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### The Month in Brief

### Consumer Price Index Number for Working class

The Bombay, Sholapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of April, 1974 with the average prices for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 259, 288 and 277 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Poona and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of April, 1974 with the average Prices for the year ended December, 1961 equal to 100 were 279, 304, 249 and 285 respectively.

### Industrial Disputes

During February 1974, there were 80 strikes involving 1,96,035 workmen and a time loss of 13,77,994 man-days, as compared to 91 disputes in January 1974 involving 2,00,308 workman/and time loss of 45,78,122 man-days. 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# **Current Notes**

### Fiji joins the ILO

Fiji has become the 125th member-State of the International Labour Organisation, it was announced.

Ratu Sir Kamisese Mara, Prime Minister of Fiji, has informed the ILO that the obligations of its constitution are accepted by his country.

Sir Kamisese's letter was received by ILO Director General Francis Blanchard on 19th April 1974, the effective date of Fiji's entry in the ILO.

### Inflation in Consumer prices around the world

Figures available for 128 countries and territories show that consumer prices continued to increase in all parts of the world and that the rise—already rapid in 1972—accelerated even more in 1973, particularly in the second half of the year. During the latest 12-month period consumer prices went up by 10 per cent or more in 74 countries compared with 26 in 1972. In five countries out of six, the rates of increases were considerably higher than 12 months earlier, in general, because of a sharp rise in food prices. The rates increased three-fold in 22 countries and they doubled in 18 other countries, despite the measures adopted or extended by a growing number of countries to curb inflation I.L.O. press information says.

The increase exceeded 20 per cent in the latest 12-month period in 27 countries, including Argentina, Bangladesh, Chile, Indonesia, Khmer Republic, Singapore, Uganda, Uruguay, Republic of Viet Nam and Zaire, where prices went up by more than 30 per cent. Chile, where inflation has been chronic for ten years, had never experienced such an up-rush of consumer prices. They doubled twice in the course of 11 months, the first time between December 1972 and July 1973, the second between July and November. In the Khmer Republic, prices tripled between October 1972 and October 1973 and in Uruguay they increased by 90 per cent.

Prices increased by between 10 and 20 per cent in 47 countries and territories—9 in Africa, 12 in the Americas, 15 in Asia, 9 in Europe and Dominican Republic, India, Ivory Coast, Japan, Mexico, Nepal, Syrian Arab Republic and Turkey, all countries where the increase during the 12-month period exceeded 15 per cent. Prices also crossed the threshold of 10 per cent in the following industrial countries:—

Australia, Denmark, Finland, Ireland, Italy, New Zealand, Span, Switzerland and the United Kingdom.

Increases ranging between 5 and 10 per cent were recorded in Canada, the United States, 9 European countries and 25 developing countries. Consumer prices in the United States rose by 1.8 per cent from July to August 1973, the biggest monthly increase for 26 years. This inflationary trend is mainly due to the sharp rise in food prices, which went up by nearly 20 per cent between November 1972 and November 1973; the rise during August alone amounted to 6 per cent. Among the European countries in this group, Austria, Belgium,

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R.M. Deplore hime Ministe of Demoracy France, the Federal Republic of Germany, Netherlands, Norway and Sweden experienced monthly increases of over 1 per cent during the last quarter of 1973.

During the latest 12-month period for which information has been supplied consumer prices have risen by some 3 to 5 per cent in Hungary and in about 10 developing countries and territories including Egypt, Togo and Venezuela. Increases of from 1 to 3 per cent were recorded in the Peoples' Republic of the Congo, Ghana and Tunisia, as well as in the Republic of Korea, a country which had previously suffered from chronic inflation and where the annua rate of increase had been over 10 per cent since 1962. Consumer prices were practically unchanged, or rose by less than 1 per cent, in Czechoslovakia Honduras, Poland and the Solomon Islands.

# Workers' Participation Legislation in Offing

The French Government is preparing a legislation to give workers greate involvement in company affairs. The legislation is outcome of Lip affair which 1,300 workers staged to take-over Lip Company which the management intended to close down. In particular, this case drew attention to sever fundamental industrial relations issues, workers' consultation and negotiation rights on high level policies such as long-term planning and employment programmes.

The French Government at present is drafting two bills which could become law this year. Both the Bills would give employees a greater say in the runni and control of their companies. Employees would be given the opportun of purchasing shares in their firms with the incentive of considerable tax. vantages, which would also apply to the companies. Under the propos scheme, for every sour shares purchased, a fifth would be acquired free sha would not be negotiable for five years. Similar schemes in France are practi in banks, insurance companies and Renault, the state-owned car company

Further legislation is planned to give workers a greater say in the runn of company affairs through worker representation on management boards.

# More factories introducing worker share scheme in U.K.

The latest company to announce such a scheme is the Imperial Group. So 9 companies have introduced schemes in United Kingdom.

The scheme introduced by Imperial Group of Companies is similar others already installed. It is run on "Own As You Earn" OAYE, whereby employees save under a Save As You Earn, SAYE, contract. ceiling on monthly savings is £ 20.00. After five years, the SAYE con yields a tax-free bonus of 20 per cent which doubles if the money is left and two years. The money may be used to buy shares after either five or ten at a 10 per cent discount up to a maximum of £ 1,680. The number of s o be issued will be fixed by the board. The main purpose of trade unionism, she added, was to get better conditions for the workers. But in the present situation, acceptance of the demands of workers will not lead to a better life. Stating that democracy was on trial and that the "situation we face is grave" Mrs. Gandhi deplored that workers thought only of their sectional and immediate interest at the cost of the total good of the country she cautioned working class that sectional advance without the "total good" of the country would not benefit any one.

The Prime Minister pointed out that the immediate result of higher wages was an inflation or an increase in the prices. Mrs. Gandhi said that it was not the concept of democracy that was on trial, but its implementation and the shape it was taking in this country.

### Compensation to laid-off men

Labour Minister K. V. Raghunatha Reddy said in the Rajya Sabha that the recommendations of the State Labour Ministers' Conference to raise the rate of compensation from 50 per cent to 60 per cent in all cases of lay-off was under consideration.

### Shri Naval Tata on Bonus

While commenting on bonus Mr. Naval H. Tata, President of the Employers' Federation of India, appealed to Government, in its own and national interest, to make it clear that bonus is a share in the profit and not a deferred wage or supplementary wage to fill the gap between the wages earned and the living wage.

He added that if the proposition that bonus comes out of profit alone is not strictly adhered to, it will be extremely difficult for the Government to resist the trade unions' demand for "bonus to all" including the State and Central Government employees, railways and post and telegraphs' workers. The burden of bonus on the Government exchequer will add up to a sizeable amount. Coupled with the ever-increasing dearness allowance paid to the employees under the linking formula recommended by the Pay Commission it will heighten the inflationary pressures in the economy.

