# All India Average Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers

# Industrial Disputes ir Maharashtra State

# Benefits under the Employees State Insurance Scheme.

During the month of January 1982, 20, 562 Insured Persons received Rs. 51,63,169.40 Cash Benefit due to Employment Injuries. This includes 5400 Persons ho were in receipt of Pension for Permanent Disablement Renefit and 2,171 Persons who were in receipt of Dependants Benefit as dependants of deceased Insured Persons. During the month 10,565 accidents were reported as against 10,406 during the Preceding month.

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# Current Notes

# I.L.O. Keen on improving workers' lot

Mr. Francis Blanchard, Director-General of the International Labour Organisation, said in Bombay on January 29, 1982 that I.L.O. was anxious to ensure improvement in the let of the unorganized workers the world over. It was already taking steps to extend beyond the organised sector the setting up of standards for the welfare of the unorganised workers. He said he was conscious of the imbalances in the working norms of the organised and unorganised workers.

### Board to provide jobs for scientists

Unemployed scientists and technologists will soon have access to a "single window" for all assistance for setting up their own units. A national science and technology enterpreneurial development board is being formed by the Union Government to co-ordinate all activities in this regard. It will be headed by the member (Science) of the planning commission. Dr. M. S. Swammathan, and will have representatives of various ministeries, scientific organisations, banking institutions and the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry. The top administrators of these ministries and organisations will be on the board, According to Prof. M. G. K. Menon, Secretary in the Department of Science and Technology, the number of unemployed scientific and technological personnel could be one lakh to three lakhs depending on how one defines such personnel. If all those who have taken their bachelor's degree in science or engineering are included the number could be three lakhs.

# **Proposal for integration of Social Security Schemes**

Mr. Bhagwat Jha Azad, Union Minister of Labour, stated on February 8, 1982 that the proposal is under consideration for integrating the existing social security schemes like provident fund into a comprehensive social security scheme. A pilot project was being tried in the coal mines.

# ESI Scheme For Seasonal Units Likely

The Government proposes to extend the Employee's State Insurance (ESI) theme to seasonal factories, according to official sources.

To begin with, the proposed is to extend it to sugar industry for which a recommendation of a high-power committee had already been received.

Another proposal is to introduce the ESI scheme to slate manufacturing units in Mandasaur district in Mudhya Pradesh.

At present, the compensation cases are being dealt with by the Commissioner of Workmen's Compensation appointed by the state Government.

The ESI has so far constructed and commissioned 77 hospitals and 36 annexes in different states and Union territories.

Another 22 ESI hospitals and seven annexes are under various stages of construction.

# 16 Categories of Supplies and Services Notified as Essential

The Government of India has in a gazette notification—in compliance with the directive of the Supreme Court which has upheld the constitutional validity of the National Security Act—issued here on February 8 has listed sixteen categories of essential supplies and services to the community whose disruption would entail detention under the said Act.

The court had held that no person can be detained under sub-section (2) of Section (3) of the National Security Act, 1980, with a view to preventing him from acting in any manner prejudicial to the maintenance of supplies and services essential the community unless by law or notification made or published fairly in advance and the supplies and services the maintenance of which is regarded as essential to the community and in respect of which the order of detention is proposed to be passed are made known appropriately to the public.

The Ministry of Home Affairs has already issued copies of the notification to this effect to all the State Governments and Union Territory administration and all Central Ministries and Departments for information and necessary action.

Besides road, rail, water and air transportation and telecommunication services, those notified as 'essential include a wide range of public and private undertakings sheeduled in the Industries (Development and Regulation) Act.

Defence services, defence production and customs services are also covered by the notification.

The essential supplies and services are the following :

1. Any postal, telegraph or telephone service, including any service connected therewith;

2. Any railway service or any transport service for the carriage of passengers or goods by air of any other transport service for the carriage of passengers or goods by land or water;

3. Any service connected with the operation or maintenance of aerodromes, or with the operation repair or maintenance of aircraft, or any service in the International Airports Authority of India constituted under Section 3 of the International Airports Act 1971 (43 of 1971).

