



## The Month in Brief

Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class :---

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for working class for the month of July 1979 with average prices for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 351, 368 and 346 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Pune and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for working class for the month of July 1979 with the average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 353, 363, 328 and 379 respectively.

#### All India Average Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers ;-

All india Average Consumer Price Index Number for Industrial Workers. (General) on Base 1960 == 100 for July 1979 was 353 as compared to 345 in June 1979. The Index Number for July 1979 on Base 1949 == 100 derived from 1960 based Index worked out to 429 as against 419 for June 1979.

#### Industrial Disputes in Maharashtra State :---

During June 1979, there were 30 disputes involving 3,583 workmen and a time loss of 53,176 mandays as compared to 26 disputed in May 1979 involving 7,618 workmen and a time loss of 52,248 mandays. Further particulars of Industrial Disputes are given at pages 88 and 89 of this issue.

#### Benefits under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme :--

During the month of July 1979, 6722 insured Persons received Rs. 13,38,141.95 cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 2,226 persons who were in receipt of pensions for permanent disablement and 9,222 who were in respect of Dependent Benefit as dependent's of deceased Insured persons. During the month, 8,592 accidents were reported as against 9,706 during the preceding month.

Partnership in Industrial Relations Vital for Progress, says ILO Director-General An increased role for employers' and workers' organisations in solving Industrial relations problems was one of the conditions for progress in modern society Director-General Francis Blanchard of the International labour Office said in Paris today.

Techniques of participation must therefore be improved and their scope widened, he told the Fifth World Congress of the International Industrial Relations Association. The prime aim was to maintain the ideals and strengthen the structure of society founded on freedom and responsibility.

Negotiators on both sides were under mounting pressures and constraints, he said. On one hand more direct and effective pressure was being felt in the determination of employment and working conditions. At the same time employers' and workers' organisations were under constraints from governments seeking to keep wage agreements within the bounds of economic plans and measures to hold down inflation and unemployment.

The big questions, said Mr. Blanchard, were how to meet the rising hopes of workers for greater equity and security, and how to preserve the voluntary character of negotiations in the face of often imperative prices and income s policies.

There were also problems of avoiding the risk of aggravation of industr ial disputes, particularly wildcat strikes, and of reconciling sectoral and gene ral interests by means of tripartite negotiation at the highest level.

Were the problems brought on by the present crisis, he asked, of such a nature that they called for a revision of the concepts and procedures of industrial relations practice ?

In an effort to bringt ogether all the elements of an answer to these questions the ILO was co-operating closely with research bodies and practitioners in all regions, through its major programme of industrial relations, in order to arrive at a clearer understanding of problems and to work out practical solutions.

In response to a resolution adopted by the International Labour Conference last June the ILO was preparing to step up its action, in particular to find formulas for applying universally valid principles to greatly varied national situations.

The Organisation would increase its co-operation with industrially advanced countries to adopt industrial relations techniques and practices to meet the great problems of the future, said Mr. Blanchard. It was also intensifying co-operation with developing countries, paying special attention to the informal and small enterprise sectors.

#### Selective Approach towards computerisation

The Energy Minister, Shri K. C. Pant, has asked for a selective approach in the adoption of computerisation in India. He said that the introduction of computer technology in India has always evoked mixed reactions. Some feel that computers will displace men and thereby add to unemployment. Others point to the experience of advanced countries where computerisation has led to employment of more skilled technicians and larger employment in the economy. The Minister said that the advantages of computerisation would clearly out weigh the negative factors.

Shri Pant was inaugurating an international symposium on computer applications in large scale power systems here today. The symposium has been sponsored by the International Federation of Automatic Control and organised by the Institution of Engineers (India).

Shri Pant said that we were reaching a stage where computers could be beneficially used. He said that India had, at present an installed generating capacity of nearly 29,000 mw and another 15,000 mw was targetted to be added in the current plan period.

Referring to application of computers in India, the Minister said that the use of computers to prepare operation schedules were being developed. The net work planning which had become complex was being done through computer applications some utilities had started using computers for consumer billing. Thus application of computers in the power system was gradually going up, the Minister added.