### D. A. Hike for Jutemen

From May 1, of 1974 the dearness allowance payable to jute mill workers in West Bengal goes up by Rs. 7.50 to Rs. 130.50 per month, taking the minimum wage in the industry to Rs. 291.50 and the average wage to Rs. 332.50 a month.

The higher D. A. is going to have a considerable cost-push effect. The impact on the industry's conversion costs per tonne is estimated at Rs. 35 for carpet-backing, Rs. 30 for hessian, and Rs. 23 for sacking. The incidence on the industry's monthly wage cost is Rs. 25.22 lakhs, including fringe benefits.

The D. A. rise follows the increase in the average consumer price index number of Calcutta for January, March 1974 by 30 points to 1039 (base year 1939=100) over that for the three months ended January, 1974.

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### Wage Award, effective from 1962

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A wage award with a 12-year retrospective effect was given by Mr. F. H. Lala, Industrial Tribunal, Maharashtra. The award will give Rs. 75 lakhs as wage average to 1,200 workers of Asbestos Cement Co.

Mr. R. J. Mehta, President of the Asbestos, Engineering and General Industries Employees' Union, while commenting on award stated that this is the longest retrospective effect given to industrial workers in the history of industrial adjudication.

The award, has drastically revised the wage structure. It has placed all daily rated workmen on monthly scales and has awarded them 30 days' basic wages as against 26 days.

The workers are to get one to three increments, depending upon their length of service. The workmen, most of whom are senior and unskilled, will get a raise in their basic wages from Rs. 54.60 to Rs. 119 per month taking the minimum total wage to Rs. 600. In the case of semi-skilled, skilled and highly skilled, the increase in basic wage structure ranges from 125 to 150 per cent.

The Industrial Tribunal has reduced the previous 15 categories of daily rated workmen to four categories, and in the case of monthly graded clerical staff the reduction in category is from four to three. Under the award, the basic of a junior clerk is Rs. 135 and the maximum grade allowed is Rs. 696 taking the total emoluments to Rs. 1,705 per mensem.

In addition to the revision of wage structure, the Industrial Tribunal has allowed an interim relief of 20 per cent, in the basic wages of workmen last year under which the company has to pay another Rs. 23 lakhs.

### Competent Persons under Factories Act

The Government of Maharashtra has constituted a special committee for the purposes of drawing up a panel of "Competent Persons" for the different purposes of examinations and tests, of lifting blacks, ropes, lifting tackles, hoists and lifts, pressure vessels, water-sealed gas holdders, solvent extraction plants, etc. as laid down in the Factories Act, 1948 and the Rules made thereunder and to consider requests received by the Factory Inspection Department for recognition as 'Competent Persons' under the Act and the Rules.

Those persons, who by virtue of their qualifications and experience in their field of specialisation consider themselves fit to be placed on such panels for the above different purposes, are requested to approach the Chief Inspector of Factories (Maharashtra State), Commerce Centre, Tardeo, Bombay-400 034, giving full particulars of their qualifications, experience and all other pertainent details of their field of specialisation.

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## EMPLOYERS HOUSING-ITS SOCIO-ECONOMIC ASPECTS

An attempt is made in this article to examine the socio-economic aspect housing provided by the employer for his employees. By employer's housing facility that is completely under control and managed by employer.

Housing is such a welfare measure which only prosperous employer afford. Providing housing for employees depends on many factors, son which are size of the organisation, its prosperity and future prospects, the tion of the industry and its colony, etc. Some employers provide accomm tion to their employees out of necessity. Some employers do it out of philosophy of welfare to provide accommodation. Generally in a metropo city like Bombay, where the price of the land is exhorbitant and sufficient is not available, it is very difficult for an employer to provide accommod to his employees. Even if he does so, it may not be possible for him to c in the vicinity of the place of employment. Generally such of the employment who, in the opinion of the employer, should be readily available on a call the authorities are provided housing. Such categories including security and fighting personnel maintenance staff, transport staff like drivers and son the officers of the employer whose nearness to the establishment is desir The manufacturing process or the location of the establishment may be that the employer feels it very essential to provide accommodation to essential services staff. Some enlightened employers on the other hand prehousing because they are devoted to the well-being of their employees wha may be the reason, it is very difficult for an employer to provide accommod to all his employees. In such cases the accommodation is provided as and it is available depending upon various factors, like type of work the emp

is doing, his category, seniority, his personal hardships, etc.

From socio-economic point of view there are certain advantages and advantages of the housing provided by the employer.

Generally the employer provides a big colony preferably near the pla employment. Different types of accommodation are provided to differences.

This helps to improve the attendance in the establishment. Causes transport difficulties, public disturbance in the city do not affect the attend Employees also avoid remaining absent or going on leave on false preter

save employees' time in transport and to that extent they can spend more with their families.

Any public disturbances like strikes, bandhs, have no effect on employer's eduction. It may not be wrong to say that the standard of housing provided employer is better than the one available in the city within the means of the ployees. For, the employer generally subsidizes the accommodation and are the overhead costs. There is better cleanliness also in the colony. To the ent that the employer provides housing to his employees, he helps to solve social problem of housing and public transport.

Providing housing in a colony to the employees also widens the scope of the fare activities that employer can provide. For, the employer is in a position only to provide welfare activities to his employees but also can exten them the families of the employees. Some welfare activities are such that they be availed of in a better manner if the employees stay nearby the place are they are provided. More over the time saved in travelling can be utilized the enjoyment of such facilities provided by the employer. If the colony ifficiently big the employer can provide school for children of the employees, y-ground, garden, dispensary or hospital, fair price shop etc. which he may be in a position to provide if there is no colony. Employees are likely to better service from these facilities. This helps to improve the general welling of the employees and their families.

all this helps to build and establish cordial relations and better understanding ween the employer and his employees which goes a long way to avoid strikes, slow etc.