4. Any service in, or in connection with the working of any major port, including any service connected with the loading, unloading movement of storage of goods in any such port;

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5. Any services connected with the clearance of goods or passengers through the customs or with the prevention of smuggling;

6. Any service in any establishment of, or connected with, the armed forces of the Union or in any either establishments or installations connected with defence;

7. Any service in any establishment or undertaking dealing with the production of required for any purpose connected with defence;

8. Any service in any section of any industrial undertaking pertaining to a scheduled industry on the working of which the safety of such undertaking or the amployees employed therein depends.

9. Any service in, or in connection with the working of any undertaking being an undertaking engaged in the purchase, procurement, storage, supply or distribution of foodgrains;

10. Any service in, or in connection with the working of, any system of public conservancy, sanitation or water supply, hospitals or dispensaries.

11. Any service in connection with or in relation to banking;

12. Any service in any establishment or undertaking dealing with the production, supply or distribution of coal, power, steel or fertilisers;

13. Any service in any oilfiled or refinery or in any establishment or undertaking dealing with the production, supply or distribution of petroleum and petroleum products;

14. Any service in any mint or security press;

15. Any service in connection with elections to Parliament or to the legislatures of the states; and,

16. Any service in connection with the affair of the Union, or a state not being a service specified in any of the foregoing categories.

### States Told to Revise Farm Wages

The Centre has directed state Governments to expedite revision of minimum wages of agriculture labour.

This directive has been sent in the light of the fact that states had either already constituted committee for revision or wages or announced proposals for minimum wages in other industries as well.

It may be recalled that the state governments last year had expressed their mability to enforce the minimum wages programme due to lack of implementation machinery.

It is in this light that the Centre decided to strengthening the enforcement machinery for employments in agriculture at the rate of an additional inspector in each block of all the States in the country. The Plan scheme would include proposals for setting up an effective monitoring unit for implementation of the Minimum Wages Act. The Union Labour Ministry has also decided to carry out amendments in the Minimum Wages Act to secure better enforcement of the Act by enhancing penalties giving powers to officers of Regional Labour Commissioner's status and above.

It may be recalled that the Central Government reconstituted the minimum wages advisory board under Section 7 of the Minimum Wages Act in May, 1981. The board held its meeting on September 29, and recommended fixation of revision of minimum wages in 27 mining employments covered under the Minimum Wages Act.

Minimum wages in respect of these mining employments were fixed or revised in the first week of December, 1981. Proposals to fix minimum wages in mines were notified in October, 1981. Proposals to revise the minimum wages in the employment in agriculture were notified on November 19.

The minimum wages (Central) advisory board set up under Section 7 of the Minimum Wages Act was reconstituted on August 13. It held its meeting on October 20.

A meeting of a group of Labour Ministers was also held on September 11 to consider the problem of disparity in the wages fixed for beedi workers in different States.

The Ministers decided that taking into account the present cost of living index, the minimum wages for the employment in the bidi industry should be fixed between Rs. 7 and Rs. 8 and that the revision should be effective from January 1, 1982 at the latest.

 The Ministers also considered that states should introduce D. A. as a distinct element of minimum wages linked to the C. P. I. numbers variable periodically or on the rise of every 5 points.

If any State Government found it difficult to introduce a D. A. formula, it should revise the minimum wage atleast once every year, it was desired.

The minimum wage in respect of the mining employments which had been revised in September, 1980 were revised again in December, 1981 raising the minimum wages,

### Plan to Keep Labour Disputes out of Courts

The Labour Ministry proposes to place before the next meeting of the Indian Labour Conference suggestion which in essence seeks to keep industrial disputes out of the jurisdiction of all courts except the Supreme Court.

Hearing of the disputes will be under the proposal, taken up by Labour Appellate Tribunals to be revived for the purpose.

Alternatively, the proposal envisages the creation of separate appellate benches in High Courts and the Supreme Court for dealing with appeals arising out of the decisions and orders given under different labour laws.

