Industrial Relations (Amendment) Act, 1977.
- (2) It shall come into force on such date as the State Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint.
- 2. Amendment of section 3 of Bom. XI of 1947.—In section 3 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Act"), in clause (13), in paragraph (i), for the words "five hundred and fifty rupees per month," the words "one thousand rupees per month;" shall be substituted.
- 3. Amendment of section 9 of Bom. XI of 1947.—In section 9 of the principal

### MAHARASHTRA ACT No. LXIV OF 1977

An Act further to amen the Bombay Shops an Establishments Act, 1948

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Bombay Shops and Establish ments Act, 1948, for the purposes hereinafter appearing; it is hereby enacted it the Twenty-eighth Year of the Republic of India as follows:

- 1. Short title and commencement.—(1) This Act may be called the Bomba Shops and Establishments (Amendment) Act, 1977.

    - (c) after sub-section(3), the following sub-section shall be added, namely: (4) Notwithstanding anything contained in this section, every employe irrespective of his period of employment, shall be entitled to addition holiday on the 26th January, 1st May and 15th August every year. Fo holiday on these days, he shall be paid wages at a rate equivalent to the dail average of his wages (excluding

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Provided that, the employer may require any employee to work in the establishment on all or any of these days, subject to the condition that of such work the employee shall be paid double the amount of the daily average wages and also leave on any other day in lieu of the compulsory holiday."

#### 327—A rise of 2 points.

In October 1977, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Solapur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 327 being 2 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Solapur City.

The index number for the food group increased by 3 points to 349 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, arhardal, gramdal, masurdal, goatmeat, dry fish, salt, turmeric, chillies dry, tamarind, garlic, coconut, and a rise in the Sub group index number for vegetable and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco etc. group increased by 15 points to 301 due to a rise in the average prices of pan leaf, pan finished and Katha.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group increased by 3 points to 356 due to a rise in the average prices of shirt, long cloth shirting.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 2 points to 258 due to a rise in the average prices of medicine, and hair oil.

The index numbers for the fuel and light and the housing remained steady at 336 and 188 respectively.

In October 1977 the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Nanded Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 328 being 1 point Lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59. Family Living Survey in Nanded City.

The Index Number for the food group decreased by 1 point to 357 due to a fall in the average prices of jowar, groundnut oil and gur.

The index number for the fuel and light group and Housing remained steady at 350 and 166 respectively.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 1 point to 307 due to a rise in the average price of long cloth only.

The index number for the miscellaneous group decreased by 2 points to 268 due to a fall in the average price of pan-leaf only.

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### 17—A fall of 6 points

In October 1977, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for Jalgaon Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 317 eing 6 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Jalgaon Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 10 points to 353 due o a fall in the average prices of groundnut oil, vanaspati, milk, ghee, potatoes, onions, other vegetables, sugar, gur.

The index number for the fuel and light groups remained steady at 291.

The index number for housing remained steady at 144.

The index number for the Clothing and footwear group increased by 1 point o 315 due to a rise in the prices of saree and long cloth.

The index number for the miscellaneous increased by 1 point to 260 due o a rise in the average price of cinema only.

#### 304-A fall of 8 points

In October 1977, the Consumer Price Index Number for working class for Pune Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 304 being 8 points lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Poona Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 17 points to 335 due to a fall in the average prices of rice, groundnut oil, variaspati, mutton, eggs, potatoes, onions, brinjals, tomatoes, sugar and gur.

The index number for the fuel and light group decreased by 1 point to 353 due to a fall in the average prices of match box only.

The index number for housing remained steady at 130.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 2 point to 330 due to a rise in the prices of saree, coloured poplin and shoes (Bata co.)

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 1 point to 243 due to a rise in the prices of panlinished patient medicine, hair oil and tooth powder (Bytco family).