This brings us to the effects on the employment. The employee gets not only be but also accommodation may be he has to wait for a few years to get the ommodation. In some cases the employer makes it a pre-condition that the ployee has to stay in the colony. The employee also tries on his part to be elf-disciplined employee and earn a good-will of the employer for he has been the property of the employee and that in ease his services are terminated he will lose only his job but also his accommodation. In case the employer needs the rices of the employee at any moment, the employee can be called on duty in shortest time. This is very important in case of security, fire-fighting maintenance personnel. As the employees stay in the colony, they as as the employer do not feel any difficulty in attending shifts by rotation. In case of termination of

lowever, all these advantages are set at naught in case of termination of ice by way of retrenchment or discharge or dismissal. For not only that person loses his job but also he loses his house. Thus double axe falls on head. In such a case to mitigate the hardship, the employee should be given the time to stay in the employer's house till the time he gets another accommon. Employer may agree for this in case of retrenchment but he may not be in case of dismissal. Same problem comes at the time of retirement, order, therefore, to rehabilitate the employee, sufficient notice and also should be given to the employee to make alternate arrangements.

case of an accident which disables the employee completely to work, he must be continued in employment or in case of death of the employee while

in employment, the family of such employee has to face the hardship and exposed to untold hardships. In case the employee has any son or daug which can be absorbed in employment, the employer may do so; but in it is not, the family has to make its own arrangement. Losing job and ho simultaneously is the biggest drawback of the employer's housing. It therefore, suggested that some way should be found out to help such a fam In the present day urbanization movement, people are as much in need of a ho as they are in need of employment. So many social problems are created want of proper housing. In many cases people change job because they not get proper and convenient accommodation. Accommodation by employee to stabilize the employment and thus reduces the labour turnover to a great extent.

As the industry is generally concentrated in urban and especially in me politian cities, people in search of employment migrate to the cities for employment. However for various reasons they are not able to bring their family with them and thus there is separation of family-earning member living in cannot the rest of the family living in the rural areas. When this happens of large scale, some additional social problems are created. The employee do not feel happy for not being with his family and is not in a position to attact the needs of the family like medical care, education of the children etc. family is also not happy. Employee can meet his family at very long interval this double establishment and travelling adds to his expenses and thus to the extent less funds are available for the well-being of the family. Moreover so problems for the society as a whole crop up e.g. a man is exposed to immost acts like prostitution, drinking, betting etc. If employer provides house the employee can stay with his family and the well-being of the family can looked after by the employee.

We will now examine impact of employer's housing on social relation The most important thing is the location of the industry and its colony. I is situated in rural area, it does not have much effect. But if it is in a many factors come into picture. The first factor is the distance of the col from the city and the place of employment. Assuming that place of employment ment and colony are situated near each other but at a long distance from city, the residents of the colony have some difficulty in keeping contact with city like meeting relatives and friends in the city, marketing, sending child to school, medical facilities, entertainment etc. Here if the employer provided convenient and subsidized transport, the residents of the colony much convenience to keep contact with the city. However, if the emplo has not provided any such facility the residents have to depend on pu transport. If the colony is sufficiently big, schools for children, dispensar shops etc. can be provided in the colony itself and to that extent the inconv ience is reduced. However, the people who are choosy, are not satsified v these types of facilities and prefer to go to the city only. As regards entert ment, people have different tastes and it is not possible to satisfy all the peo They have thus either to be content with what they may get in the colon go to the city.

The scope of the work of political parties and trade unions is naturally lim in the colonies. If the employer and union have good relations and unstanding the employer may allow the union to conduct its activities on a lim

scale or he can prohibit the union activities like meetings in the colony. The employees are, therefore, not able to conduct and participate in union activities both at the place of employment and at the place of residence it is the practice of many places that unions hold meetings just outside the colony premises. Naturally for outside union leaders it goes very difficult to keep contact with the employees as their entry is restricted to the colony and the employees are under "supervision" of the employer which is invisible but which is definitely felt:

As regards the political parties, they can work in the colony only with employer's permission. If the employer has any affinity with a particular party he may not allow all parties to conduct their activities in the colony. All this depends upon the employer's views and the relations others keep with him. The resident employees also do not feel that free to do the work of a union or a political party in the colony for the fear that he may invite the ill will of the employer. Thus to some extent the freedom of an employee is restricted in the colony than what he would have otherwise enjoyed in a city where after working hours the employee has no connection whatsoever with the employer.

Many employees feel that they do not get as much privacy ard freedom in the colony as they will otherwise get in the city. They, therefore, do not choose to stay in the colony. As the superiors, equals and subordinates stay in the same colony, their relations in the colony and at the place of work have interaction on each other. Strained relations or good relations at one place have an indirect effect on their relations at the other place. Generally in giving accommodation in the colony, different types of houses are provided for different categories and thus their status differential at the work place is also reflected in the colony. Moreover in a city an employee can choose the locality or his neighbours; but in a colony his choice is very much limited. Sometimes it is quite possible that employees having strained relations at their work place have also the stay near each other.

From security point of view we have to examine the following aspects:—As at the place of work, the employer also provides some security personnel to guard the colony and the entry of strangers is to some extent restricted. Employer formulates certain rules for observance in the colony which the employees and their families have to follow and which are not needed if the employee lives in the city. To this extent the employees may feel their freedom restricted. From the point of view of road or rail accidents, the employees and their families are less exposed to the danger as the trafic in the colony is much less than what it is in the city and travelling is reduced to the minimum. Similarly commission of minor crimes like thefts is also reduced as only employees and their families stay in the colony and the entry of outsiders is restricted.

However in time of strained relations between employer and employees especially in times of strikes and lockouts, biggest problem of security is involved. In the case of an employer having no housing scheme he has to look after the problems at the work place only. But for an employer having a housing colony he has to face double problem of security at the workplace as well as in the colony. If the agitation takes a violent turn, the problems of the employer became unlimited. The security of officers and loyal employees is exposed to danger not only at the workplace but also in the colony when employees stay

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ted lerted face to face. If many employees resort to violence, their eviction on large-scale is difficult both from legal and practical point of view. Similarly retrenchment on large scale or dismissal poses additional problem for the employer of getting the houses vacated by the retrenched employees as double axe falls on the employees, they may resist the eviction from the colony and thus create a law and order problem.

After considering all these socio-economic aspects an important question I wish to pose for thinking. An employer who provides housing should be considered to be a prosperous and successful employer. Housing is a very costly scheme and requires huge funds. Such an employer can spare funds. The question that comes is whether the employer should utilize these funds for such a costly welfare of a few employees or should he use these funds for erecting additional industries which will generate more employment for those who are not able even to get one time meals and thus add to the GNP. Such an employer has tested entrepreneurial ability coupled with funds. He is likely to create such employment and add to the national income within shortest time. When the resources in a developing country like ours are very scares and where millions of people are jobless and do not get even one time meals, should the welfare of a few fortunate people be carried on to such an extent or should such resources be utilized for generating more employment and adding to the national The question is of social priority and diverting the available resources from one activity to the other. It involves social, economic and political aspects and there are different pulls on the resources. The organized labour is more vocal in its demand for higher standards of living and speaks from a position of strength which cannot be ignored even if priorities on merits may be different. Here we have to strike a delicate balance between raising the standards of a few person and meeting basic needs of the society as a whole. Such a broad social question is beyond the scope of an employer and it requires to be examined by the Government only.