Labour Appellate Tribunals were initially consituted in 1950 and later abolished by the Industrial Disputes Amendent Act mainly for the reason that these were taking an unduly after these had given their decisions the parties could go in appeal to the High Court. The new proposal will take note of this experience and obviate its repetition.

The date and composition of the Tripartite Labour Conference has not yet been determined.

Information on this proposal was given to the Parliamentary Consultative committee for the Ministry here on February 12.

The Union Labour Ministor, Shri Bhagwat Jha Azad emphasised the need for industrial peace in the year of productivity and reiterated that the Essential Services Maintenance Act was meant to be used against anti-social elements and not working class.

According to him, the Government was always willing to discuss problems with trade union organisations in search of solutions.

The Minister also assured that the government was fully responsive to the needs and aspitation of labour. He pointed out that no scheme for raising productivity could succeed unless there was harmonious industrial relations and the willing co-operation of labour.

# Articles, Reports, Enquires, etc. CONCEPT OF 'WAGE' UNDER DIFFERENT LABOUR LAWS

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The wage that a labourer receives has pershps a greater significance for him than any other feature of the structure of the industry. The wage, largely determines the standard of living of the wage earner. No wonder, therefore, that he seeks every opportunity to get an increase in it. For the employer the wage is a matter of equal concern. The wage payment represent for him an important item of cost of production. The wage bill is always of a significant magnitude for him.

As a consequence, wages represent the chief point around which industrial disputes are centered. The determination of the size of the wage and the method by which it be paid, thus, constitutes the most important problem relating to industrial labour.

The term ' wage ' has been defined in various labour laws and in each definition there has been different concept of wage with a view of concurrence with that particular scheme of the Act. Since 1923, when wage was first defined under Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, we have wages defined under the following important protective and employment labour laws, social security laws and laws relating to industrial relations such as the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, the Payment of Wages Act, 1936, the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, the Factories Act, 1948, the Minimum Wages Act, 1948, the Employees State Insurance Act, 1948, the Plantation Labour Act, 1951, the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952, the Payment of Bonus Act, 1965, the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972 and, the Equal Remuneration Act, 1976.

The definitions of wage, comprising different components under different Acts, are intended to govern the rights of the workers and employers. The purpose of those definitions, however, cannot be accepted for assertaining the meaning of different sections of different Acts.

The Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923.

The definition of wage is inclusive and also exclusive but not exhaustive. Wage s primarily a question of contract between employer and workmen. It includes any privilege or benefit which is capable of being estimated in money.

It oxcludes :---

(i) Travelling allowances or value of any travelling concession.

(ii) Contribution paid by the employer towards the workmen's pension fund or provident fund.

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(iii) Sum paid to the workman to cover any special expenses entailed on him by the nature of his employment. Compensation is to be awarded under this Act to the injured employee on the basis of his wage, as the term has to be interpreted in the light of the definition given in the Act and not in the light of the definition of the Payment of Wages Act, 1936.<sup>1</sup>

While determining the compensation payable to a workman under section 5(a) of the Act, the term 'wage' is to be interpreted as including not only the actual salary payable to the workman but also any other benefit that can be computed in terms of money such as dearness allowance or any other allowance but excluding contributions paid towards pension or provident fund. The compensation has to be determined on the basis of monthly wages payable to an employee and not on actual payment made. It is immaterial what the employees, might claim. The commissioner or the court has to grant compensation at the amount permissible under law.<sup>2</sup>

The privileges or benefits that can be calculated under wages are:--

1. Free accommodation : Free accommodation is a benefit within the meaning of privileges and benefit under the definition of wages.<sup>3</sup>

2. Maternity benefit : The maternity payable to work-woman delevering a child is under the ambit of definition of wages.<sup>4</sup>

3. Bonus : The receiving of bonus being a privilege or benefit enjoyed by a workman capable of being expressed is terms of money is covered by the definition of wage.<sup>5</sup>

Where under profit sharing scheme of the company bonus was declared on that date subsequent to the date of accident resulting in injury, the contention that bonus did not become due until it was declared and was, therefore, not part of ' total wage' was not accepted by the court. On the contrary, it was held that the workman having earned the bonus under the scheme on the date of accident, it formed part of his wages and must be taken into account in assessing the compensation payable under the Act.<sup>6</sup>