Shri Pant said that power development was a highly capital intensive activity and expansion of power supply facility accounted for the bulk of the development in the State Plan. Nearly 23 per cent. of the current plan outlay would be for the power sector, Shri Pant added.

#### Training Scheme for Rural Youth.

A comprehensive programme to train two lakh rural youth every year in agriculture and allied fields for self-employment has been finalised by the Union Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation. The programme is to be launched on August 15, 1979.

The National Scheme of Training Rural Youth for Self-Employment (TRYSEM) will cover rural areas throughout the country in each of the 5,000 development blocks and train at least 40 persons every year.

The main thrust of the scheme will be on equipping rural youth with necessary skills and technology to enable them to seek self-employment. After the completion of training, the trainces will be given appropriate support from Government for setting up their own enterprises.

An important part of the training programme is the identification of the various fields and sectors of activities where there is considerable scope for gainful self-employment. This will be best done at the district/block level since training will be related to the local needs and potentialities. For strengthening the essential infrastructure of training institutions run by the Central Government and by organisations under it, as well as agricultural

universities, 100 per cent grant-in-aid will be sanctioned by the Centre. For other institutions, the expenditure will be shared by the Central and the State Government on a 50: 50 basis.

#### Bonus for Good Behaviour Likely

According to the Union Minister of Labour, Mr. Fazlur Rahman, the Centre is contemplating linking bonus with either good behaviour, good attendance or good production. Mr. Rahman said on August 6th, 1979 that either an Ordinance would be promulgated or a Bill brought before Parliament soon. This would, however, not affect the payment of bonus for last year.

#### PF Scheme for Karala Farm Workers Inaugurated

A provident fund scheme for agricultural workers, the first of its kind in the country, was inaugurated on August 10, 1979 by the Kerala Chief Minister. The scheme, started in the Palghat District initially, is proposed to be extended to all the districts in due course and is expected to benefit about 20-lakh agricultural labourers in Kerala. The Chief Minister said that the workers, employed by farmers with a holding of one hectare and below, would not be covered by the scheme.

#### Productivity and Bargaining

Workers in U.S. Manufacturing each produced an average of 32,000 worth of goods and services in 1978. That's about twice as much as was produced by each worker in 1950 in dollars corrected for inflation.

Understanding whay workers produce more can lead to policies which help to raise living standards. But "increased productivity" is all too often a catch phrase and excuse for a variety of attacks on unions, laws protecting worker health, safety and the environment, the tax structure and essential public facilities and services.

Productivity will increase when better ways are found to produce and distribute goods and services enabling each worker to produce more in each hour worked. Productivity can be improved by the use of new and better machinery, better scheduling of work flows or a better-education and bettertrained workforce.

All of these can be beneficial because thay are a source of improved living standards—if the benefits are shred and distributed equally. Unfortunately some people say they want to increase productivity when they mean they just want to increase someone's workload.

Productivity is a measure of efficiency and is determined by dividing the goods produced by the number of hourse worked. If a worken produces 200 widgets in 40 hours, the productivity is five widgets per hour. It's not much different than determining the efficiency of a baseball hitter whose batting average is determined b of times at bat.

Productivity gains are fundamental to economic growth and are a source of higher wages, more holidays and vacations, earlier retirement and general improvement in living standards. Productivity increase can also have destructive effects on workers and their jobs, so workers have a vital interest in how new production methods are introduced in the workplace.

Collective bargaining plays a crucial role in meeting both the dangers and opportunites of increased productivity. The flexibility of collective bargaining helps workers and their unions to settle with employers on reasonable and humane protections against the adverse effects of new production methods.

But the union role of protecting workers from the adverse impact of productivity is only one dimension of the collective bargaining agreement, which also does much to stimulate productivity. The needed protections, in such areas as job safety, can themselves contribute mightly to productivity gains by reducing time lost to injuries. And the stability brought to the workforce through acceptance of seniority, the grievance procedure or other standard feathures of a collective bargining contract can contribute to worker morale and consequently to productivity.