- (o) Words and expressions used but not defined in the Scheme shall have the meaning assigned to them in the Act.
- Secretary, Personnel Officer and other servants of the Board.—The Board may appoint a Secretary, a Personnel Officer and such other Officers and Servants on such forms and conditions of service as it deems fit:

Provided no post, the maximum salary of which exclusive of allowance is Rs. 500 and above per mensem shall be created and no appointment to such post shall be made by the Board except with the previous approval of the State Government:

Provided further that the previous approval of the State Government shall not be necessaryto any appointment in a leave vacancy of a duration of not more than three months.

- 6. Functions of the Board.—(1) The Board may take such measures as it may consider desirable for carrying out the objective of administering the Scheme set out in clause 2 including
- (i) ensuring the adequate supply and the full and proper utilisation of registered workers measures for-

for the purpose of facilitating the rapid turnout of work;

(ii) regulating the recruitment and entry into and the discharge from the scheme of

workers and allotment of registered workers in the pool to registered employers; (iii) determining and keeping under review the number of registered workers from time to time, on the registers or records and the increase or reduction to be made in the number

(iv) keeping, adjusting and maintaining the employers' registers, entering re-entering therein the name of any employer and where circumstances so require removing from the register the r the register the name of any registered employer in accordance with the provisions of this

(v) keeping, adjusting and maintaining, from time to time, such registers or record, as may be necessary of workers including any registers, or records of workers who are temporarily not available for work and whose absence has been approved by the Board;

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tion with nloading, and where circumstances so require, removing from any repair or record the name of an registered worker either at his own request or in accordances with the provisions of thi scheme:

(vi) grouping or re-grouping of all registered workers into such groups as may by determined by the Board, and reviewing the grouping of any registered worker on the

application of a registered worker;

(vii) making provision, subject to availability of funds, for welfare of registered worker including medical services in so far as such provision does not exist apart from this scheme (viii) recovering from registered employers contributies in respect of the expenses of

this scheme, wages, levy and any other contributions under this scheme;

(ix) making provision subject to availability of funds, for the health and safety measure in places where workers are employed in so far as such provision does not exist apart from

(x) maintaining and administering the workers' welfare fund, and recovering from at the registered employers contribution towards the fund when such fund is constitute

in accordance with the rules of the fund:

(xi) maintaining and administering provident fund and gratuity fund for registered workers in the pool when such funds are constituted.

- (2) A property, fund and other assets vesting in the Board shall be held and applied by i subject to the provisions and for the purposes of this scheme.
  - (3) The Board shall have and maintain its own fund to which shall be credited-

(a) all monies received by the Board from the State Government;

(b) all fees, wages and levies received by the Board under this scheme;

- (c) all monies received by the Board by way of sale and disposal of properties and other
- (d) interest on investment in securities and deposits, rents and all monies received b the Board in any other manner or from any other source.
- (4) All monies forming part of the funds shall be kept in current or deposit account with the State Bank of India or the Reserve Bank of India or in any nationalised scheduled Ban or invested in such securities as may be approved by the Board. Such accounts shall b operated by such officers of the Board as may be authorised by it:

Provided that, the Board may keep on hand such sum not exceeding Rs. 1,000 as the Boar may consider necessary.

- (5) The Board may with the previous permission of the State Government borrow mone from open market or otherwise with a view to provide itself with adequate sources.
- (6) The Board may accept deposits on such conditions as it deems fit from persons, a ties or establishments with whom it has to transact any business.
- (7) The Board shall make provision for such reserve and other denominated funds as ma be provided in this scheme.
- (8) The Board shall have the authority to spend such sum as it thinks, fit for the purpose authorised under the scheme from out of the general fund of the Board or from the reserv and other funds, as the case may be.
- (9) The Board shall cause the proper account to be kept of the cost of operating this scheme and of all receipts and expenses under this scheme.
- (10) The Board shall submit to the State Government-
- (a) as soon as may be after the first day of April, in every year and not later than the 31st day of October, an annual report on the working of the scheme during the preceding year ending the 31st of March, together with an audited balance sheet; and (b) copies of proceedings of the meeting of the Board.

(11) The Board may-

(i) fix the number of workers to be registered under the various categories

:. (ii) increase or decrease the number of workers in any category on the register from time to time, as may be necessary after a periodical review of the register and anticipate me of any ns of this

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(iii) sanction the temporary registration of a specified number of workers in any category for specific periods: of the scheme

(iv) devise forms, records, registers, statements and the like required for administration

(v) determine the wages, allowances and other conditions of service including age of retirement of registered workers;

(vi) fix the rate of levy under clause 42(1);

(vii) appoint, abolish or reconstitute the Committees under clause 28:

(viii) sanction the annual budget;

(ix) subject to the provisions of clause 5 appoint a Secretary, the Personnel Officer and other staff of the Board;

(x) make recommendation to the State Government about any modification in the schem (xi) settle disputes between registered employers and registered workers;

(xii) discuss statistics of output of labour and turn-out of work and record its observation

and directions:

(xiii) subject to such conditions ait thinks fit, delegate in writing to the committees Chairman, Secretary, or to any other officer of the Board any of the functions under this scheme.

- 7. Annual Estimate.—The Chairman shall at a special meeting to be held before the end of February in each year lay before the Board, the annual budget of the scheme for the year commencing on the first day of April then next ensuing iu such details and forms as the Board may from time to time specify. The Board shall consider the estimate so presented to it and shall within four weeks of its presentation sanction the same either unaltered or subject to such alteration as it may deem fit.
- 8. Responsibilities and duties of Chairman.—Without prejudice to the powers and functions of the Board the Chairman shall be generally responsible for satisfactory exectuion of the scheme and shall have powers to execute the decisions of the Board subject to its directions and in particular-

(a) to ensure that the decisions of the Board in regard to the adjustment of the registers of workers are carried out expeditiously;

(b) to ensure that the sanctions for temporary registration of workers are carried out

without delay;

(c) to supervise and control the working of the scheme;
(d) to take suitable steps if any irregularities are detected by him or brought to his notice;

(e) to ensure that the provisions of the scheme in regard to transfer and promotion of workers are carried out;

(f) to constitute medical boards when required;

(g) to ensure that conditions laid down in the scheme for the registration of employers are complied with by them;

(h) to ensure that all forms, registers, returns and documents, devised by the Board

are properly maintained;

(i) to ensure that suitable statistics in regard to the output of labour is complied and placed before the Board with appropriate remarks and explanations at such intervals as the Board may desire;

(j) (i) to sanction the creation of posts the maximum salary of which exclusive of allow-

ance is below Rs. 500 per month and to make appointment to such

(ii) to make appointments to posts, the maximum salary of which exclusive of allowances in Rs. 500 per month.

(k) to take disciplinary ction against registered workers and registered employers in accordance with the provisions of this scheme.