Leave carried forward to next year as annual leave with wages under the Factories Act, 1948 which provides that if a worker has completed a year's service, he can in the subsequent year, go on leave without any deduction from, the total amount of his wages to which he would be entitled next year in course of second year. But it cannot be said that after becoming entitled to leave with wages it is open to the worker either to take leave during the next year or to get the wages for the period of leave added tohis total yearly income. Annual leave with wages no doubt is a privilege but this privilege only means that there should be an accretion or addition to the wages of the next year. Thus, in calculating compensation, the commissioner is not justified in adding the wages for the period of leave to which the worker was entitled after working for one year.<sup>7</sup>

The condition would but be different wherein the worker is entitled either under the custom or terms of contract either to avail leave or to get wages for the period of leave added to his yearly income. It would then fall within the term ' Privilege or benefit ' capable of being estimated as money.

### The Payment of Wages Act, 1936

The definition of wage is exclusive and also inclusive. It is defined as all remuneration expressed in terms of money or capable of being so expressed, which would, if the terms of employment, express or implied, were fulfilled, be payable to a person employed in respect of his employment. The expression term of employment express or implied, applies not only to contracts which are express in fact, but also include any liability arising out of application of law.

Contracts may either be express or implied, and of the latter there are two broad division. The term ' implied contract ' in English law is applied not only to contracts, which are inferred from the conduct or presumed intentions of the parties but also to obligation imposed by application of law quite apart from and without regard to the probable intention of the parties and sometimes even in opposition to their expressed of implied intentions.<sup>8</sup>

The phrase, if the terms of employment express or implied, also means that there must be subsisting contract of employment, and there should exist a relationship of master and servant, and there should be mutual rights and obligations of the parties to the in contract existing.

There is a clearly demarcated 'included' and 'not included' component specified in the definition and it is an exhaustive one and not other meaning can be assigned to the term 'wage' other than that in definition. Also specified is that all wages should be paid in current money.

The following component is included in definition

(i) Any remuneration payable under any award on settlement between the parties or order of court.

(ii) Remuneration to which the employee is entitled in respect of

- (a) Overtime work.
- (b) Holidays.
- (c) Any leave period.

(*iii*) Any additional remuneration payable, under the terms of employment. Thus, *bonus*, if under contract of employment is paid, it is apart of wages.

(*iv*) Any sum by reason of termination of employment of the person employed is payable under any law, contract or instrument which provides for payment of such sum *without time limit*.

(v) Specification thus compensation paid for retrenchment of service under Industrial Disputes Act. 1947 falls within the ambit of wage.<sup>10</sup>

(vi) Increment payable, under a contract between employer and worker is wages.

(vii) House rent allowance is wage, if it is granted under rules framed by the parties to contract. But as soon as the concerned employee is offered quarters for his accommodation he ceases to be entitled to house rent allowance whether he occupies the quarter or not.<sup>12</sup>

The following components are not included in the definition of ' wage '.

1. Any bonus which is not under contract of services, or award or settlement between the parties or order court.

- 2. Value of
- (a) House accommodation.
- (b) Supply of light,
- (c) Water supply.
- (d) Medical attendance.
- (c) Other amenity.
- (f) Any service excluded from computation by order of State Government.
- (g) Travelling allowance.

Value of house accommodation is different from house rent allowance. House rent allowance is given to employee in lieu of the absence of provision of house accommodation is the amount which employee has to pay for occupying accommodation of quarters provided by his employer.

3. Contribution paid by employer towards employees :---

- (a) Pension fund.
- (b) Provident fund.