#### French Legislation on Unemployment Benefits

Act No. 79-32 of January 16, 1979 governing unemployment assistance in France revises the system of unemployment compensation and sets out a new Framework for establishing benefits. The procedures for implementing the new scheme must be worked out by the two sides of industry responsible for UNEDIC, the joint unemployment insurance agency, in the three months following publication of the Act. However, if there is no agreement during this time, a solution will be imposed, with immediate effect, by decree of the Council of State, The present unemployment benefit system was set up by Ordinance No. 67-580 of July 13, 1967, which brought in comprehensive public assistance (flatrate benefits subject to means test) and extended the scope of the unemployment insurance scheme (earnings-related benefits) established by the agreement of December 31, 1958 setting up the UNEDIC scheme. Changes in the employment situation, particularly since 1974, and the substantial increase in unemployment resulting from these changes (a record figure of 1,344,100 in October, 1978), have created financial diffculties for the unemployment insurance scheme. Further complications arose from the coexistence of two compensation schemes, causing inconvenience to both the fund operators and the beneficiaries. Realising the need for reform, the Government, proposed setting up a new system to meet the following criteria : it should be jointly operated, institute a single source of compensation, be more simple, grant more equ table benefits and take into consideration the need to provide greater incentives to take up work again. Although negotiations along these lines were begun between employers and unions in June 1978, they broke down because of disagreement. The Government therefore went ahead and submitted a bill

to Parliament in December 1978, which was adopted at the beginning of. January 1979.

The characteristics of the new unemployment benefit system are described below :

Institution of a single scheme. In future all benefits will be paid from the same source. Public assistance will be abolished, and the State will pay UNEDIC a subsidy equal to the budgetary appropriations earmarked for public assistance (7,000 million frances in 1979 : 1 US dollar = 4.15 French frances), which will subsequently vary at the same rate as the total contributions from employers and wage earners. In furture there will be three main types of allowance, instead of half a dozen : the basic allowance , payable to all workers dismissed other than for economic reasons who are not entitled either to the special allowance nor to the income maintenance allowance : there will be a celling and a time, limit and it may vary according to the workers' age.

The special allowance payable for a maximum of 12 months to workers under 60 years of age dismissed for economic reasons. Its amount is digressive on a quarterly basis, but it may not be less than 90 per cent of the average minimum growth wage. Recipients of this allowance who return to work will be entitled to a retraining incentive bonus.

The income maintenance allowanch cpayable to wage earners aged 60 or over Morcover, during a limited period, spcial categories of workers, e.g. young. job seekers aged 16 years or over, women who for not more than two years have been widowed, divorced, legally separated or single with at least one dependent child, and former prisoners, may receive a flat-rate allowance, provided they have completed initial training or followed a course of practical training.

The scheme will cover all wage earners. Every employer within an area covered by the national interocupational scheme of special allowances for unemployed workers in industry and commerce is required to insure against loss of employment all wage earners employed under a contract of employment, including those detached or working permanently overseas.

#### Proposed Retirement Age in Japan

The Labour Ministry has proposed the extension of compulsory retirement age and a thorough review of seniority based wage systems to improve the employment situation for middle-aged and elderly people and their standard of living.

In the 1979 White Paper on labour, the ministry said the employment situation had improved as a whole in 1978, but it had become increasingly difficult for elderly workers to find new jobs after retirement.

The number of new job offers made in 1978 showed an increase of 6.3 per cent from the previous year, but it became more difficult for older people to find new jobs as a result of marked rise in the number of jobs seekers aged 45

The deterioration in employment chances for lolder workers in contrast to the improved general employment picture was attributed to the fact that most enterprises tried to dismiss older workers first in carrying out costreduction efforts. Also most businesses set the compulsory retirement age limit between 55 and 60.

The White Paper, presented by Labour Minister, Mr. Yuko Kurihara, said that this is because continued employment of older workers involves payment of bigger wages, resulting in increased personnel costs.