(1) to declare that there has been "a go slow" and to take action as authorised under this scheme.;

(m) to sanction the transfer of a monthly worker to the pool at the request of the

registered employer or the registered worker, as provided for in this scheme; (n) to deal with appeals from regisered workers and registered employers under clauses

(o) discharge all functions reating to disciplinary action against registered employers and workers to the extent permitted under clause 35.

- 9. Functions of Secretary.—Without prejudice to the powers and infections of the Board and the Chairman, the Secretary, shall perform duties imposed on him by this scheme in discharge of his duties and in particular be responsible for-
  - (a) keeping adjusting and mantiaining the register of employers entering or re-entering therein the name of any employer and where the circumstances so require removing from the register the name of any registered employer in accordance with the provisions of this scheme;
  - (b) keeping adjusting and maintaining from time to time, such registers or records as ma be necessary, of workers, including any registers or records of workers, who are tempor arily not available for work and whose absence has been approved by the Board and wher the circumstances require removing from any registers or records the name of an worker, either at his request or in accordance with the provisions of this scheme;
  - (c) the employment and control of registered workers who are available for wor when they are not otherwise employed in accordance with this scheme;
  - (d) the grouping or re-grouping of registered workers in suitable pools, in accordance with the instructions received from the Board in such groups as may be determined, b the Board;
  - (e) the allotment of registered workers in the pool who are available for work to registe employers and for this purpose, the Secretary shall-

(i) make the fullest possible use of registered workers in the pool;

- (ii) keep the record of attendance at call stands or control points of registered workers (iii) provide for the maintenance of records of employment and earnings of registere
- (iv) make a cause to be made the necessary entries in the attendance cards, and the
- wage slips of the workers in the reserve pool as laid down in clause 23.
- (f) (i) the collection of levy or any other contribution from the employers under the scheme;

(ii) the collection from registered workers of contribution to the Provident Fund Insurance Fund or any other fund which may be constituted under the scheme.

(iii) the payment to each daily worker of all earnings lawfully due to him

- registered employer and the payment to such worker of all monies payable by the Board in accordance with the provisions of this scheme;
- (g) appointing subjects to budget provisions such officers and servants from time t time, as may be authorised by the Board or the Chairman to appoint;
- (h) the keeping of proper accounts of the cost of operating this scheme and of a receipts and expenses under it and making and submitting to the Board an Annual Report and Audited Balance-sheet and profit and loss accounts statements;
- (i) framing budget annually for submission to the Board on or before the 15th day February each year;
- (j) maintaining complete service records of all registered workers and record shee of all registered employers;
- (k) authorising the employment of unregistered workers in case registered worker are not available for work in the pool or in such other circumstances as the Chairma may approved; and
- (1) such other functions as may, from time to time, subject to the provisions of th scheme be assigned to him by the Board or the Chairman.
- 10. Function of Personel Officer.—The Personal Officer shall assist the Secretar in the discharge of his duties and shall in particular carry out the functions assigned to him b clause 35 of this scheme.
- 11. Maintenance of Registers.—(1) Register of employer.—There shall be a register of employers in the form devised by the Board wherein the names and addresses of the employers, registered under the scheme shall be entered.
- (2) Monthly register.—There shall be a register of workers who are engaged by the Boar wherein the names and addresses of workers registered under this schemes shall be entered It shall be duly maintained.

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- (3) Monthly registers.—There shall be a register of workers who are engaged by each employer on contract on monthly basis and who are known as monthly workers.
- (4) Pool register.—There shall be a register of workers other than these on the monthly register known as pool wokers. This register shall include a sub-pool of workers who are not attached to any gangs to fill casual vacancies in gangs. The workers included in such a sub-pool shall be known as leave reserve workers.
- 12. Classification of workers.—The board shall arrange for the classification of workers in suitable categories as may be determined, from time to time.
- 13. Fixation of number of workers on the registers.—The Board shall determine before the commencement of registration in any category, the number of workers required in that category in consultation with the employers.
- 14. Registration of employers.—Every employer engaged in selling, purchasing or trading or acting as agent in Grocery Markets or Shops, Railway Yards and Goods sheds and Khoka making establishments and Timber Markets or Shops and other establishments and Timber Markets or Shops and other establishments. lishments in the Trades in the areas to which the scheme applies shall get registered with the Board by applying in "Form 'A'" appended to the scheme within fifteen days from the date of coming into force of this clause. Provided, however, that an employer of any establishment coming into existence after the commencement of the scheme shall apply for a Registration simultaneously on the commencement of this business.
- 15. Registration of existing and new workers.—(1) (a) Any worker who on the date of enforcement of this scheme is already working in the employment in the area to which the scheme applies shall be registered under this scheme.
- (b) The qualifications for new registration shall be such as may be specified by the Board having regard to local conditions, physical fitness, capacity and/or experience. Citizen of India only shall be eligible for registration.
- (c) Registration of workers in any new category shall be from among workers who have been or were working in the said employment on any such date as the Board may specific in this behalf provided that, the worker is medically fit and is not more than 60 years of age.
- (2) Notwithstanding any provisions of this scheme, where the Board is of opinion that a worker has secured his registration by furnishing false information in his application or by withholding any information required therein or where it appears that a worker has been registered improperly or incorrectly the Board may direct the removal of his name from the registers.

Provided that, before giving any such direction, the Board shall give such worker opportunity of showing cause why the proposed direction should not be issued.

- 16. Promotion and transfer of workers. - (2) A vacancy (other than a casual vacancy), in any category of monthly worker may b filled only by promotion from lower categories of monthly workers in the gang, or, if no worker is suitable for promotion from lower categories of monthly worker in the same gang of a worker in the same or a superior category in the pool why may be selected by registered employers or a group of employers.

Explanation.—The criteria for promotion shall ordinarily be

Note.—A transfer from the pool register to the monthly register in the same category

(3) The Chairman or the Secretary may for sufficient and valid reasons allow the transf of a monthly worker to the pool on a request in writing of the employer or the work explaining fully the reasons for the transfer provided that such transfer shall be subject to t *LABOUR GAZETTE—JUNE 1* 

of any contract subsisting between the monthly worker and his employer regarding termination of employment. No transfer shall take place without the prior approval of the Chairman or the Secretary.