4. Sum paid to employee to defray special expenses entailed on him by nature of his employment.

5. Gratality payable on termination of service.

6. Compensation for wrongful dismissal is not wages as it is not any damage of compensation to which a servant would be entitled on wrongful dismissal of service.<sup>13</sup>

7. Maternity benefit is not wages. Under Maternity Benefit Act, benefit is payable for (a) the actual days of absence during six weeks immediately preceding the confinement, and six weeks immediately following confinement. The employer is prohibited from employing her in the second period and in the first period she can go on leave after giving notice or not. The employer is bound to pay benefits and she can claim amount even if she remains absent without the permission of employer. Thus, amount is payable to her even if she does not fulfil her terms of employment. Therefore, it cannot be said to be wages as per its definition.<sup>14</sup>

8. The compensation awarded by the Industrial Tribunal for involuntary unemployment (when standing orders of a concern did not provide for any

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compensation for such period) could not be considered as wage as 'it is not in respect of employment or work done in employment' as laid down in definition.<sup>16</sup>

### The Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 :

The Definition of Wages is in three parts. In the first part of it, wages have been defined as all remuneration which would 1 s payable to the workmen if the terms of contract of employment express or implied were fulfilled.

In the second part of definition the components included in wages are defined they are:---

(i) Allowances including dearness allowances which the employee is entitled to;

(n) Value of:—

- (a) House accommodation.
- (b) Supply of light.
- (c) Supply of water.
- (d) Medical attendance.
- (e) Other amenity or any service.
- (f) Concessional supply of food grains or other articles.
- (g) Any travelling concession.

(*iii*) Commission payable to *Sardars* who supplied labour force for recruitment in collieries and in addition to it performed duty of supervision were workmen, and commission payable to them being expressed in term of money fall within definition of wage.<sup>10</sup>

In the third part those components which do not form part of wages is specified which have been explicitly excluded. There are:---

- (i) Any bonus
- (ii) Contribution paid by employer towards employees:-
- (a) Pension fund
- (b) Provident fund
- (c) Scheme for benefit of workemen under any law in force at the time.

This definition of wage has been given to assist in making provision for the investigation and settlement of industrial disputes.

Lay off compensation paid to workmen under Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 is not 'Wages' as it is not given in respect of employment or work done in such employment.<sup>17</sup>

In respect of lay off, it is said that the contract of employment has not come to end because a certain obligation remains upon the employer and a certain right still in the employee, the obligation to reinstate and right to be reinstated. But it is not right to say that there was effective and subsisting contract of employment of master and servant at material date which is period of lay off. So the contract of employment does not exist.

The definition varies from the definition in the Payment of Wages Act, 1936 in the sense that it says about wages which is *capable* of being expresse dterms in money whereas in latter case it also says expressed in terms of money.

# The Factories Act, 1948:

Wages during the period of annual leave in terms of average daily wages are calculated on the basis of a worker's total full time earnings for the days worked during the month immediately proceeding his leave, exclusive of any O. T. and bonus but inclusive of D. A. and cash equivalent of concessional supply of food-grains and other article.

Under the Mines Act, 1952, the concept of wages is same as in the Factories Act, 1948. However, in the former any cash compensation is also included.

# The Minimum Wage Act, 1948:---

The meaning assigned to the term 'Wages' in this Act is the same as assigned in the Payment of Wages Act, 1936 with the difference that in the latter Act the inclusive components were specifically mentioned while in the former only the components explicitly not included are specified. It includes dearness allowance.

The following is not included in wages:-

- (i) Value of :--
  - (a) House accommodation.
  - (b) Supply of light.
- (c) Supply of water.
- (d) Medical attendance.
- (e) Any amenity or service excluded by order of State Government.
- (f) Travellir g concession.
- (g) Travelling allowance.
- (n) Contribution paid by employer towards employees.—
  - (a) Pension fund.
  - (b) Provident fund.
  - (c) Any other scheme of social insurance.

(iii) Sum paid to employee to defray special expenses entailed on him by the nature of his employment.

(iv) Any gratuity payable on discharge.

The definition differs from that of Payment of Wages Act, 1936 also. In fact in the former definition it is sufficient that remuneration need only be capable of being expressed in terms of money while in the latter it should be expressed in terms of money and paid in cash.

There is no mention of bonus in the definition.

It is not doubted that in laying down the minimum rates of wages as contemplated by the Minimum Wages Act, 1948, the hardship caused to the individual employer or their inability to meet the burden has no relevance.