The reduction in such costs is the most effective method for improving employment prospects for older workers, the paper asserted. The retirement age limit should be extended to 60 by 1985 in line with an increase in the number of aged persons in the Japanese society, it said.

As a means of achieving this goal, the White Paper advanced a proposal calling on enterprises to give little or no pay increase to workers a gcd 45 or older in exchange for the extension of the retirement age to 60.

The White Paper expressed the hope that both management and labour throughly study the feasibility of the proposal. According to Labour Ministry calculations, the paper said, the amount of income of workers agreeing to no pay increase after 45 would virtually equal that of carnings of workers who retire from a company at 55 and continue to work at a different company until 60.

Nearly three decades of national planning in this country has awakened us to a starting realisation that mere large investments in capital goods or stocks, which might give rise to an overall increase of national income is no indication of economic balance and social progress of a country. Such heavy investments have actually proved to have resulted in relatively poor or marginal growth in consumption well being of the population. It is now realised that, unless special efforts are made and strategies designed to ensure distributive justice, the fruits of economic growth may be restricted to increasingly smaller numbers, who have already the necessary assets and resources, and it may lead to the obvious increasing of the disparities. The imbalances that have already come to light are evident not only between high capital stock, on the one hand and the poor wage goods, on the other or high wages in the organised sector as against subsistence level in the unorganised sector, but also in the educational field where high technological advancement, as indicated by growth rate of higher technological education, as against the vast sea of illiteracy or semi-literacy.

#### HUMAN RESOURCE

It is true that the productivity of a human being is intrinsically connected with the extent to which he displays the knowledge and the skill in his economic activity. Indeed, some recent studies of highly developed countries like the United States, Great Britain and Japan made at finding out the exact contribution of the technology as also human skill in the total productivity and growth of the country indicate that investment in the development of skills, knowledge as also health of workers is as important as investment in capital goods, and that human resource is an important "capital" in economic development. In the growth of American economy, according to one study, only 10 per cent is a attributed to the growth in population and physical resources, and the remaining 90 per cent is credited to residual factors, in which technological progress takes a substantial measure. In the progress of the manufacturing industries of Great Britain after the Second World War, only 25 per cent is attributed to the capital and labour and the rest to greater technological inputs, including higher skills, while in the case of Japan, over a period of nearly 25 years, the increase of educational capital is believed to have contributed 25 per cent of the increase

-

in national income. In general, educational capital has grown many times faster than the non-human capital. It must however, be noted that high technological demands of economy preceded or kept pace with growth in higher and technological education.

These studies, however, must be taken with a good deal of reservation in their application to the Indian context. In our country, and particularly in Maharashtra State, the spread of general education appears to have promoted greater wastage and unemployment, more particularly because the "elite consciousness" which the present education breeds, and the institutional and social framework within which it is imparted, at present, is totally irrelevant to the level as also the demand of our economy. In all forms of education, improving attitudes is as important as imparting skills. As recent study of some tribal villages of Nashik district in this State, under the aegis of the International Labour Organisation, showed the percentage of total unemployment among the educated boys was very high as against the general unemployment that prevailed; indeed, there was really no total un-employment among the uneducated, though there was heavy under employment or poverty. Strangely, the educated boys would refuse to work at low wages in the Agriculture Sector and look to salaried employment in the Service Sector. This, by no means, is an exceptional revelation; it only re-establishes the deleterious effect of education in heightening the expectations of the educated people, and their refusal to be reconciled to either low wages or to menial jobs. It has been well established that, like the general high inflation on account of heavy investment in capital goods, with the consequential reduction of value of money per unit of real capital in the eudcational field also, the large spread of higher education and technological skills, far higher than demanded by the labour market or the State of economy, as devalued education and has under employed the knowledge and the skills. In view of the large costs involved in the provision of higher technical education of over Rs. 3,000 per year for training an artisan in the Industrial Training Institute or for engineering college education, as against Rs. 157 per primary eduaction, Rs. 314 for secondary education and Rs. 627 for Arts, Science and Commerce Education for a student in Mahararashtra there is a school of thought which questions the propriety of giving public subsidy to higher education, this approach derives its force from the fact that barely  $1 \cdot 3$  per cent of our working population is at the level of graduates and above that except in technological or professional degree-holders the percentage among other graduates who do not seek work is as high as 26 per cent and further the growing unemployment among them, and their inability to adjust themselves to the demands of our economy. The problem of reforming education is not quantitative one of providing more schools, it is a problem of eliminating mis-education and largescale waste of educational resources. 11