- (4) If the services of a monthly worker are terminated by the employer for an act of indiscipline or misconduct he may apply to the Board for employment in the pool. The Secretary on behalf of the Board shall then decide on the merits of the case, whether or not the worker should be employed by the Board and if so, whether in the same or a lower category.
- (5) If a monthly worker is transferred to, or employed in, the pool under sub-clause (3) or sub-clause (4) as the case may be his previous service shall be reckoned for all benefits in the pool and the employers shall transfer to the Board all benefits that have accrued to the worker in respect of his previous service as if such service has not been transferred. ployer shall contribute, to the Board such amount of the Provident Fund of the worker, if any. standing to his credit in the Provident Fund of which he is a member and such amount towards his leave and gratuity as may have been due to him under any contract subsisting between the worker and his employer or under any law, award or agreement applicable to such worker, as if his services had been terminated by the employer.
- Medical examination.—(1) If the Board considers it to be necessary so to do it may require, a new worker before registration to undergo, free of charge, a medical examination for physical fitness by a Medical Officer nominated by the Chairman for this purpose. A worker found medically unfit by a Medical Officer may apply in writing to the Chairman and simultaneouly deposit with him such fees as may be specified in this behalf for examination by a Medical Board. On receipt of such a request, the Chairman shall set up a Medical Board. The decision of the Medical Board shall be final and a worker who is medically unfit shall not be entitled to registration.
- (2) If the Chairman deems it necessary so to do he may require a worker undergo free of charge a medical examination by a Medical Board to be constituted by the Chairman. The decision of the Medical Board shall be final, and a worker if found permanently unfit by a Medical Board, the Chairman shall terminate his services for this th.
- 18. Registration fee.—(i) A registration fee of rupee one shall be paid to the Board by each worker at the time of registration under this scheme.
- (ii) A registration fee of Rs. twenty-five shall be paid by each employer at the time of registration under this Scheme.
- Supply of cards.—(1) Every registered worker shall be supplied with (i) an identity card; (ii) an attendance card; (iii) wage slips in the forms, deceased by the Board.
- (2) In case of loss of card, a fresh card will be issued but the cost thereof, which will be fixed by the Board shall be payable by the worker concerned.
- 20. Service records for registered workers.- A service record for every monthly and daily worker shall be maintained in a form to be specified by the Board which shall contain, among other things a complete record of disciplinary actions taken against the workers, promotions commendations for good work, etc. and such other matters as the Board may think fit. Such. details in respect of monthly workers shall be supplied to the Board by the registered employers.
- 21. Record sheets for registered employers.—The Personnel Officer shall maintain a record sheet in respect of each registered employer in a form to be devised by the Board which shall contain among other things, a complete record of disciplinary action taken against the registered employer.
- 22. Surrender of cards.—A worker's card shall be surrendered to the Board in the following circumstances, viz:—

(a) when proceeding on leave for seven days or more;

(b) when retiring from service;

(c) when dismissed or discharged from service;
(d) when temporarily suspended; or

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Provided that, the employer of a monthly worker shall also surrender the card of the worker to the Board in the case of (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e) above.

- 23. Entries in attendance card and wage slip.—(1) A Registered worker in the pool shall hand over to the Board at the time he is allotted for work to a registered employer his attendance card, the Board shall make necessary entries in the attendance card in respect of the period of work done by worker, and return it to him on completion of his engagement. For each day of work, the Board shall supply as soon as possible, a wage slip showing the wages earned by a worker.
- (2) A monthly worker shall hand over to his employer at the time when he is allotted his work attendance card. The employer shall make necessary entries in the card in respect of the period of work done by the worker and return it to him on the completion of his allotted work. For each day of work, the employer shall supply as soon as possible a wage-slip showing wages carned by a worker.
- 24. Employment of workers.—(1) A monthly worker of a particular category allotted to a registered employer or a group of employers shall be entitled to be employed for work in that category by that employer or group of employees in preference to any worker of the same category in the pool.
- (2) If the number of worker on the monthly register in a particular category is not sufficient for the work available, the workers on the pool register in that category shall be employed.
- (3) A monthly worker of one employer or a group of employers shall not be employed by an other employer or group of employers, except with the previous approval of the Chairman or Secretary.
- 25. Filling up of casual vacancies.—Casual vacancies of monthly worker shall be filled up in the following manner:

When a Head Mukadam or Mukadam is absent the vacancy shall be filled by a senior person of the same gang in the employment of employer.

- 26. Disappointment money.—When a worker in the pool presents himself for work and for any reason the work for which he has been allotted cannot commence or proceed and no alternative work can be found for him and he is relieved within two hours of his attending for work he shall be entitled to disappointment money from the employer at a rate as may be: fixed by the Board appropriate to the category to which he belongs. A worker detained for more than two hours shall be paid full wages inclusive of dearness allowance.
- 27. Holidays.—Each worker shall be entitled in a year to four holidays with pay at such rates as may be specified by the Board under clause 33. Out of the four holidays three holidays will be on (i) 26th January (Republic Day), (ii) 1st May (Maharashtra-Day), and (iii) 15th August (Independence Day). The fourth holidays shall be decided by the Board.
- 28. Committees.—(1) The Board may appoint one or more Committees to whom it may entrust such of its functions as it may deem necessary to facilitate compliance with the provisions of this scheme and may abolish or reconstitute them as it may deem necessary. Persons who are not members of the Board may, if necessary, be nominated as co-opted members of the Committee. Such co-opted members, however, shall not have any right of vote.
- 29. Obligations of registered workers.—(1) Every registered worker shall be deemed to have accepted the obligation of this scheme.
- (2) A registered worker in the pool who is available for work shall deemed to be in the employment of the Board.
- (3) A registered worker in the pool who is available for work shall not engage himself or employment under registered em loyer, unless he is allotted to that employer by the Secretary.

- (4) A registered worker in the pool who is available for work shall carry out direction of the Board and shall—
  - (a) report as such call stands or control points and at such times as may be specific by the Board and shall remain at such call stands or control points;
  - (b) accept any employment under registered employer whether in the category in which he has been registered or any other category for which he is considered suitable by the Board.
- (5) A registered worker who is available for work when allotted by the Board for employme under a registered employer shall carry out his duties in accordance with the directions of surregistered employer or his authorised representative or supervisor and the rates of the employment or place where he is working.
- 30. Obligation of registered employers.—(1) Every registered employer shall accept to obligation of the scheme.
- (2) Subject to the provisions of clause 24 a registered employer shall not employ a work other than a worker who has been allotted to him by the Secretary in accordance with privisions of clause 9 (c).
- (3) A registered employer shall, in accordance with instructions as may be given by t Board, submit all available information of his current and future labour requirements.
- (4) A registered employer shall lodge with the Board, unless otherwise directed, particula of the tonnage handed by workers on piece-rate and such other statistical data as may required in respect of the registered workers engaged by him.
- (5) A registered employer, shall pay to the Board, in such manner and at such times the Board may direct, the levy payable under clause 42(1) and the gross wages due to daily workers and any other amount due to daily workers.
- (6) A registered employer shall keep such records as the Board may require, and sha produce before the Board or such person as may be designated by the Board upon reasonab notice all such records and any other documents of any kind relating to registered worke and to the work upon which they have been employed and furnish such information relating the set out in any notice or directions issued by or on behalf of the Board
- 31. Restriction on employment.—(1) No employer (other than a registered employer any area to which this scheme applies) shall enage for employment a worker unless that work is a registered worker.
  - (2) Notwithstanding the preceding provisions of the clause—
    - (a) where the Secretary is satisfied that—

(i) the work is emergently required to be done; and

(ii) it is not reasonably practicable to obtain registered worker for that work, to Secretary may, subject to any limitation imposed by the Board, allow a registered employ to employ a worker who is not a registered worker. In selecting such workers the local Employment Exchange Organisation shall as far as possible be consulted:

Provided that, whenever unregistered workers have to be employed the Secreta shall obtain, if possible, the prior approval of the Chairman to the employment of such workers, and where this is not possible, shall report to the Chairman within 24 hou the full circumstances under which such workers were employed and the Chairman shaduly inform the Board of such employment at its next meeting;

- (b) the Board may, subject to such conditions as it may specify, permit employment unregistered workers on a holiday, if work is required to be done on that day, to the exteregistered workers are not available for work:
- (c) in the case referred to in items (a) and (b), the person so employed as aforesaid by registered employer shall for, the purposes of clauses 30(4), (5) and (6) and clause be treated in respect of that work, as if he were a daily worker.
- (3) A registered worker in the pool may, provided he fulfils fully his obligations und clause 29, take up employment elsewhere on those days on which he is not allotted for wo by the Board.



32. Circumstances in which this scheme ceases to apply.—(1) This scheme shall cease to apply to a registered worker when his name has been removed from the register or record in accordance with the provisions of the scheme.

(2) This scheme shall cease to apply to a registered employer when his name has been removed from the employer's register in accordance with the provisions of this scheme.

(3) Nothing in this clause shall affect any obligation incurred or right accured during any time when a person was a registered worker or a registered employer.

Wages, allowances and other conditions of service of workers.—Without prejudice to the provisions of any award it shall be, unless otherwise specifically provided for in this scheme an implied conditions of the contract between a registered worker (whether in the pool or on the monthly register) and registered employer that the rates, allowances and overtime, hours of work, rest intervals, leave with wages and other conditions of service shall be such as may be fixed by the Board for each category of workers.

Disbursement of wages and other allowances to registered workers.—The Board may permit the registered employers to pay wages and other allowances to the registered monthly workers employed by them directly after making such deductions as may be authorised and recoverable from them under this scheme. In respect of workers other than monthly workers mployed by the registered employees from time to time, the wages and other allowances payable by the registered employers shall be remitted by the registered employers by cheque to the Secretary of the Board every fortnight. The Secretary thereupon shall arrange to disburse the wages and other dues if any to the registered workers on a specified day every month subject to deductions recoverable from them under this scheme.

Disciplinary procedure.—(1) (i) The Personnel Officer may on receipt of the information whether on a complaint or otherwise that a registered employer has failed to carry out the provisions of this scheme after investigating the matter, give him a warning in writing, or

(ii) where in his opinion, a higher penalty is merited, the Personnel Officer shall report the case to the Chairman who may then cause such further investigation to be made as he may deem fit and take any of the following steps as regards that employer, that is to say,

(a) censure him and record the censure in his record sheet; or

(b) subject to the approval of the Board and after one month's notice in writing given to the registered employer, remove his name from the employers' register for such period as determined by the Board or permanently.

(2) A registered worker in the pool who fails to comply with any of the provisions of the scheme or commits any act of indiscipline or misconduct may be reported in writing to the Personnel Officer who may after investigating the matter give him a warning in writing.

(3) Where in the opinion of the Personnel Officer, a higher punishment than that provided in sub-clause (2) is merited, he shall report the case to the Chairman.

(4) On receipt of the written report from the Personnel Officer under sub-clause (3) or from employers or any other person that a registered worker in the pool has failed to comply with any of the provisions of this scheme or has committed an act of indiscipline or misconduct or has consistently failed to produce the standard or datum output or has been inefficient in any other manner, the Chairman may make or cause to be made such further investigation as he may deem fit and thereafter take any of the following steps, as regards the worker concerned, that is to say, he may impose any of the following penalties:

(b) terminate his services after giving one month's notice or one month's wages inclusive of dearness allowance in lieu thereof; or

(5) Before any action is taken under this clause the person concerned shall be given an opportunity to show cause why the proposed action should not be taken against him.

(6) Without prejudice to the powers of the Chairman under clause 36 a registered employer shall have full powers to take disciplinary action against monthly workers employed under him.

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- 36. Special disciplinary powers of the Chairman.—(1) Notwithstanding anything co in the scheme if the Chairman is satisfied after enquiry that a "go slow" has been to by any gang of registered workers or any individual worker and is being continue peated by the same gang or worker or different gangs or workers on the same or or places of work he may make a declaration in writing to that effect.
- (2) When a declaration under sub-clause (1) has been made it shall be lawful for the
  - (i) in case of monthly workers, to take, without prejudice to the rights of the re employers, such disciplinary action including removal against such workers as consider appropriate; and
  - (ii) in case of registered workers in the pool to take such disciplinary action in dismissal against such workers as he may consider appropriate.
  - (3) The Chairman may take disciplinary action—
    - (i) where "go slow" is resorted to by a gang against all the members of the gang (ii) where "go slow" is resorted to by a worker against the worker concerned.
- (4) Before any disciplinary action is taken under this clause against any worker or ar of workers, such worker or gang shall be given an opportunity to show cause why the pr action should be taken against him or it:

Provided that, the Chairman may before giving an opportunity to show cause und sub-clause, suspend from work any worker or gang of workers immediately after a decl has been made under sub-clause (1).

- (5) A declaration by the Chairman that a "go slow" has been resorted to by a wo a gang of workers shall be final, and shall not be liable to be questioned on any ground soever.
- 37. Termination of employment.—(1) The employment of a registered worker in the shall not be terminated except in accordance with the provisions of the scheme.
- (2) A registered worker in the pool shall not leave his employment with the Board by giving fourteen days' notice in writing to the Board of forfeiting fourteen days' inclusive of dearness allowance in lieu thereof.
- (3) When the employment of a registered worker with the Board, has been terminated sub-clause (1) and (2) his name shall forthwith be removed from the register or Board.
- 38. Appeals by workers.—(1) Save as otherwise provided in this clause, a worker pool who is aggrieved by an order passed by an authority under clause 35, may prefer an against the order of the Personnel Officer to the Chairman and against the order of the man to the State Government.
  - (2) A worker who is aggrieved by an order of the Secretary
    - (i) placing him in a particular group in the register or record; or
    - (ii) refusing registration under clause 15, or
  - (iii) requiring him under clause 29(4)(b) to undertake any work which is not same category to which he belongs may prefer an appeal to the Chairman.
- (3) Any worker who is aggrieved by an order under clause 16(4) may prefer an ap the Chairman.
- (4) No appeal shall lie where due notice has been given of the removal of the nan registered worker from the register or record in accordance with the instructions of the if the ground of removal is that the registered worker falls within a class of descript workers whose names are to be removed from the register or record in order to redu

Provided that, an appeal shall lie to the Chairman where the registered workers that he does not belong to the class or description of workers referred to in the instruc

(5) Every appeal referred to in sub-clauses (1), (2), (3) or (4) shall be in writing a preferred within fourteen days of the date of receipt of the order appealed against :

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Provided that, the appellate authority; may for reasons to be recorded admit as appeal preferred after the expiry of fourteen days.