#### GROWTH OF HIGHER EDUCATION

In Maharashtra State, as in the country as a whole the higher education is growing at a much rapid rate than the primary and secondary education, as will be borne out by the following table. While the enrollment in the primary education increased after 1961 by only 86 per cent, it increased by 316 per cent in secondary education and 461 per cent in higher education till 1978.

It will be evident that the figure of employment-seekers, who are educated up to Matric, but who are below degre-holders, has shot up from 1,15.265 to over 4.19 lakhs, i.e. increase by over five times between December 1970 and December 1978, while the figure of graduates other than Engineering graduates has increased from about 51,000 in 1974 to 94,000 in 1978, i.e., nearly by 85 per cent while the post-graduates have increased from 1,000 in 1970 to over 9,000 in 1978, i.e. by nine times. The majority of the employment seekers on their registers of employment exchanges are now Matriculates and above, while ten years ago, the majority of them were illiterates or less than matriculates. One of the reasons, of course, is that the employment exchanges are locatted in urban areas and the educated people are choosy in regard to their employment and above all, the employment exchange is the single official agency in the State for placing candidates in the organised sector. It is, however, well esta-blished that the unemployment rate among the educated in particular and in the urban areas is higher and is growing at a higher rate. The average waiting period for a forsh creducte in the unemployment is growing at a higher rate. period for a fresh graduate is now more than a yaer, while it was about eleven months at the beginning of this decade. Indeed, the graduates and diplomaholders on the regular registers of employment exchanges, who are unemployed during a period of four years (if he belongs to backward class) of five years (in other cases), and who were considered eligible for grant of an honorarium of Rs. 100 per month, if only they worked for four hours a day, and fifteen days

#### EMPLOYMENT POSITION

The growth of employment over the last few years in the organised sector, where educated people seek employment in great earnest, is not very encouraging. The following table shows that the growth of employment in the Private Sector is almost at a standstill, while the overall annual compound growth is only 2.3 per cent for the period 1974 to 1977.

The share of the public sector in providing employment in organised sector has increased from 57 per cent in 1974 to 62 per cent in 1978. It is not sur-prising that educated should look increasingly to Government for jobs.

The growth among the workers in the factory sector, in the last few years in particular, has been low and is about 2.3 per cent average for the period 1975 to 1977.

Enven against this background, the rush for securing admissions to higher professional institutions has been steadily mounting not with standing the fact that the Government of India have strictly controlled the number of scats in the Medical and Engineering Colleges as also in Engeering Polytechnics. The pressure on the Government to increase the intake in higher education is steadily mounting. Increase in intake of Industrial Training Instituties is demaided all over, without consideration of the limited growth of industries in the organised sector  $w_0$  ere the ITI-trained boys are best used.

#### VOCALISATION OF EDUCATION

We are then involved in a vicious circle. The phenomenal increase in higher education, demanded a growing number of students, for whom education is very cleap and passing of examinations not particularly difficult, compels the State to open larger number of higher educational institutions involving higher outlays and subsidies. The increase in seats in or the number of insti-tutions at a rapid rate inevitably reduces the quality of education. The large output of these institutions does not easily fined demand in the employment market, and the Government of the public sector, which is increasing its share of obsorption of labour in the market, is hard put to meeting the problem of un-employment of nighly educated people. The recruitment rules framed at a time when the degree-holders were easily available, are not reformed to provide for lower qualifications, even if the nature of the job is such as can be entrusted to them.

The White Paper on Policy of Education issued recently by Government of India emphasises the delinking of degree from employment, making education more work-based rather increasing vocationalisation in order that persons are made work-oriented, and increasing the basic education, while restricting the higher education. In Maharashtra we have started vocationalisation of education at the Higher Secondary stage only last year; Government has covered barely 4 per cent of the students who are undergoing Higher Secondary education. It is not easy to change the entire education system, as this change

has to first start with the teachers, who are themselves the product of the outmoded education system and who are not easily amenable to a changed outlook as also behaviour required by the new system of " Learn-to-do". In the meanwhile, we are going to face with a peculiar situation in Maharashtra, which is notorious for immobility of its educated people in moving out to other States or even other countries in search of means of livelihood, of increasing demand from the State and the organised sector of jobs in service sector.

# Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for July 1979

# 351-A rise of 7 points.

**BOMBAY**\*

In July 1979, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Bombay Centre with base January to December 1960 equeal to 100 will 351 being 7 points higher than that in the preceeding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Bombay Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 13 points to 377 to a rise in the average prices of jowar, bajra, gramdal, coconut oil, grounnut oil, goat-meat, dry fish, eggs, chillies, onion and sub-goup index numbers for vegetables and fruits.

The index number for pan, supari tobacco etc. group decreased by 17 points to 380 due to a fall in the average price of pan-leaf only.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 3 points to 438 due to a rise in the average prices of fire wood and charcoal.

The house rent survey for six months ending July 1979 was conducted by N. S. S. O. in the month of December 1979 and compiled by labour Commissioner's Office, Bombay. Accordingly the index number for housing increased by 5 points to 158.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group decreased by 1 point to 361 due to a fall in the average prices of saree, shriting, long cloth and markin.

The index number for the miscellaneous group remained stady at 284.

### 368-A rise of 12 points

In July 1979, the consumer Price Index Number for Working class (New series) for the Solapur centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 368 being 12 points higher than that in the preceeding month. The index relates to the standard of life as-certained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Solapur city.

The index number for the food group increased by 17 points to 388 due to a rise in the average prices of Jawar, gramdal, groundnut oil, Vanaspati, dry chillies, tamarind, onions, sugar, gur, Bhajia, Jalebi and rise in the index number of vegetable and Fruits sub-group.

The index number for the Pan, Supari, tobacco etc. group decreased by 5 points to 347 due to a fall in the average Prices of Pan Leaf only.

The index nymber for the fuel and light group increased by 1 point to 432 ue to a rise in the average Prices of Coal only.

Six monthly house rent survey conducted by N.S.S.O. and reported by the Director Labour Bureau, Simla (ending June 1979) Accordingly the index, number for housing increased by 7 points to 207.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group increased by 6 points to 398 due to a rise in the average prices of saree, Shriting, long Cloth, Markin, and trouser cloth.

The index number for the miscellanous group increased by 3 points to 281 due to a rise in the average prices of hair oil, toilet Soap, utensils copper, and Durrie.

#### 346-A rise of 7 points

NAGPUR\*

In July 1979, the consumer Price Index Number for working class (New series) for the Nagpur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 346 being 7 points higher than that in the preceeding month. The index relats to the standard to life ascertained druing the year 1958-59 Family living survey at Nagpur city.

The index number for the food group increased by 11 points to 357 due to a rise in the average prices of arhardal, gramdal, moongdal, gingelli oil, groundnut oil Linseed oil, Oinons Sugar, gur and rise in the index number of vegetable and fruits sub group.

The index number for the Pan Supari, Tobacco etc. decreased by 20 points to 347 due to a fall in the avarage price of pan leaf only.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 7 points to 373 due to a rise in the average prices of firewood and Coke.

Six monthly house rent survey conducted by N.S.S.O. and reported by the Director, Labour Bureau Simla (ending June 1979). Accordingly the index number for housing increased by 6 points to 193.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group increased by 2 points to 412 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoti, trouser cloth, and piajama.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 33 points to 281 due to a rise in the average prices of doctor's fee, medicine, cot, trunk and rickshaw charges.