Appeals by employers.—(1) (i) A registered employer who is aggrieved by an order of the Personnel Officer under clause 35(1) (ii) may appeal to the Chairman;

(ii) in the case of an appeal against an order under clause 35(1)(ii)(b) the Chairman shall. forthwith refer the matter to the State Government. The State Government shall make such order on the appeal as it thinks fit.

(2) Every appeal referred to in sub-clause (1) shall be in writing and preferred within fourteen days of the receipt of the order appealed against .:

Provided that, the appellate authority may for reasons to be recorded, admit an appeal preferred after the expiry of fourteen days.

40. Powers of revision of the Chairman.—Notwithstanding anything contained in the scheme the Chairman in case of an order passed by Personnel Officer under clause 35 may at any time call for the record of any proceeding in which the Personnel Officer has passed the order for the purpose of satisfying himself as to the legality or propriety thereof and may pass such order in relation thereto as he may think fit:"

Provided that, the Chairman shall not pass any order under this clause which may prejudicially affect the interests of any person without giving such person reasonable opportunity of bring heard.

- 41. Stay of order in case of certain appeals.—Where an appeal is made by a worker in accordance with the provisions of clause 38 against an order of termination of service on its one month's notice or where an appeal is preferred by an employer in accordance with the provisions of clause 39 against an order removing his name from the employers' register under clause 35(1)(ii)(b) the appellate authority may suspend the operation of the order appealed from pending the hearing and disposal of the appeal.
- 42. Cost of operating the scheme.—(1) The cost of operating this scheme shall be defrayed by payments made by the registered employers to the Board. Every registered employer shall pay to the Board such amount by way of levy in respect of registered workers allotted to and engaged by him as the Board may, from time to time, specify by written order to the registered employers and in such manner and at such time as the Board may direct.
- (2) In determining what payments are to be made by the registered employers under subclause (1) the Board may fix different rate of levy for different categories of work or workers provided that, the levy shall be so fixed that the same rate of levy will apply to all registered employers who are in like circumstances.
- (3) The Board shall not sanction any levy exceeding fifty per cent of the estimated total wage bill calculated on the basis of the daily time rate wage without the prior approval of the State Government:
- (4) A registered employer shall on demand make a payment to the Board by way of deposit or provide such other security for the due payment of the amount referred to in sub-clause-(1), as the Board-may consider necessary.
- (5) The Secretary shall, furnish from time to time, to the Board such statistics and other information as may reasonably be required in connection with the operation and financing of the scheme.
- (6) If a registered employer fails to make the payment due from him under sub-clause (1) within the time specified by the Board, the Secretary shall serve a notice on the employer to the effect that, unless he pays his dues within three days from the date of receipt of the notice, the supply of registered workers to him shall be suspended. On the expiry of the notice period with the Secretary shall suspend the supply of registered workers to defaulting employer until-he; pays his dues.
- 43. Provident Fund and Gratuity.—(1) The Board in respect-of the workers in the pool) and the registered employers, in respect of their monthly workers, shall frame and operate rules providing for Contributory Provident Fund. The rules shall provide for the rate of contribution from the workers and the employers, the manner and method of payment and such other matters as may be considered necessary:

Provided that, the rules applicable to monthly workers shall not be less favourable than organica promise at health ingress and a facility and the those relating to workers in the pool.

(2) The Board shall frame rules for payment of gratuity to registered workers.

- (3) The rules for Provident Fund and Gratuity framed by the Board shall be subject to the previous approval of the State Government.
- 44. Penalties.—Whoever, contravenes the provisions of clauses 14, 30, 31 shall, on conviction, be punishable with a fine which may extend to Rupees five hundred.

In April 1974, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class Series) for the Bombay Centre with base January to December 1960 eq 100 was 259 being 10 points higher than that in the preceding month index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 living survey at the Bombay Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 13 points to 288 of a rise in the average prices of rice, wheat, jowar, arhardal, moongdal, magroundnut oil, milk, curd, sugar, tealeaf, jalebi, tea (readymade), cold and sub-group index of vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco etc. group increased points to 284 due to a rise in the average prices of panleaf, pan finished, s katha and chewing tobacco.

The index number for housing remained constant at 120.

#### SHOLAPUR\*

### 288-A rise of 9 points

In April 1974, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Sholapur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 288, being 9 points higher than in that the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Sholapur City.

The index number for the food group increased by 7 points to 317 due to a rise in the average prices of wheat, jowar, arhardal, gramdal, masurdal, groundnut oil, ghee, salt, chillies (green), chillies (dry), tamarind, coconut, tealeaf and bhajia and a rise in the sub-group index of vegetable and fruits.

The index number for the pan supari, to bacco etc. group increased by 6 points to 227 due to a rise in the average price of panleaf.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 20 points to 249 due to a rise in the average prices of firewood, coal and kerosene oil.

The index number for housing remained steady at 153.

The index number for the miscellaneous groups increased by 13 points to 214 due to a rise in the average prices of Doctor's fee, railway fare, hair oil, ornaments, utensils (copper), and tailoring charges (shirt).

From the enquiries, it is revealed that the Union as not instigated, aided or assisted commencement or continuation of strike or stoppage which has been held or declared to be illegal within six months immediately preceding the date of application for registration or thereafter.

The Rules made by the Union relate to its memberships dock not contain. any provision debarring any employee employed in the Chemical Industry from being a member of the Union on the ground that he is not an employee in any particular undertaking in the said Industry.

After conducting the enquiries I have come to the conclusion that the conditions requisite for the registration of the Union, as specified under section 13(1) of the Act and the Rule 28-A of the Rules have been satisfied and that the Union is not otherwise disqualified for registration.

I, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred on me under section 14 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 and Rule 26 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Rules, 1947, do hereby on 22nd day of April 1974 register the General Workers Union, Chandrapur as Representative Union the Chemical Industry for the local area of Chanda Taluka excluding the area of Chanda Municipality.