# 379-rise of 18 points.

AURANGABAD

In July 1979, the Consumer Price Index Number for working class (New Series) for Aurangabad centre with base year Janaury to December 1961, equal to 100 was 379 being 18 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standared of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Aurangabad centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 26 points to 413 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, wheat, jowar, durdal, gramdal, masurdal, groundnut oil, karad oil, turmeric, chillies dry, tamarind onions, tomatoes, vegetables sugar and gur.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained steady at 401.

Six monthly house rent survey was conducted by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay in the month of July 1979. Accordingly the index number for housing increased by 6 points to 271.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group remained steady at 359.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 10 points to 297 due to rice in the average prices of pan leaf and bidi.

## 363-A rise of 5 points.

NANDED

In July 1979 the Consumer Price Index number for working class (New series) for Nanded centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 363 being 5 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Nanded centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 7 points to 387 due to a rise in the average prices of wheat, jowar, groundnut oil, salt and tamarind.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 5 points to 468 due to a rise in the average price of kerosene oil.

Six monthly house rent survey was conducted by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay in the month of July 1979. Accordingly the index number for housing remained steady at 196.

The index number for the clothing the footwear group increased by 1 point to 341 due to a rise in the price of sarce.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 4 points to 299 due to a rise in the average price of pan-leaf.

#### 353-A rise of 14 points.

In July 1979, the Consumer Price Index Number for working class (New Series) for Jalgaon centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 353 being 14 points higher than that in the preceding monthd. The index relates to the Standard of life acertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Jalgaon Centre.

The index number for the Food group increased by 23 points to 387 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, wheat, jawar, turdal gramdal, groundnut oil, potatoes, onions, vegetables and Banana, Sugar and Gur.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained steady at 420.

Six monthly house Rent survey was conducted by the office of the Commi-ssioner of Labour, Bombay in the month of July 1979, accordingly the index number for housing remained steady at 158. 

The index number for the clothing and footwaea group increased by 1 point to 331 due to a rise in the average prices of Shoes and Chappal.

The index number for the miscellaneous group has remained steady at 282.

#### BENEFITS UNDER THE EMPLOYEES! STATE INSURANCE SCHEME-REVIEW FOR THE MONTH OF JULY 1979

The Employees' State Insurance Scheme applies to 26 Centres in the State of Maharashtra and provides protection to 15,73,677 workers in the event of employment injury, Sickness and Maternity. This protection is made available in two ways, namely, by provision of medical care and cash benefits when needed. During the month of July 1979, 6,722 Insured persons received Rs. 13,38,141.95 cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 2,226 persons who were in receipt of Pensions for Permanent Disablement and 922 persons who were in receipt of Dependant Benefit as dependants of deceased Insured persons. During the month, 8,592 accidents were reported as against 9,706 during the preceding month.

Comparatively, fewer persons need the employment injury benefits but a fairly large number need Cash Benefit in the event of Sickness. During July 1979, 59,264 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 51,62,435.87 was paid out as Sickness Benefit. During the preceding month 1,16,200 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 89,26,511.15 was disbursed as Sickness Benefit.

Some Insured Persons suffering from T.B., Mental, Malignant, other long term diseases etc., require more attention and they are being paid additional benefit called Extended Sickness Benefit. During the month an amount of Rs. 4,84,482.65 paid towards this benefit.

During the month 154 Insured Women workers claimed Rs. 2,15,770.20 by way of Maternity Benefit. The attendance at the dispensaries as per certificates received was 2,57,998 during the month.

During the month Funeral Benefit in 71 cases amounting to Rs. 7,099.95 was paid.

During the month Confinement Charges in respect of wives of Insured Persons amounting to Rs. 39,720.00 were paid.

During the month an amount of Rs. 3,030.00 was paid as Enhanced Sickness Benefit to 23 Insured Persons who had gone under sterilisation operation for Family Planning, . . . . . .

For recovery of arrears of Contribution under the Scheme, Legal proceeding had to be initiated in 13 cases against defaulting employers.