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The fact that minimum wages have been fixed by legislation does not mean that in appropriate cases wages should not be fixed at rates higher than the minimum wages fixed by the notification of the appropriate government.

# Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948:---

The definition of Wage is very broad and almost every item of remuneration has been included under the said definition.

The general concept is same as in Payment of Wages Act, 1936 as far as contract of employment is concerned, about its being expressed or implie which were to be fulfilled.

The remuneration is paid or payable in eash.

There has been for the first time definition of 'Wages' reference to lay-off and strike.

The following components from part of wage.--

(i) Any payment made in respect of:-

(a) Authorised leave i.e. leave granted under any law, agreement, awards or standing orders.

(b) Legal lock-out.

- (c) Legal strike.
- (d) Legal lay-off.

The meaning of lock-out, strike and lay-off is assigned to it as given in the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947.

(*ii*) Any additional remuneration paid at the interval not exceeding two months. This has a very wide connotation as it would include dearness allowance, production bonus and even acting wages.

The following terms are excluded from wages.-

(i) Any payment made by employer to employees.-

(a) Provident fund.

(b) Pension fund.

(*u*) Any sum paid for—

(a) Travelling allowance.

(b) Value of house accommodation.

(c) To defray special expenses entailed on him by the nature of employnent.

(d) Gratuity payable on discharge.

# The Plantation Labour Act, 1951:

Wages psyable for annual leave in terms of average daily wages are to be completed on the basis of a worker's total full-time earning during the preceding twelve Calendar months exclusive of any overtime earnings or bonus, if any, but inclusive of dearness allowance.

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A worker has also to be paid the cash value of food and other concessions. if any, in addition to his daily wages if such concessions are not confirmed during the leave period. So such cash value has not strictly been treated as wages.

The Employee's Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952:-Here, Instead of the term ' Wages' as has been defined in all earlier Acts, the terms " Basic-Wages " has been defined.

The use of the term "Basic Wages" certainly implies that a certain part of total wages is excluded for certain purposes.

It is explicitly mentioned that these wage are those which are carned on duty or on leave with wages in accordance with the terms of contract of employment.

It does not obliges to pay wages in cash as in the Payment of Wages Act, 1936 but simply says wages paid or payable in cash.

What the aforesaid definition will not include is wages in the term 'Basic Wages ' are contained in three clauses. They are.---

- (i) Cash value of any food concession.
- (ii) Any dearness allowance.
- (iii) House rent allowance.
- (iv) Overtime allowance.

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- (vi) Commission or such allowance.
- (vii) Any present mady by employer

This clause of present by employer to be excluded from 'Basic Wage' is

The expression 'emoluments which are earned by employee while on duty or leave with wages ' implies that payment made in lieu of notice of termination of service does not represent empluments earned while on duty and accordingly such payments were held outside the purview of term 'Basic Wage' as defined in the Act, as it is not payment earned for duty but payment by wage of consideration for termination of contract of employment of a permanent employee without notice. It cannot in any sense be regarded as ' emoluments earned while on duty

In the Employees' Family Pension Scheme, 1971, components which did not form the part of 'Basic Wages' in, Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 has been added. The term defined is 'Pay' which is used only in this Act of various labour laws, and it includes besides Basic Wages.

- (i) Dearness allowance.
- (ii) Retaining allowance, if any, and
- (iii) Cash value of food concessions available, if any.

The Payment of Bonus Act, 1965-

The term defined under this act is 'Salary or Wage'. It implies that there is not difference between wage or salary.

It is specified as in other Acts that 'Salary or Wage' means all remuneration capable of being expressed in terms of money which would if terms of employment express or implied or were fulfilled, be payable.

# It includes the following components-

(i) Dearness allowance.

(u) Value of free food or food allowance given in lieu of part or whole the salary payable to the employee.

# It excludes the following components-

- (i) Overtime allowance.
- (11) Value of—
- (a) House accommodation
- (b) Supply of light
- (c) Supply of water
- (d) Medical attendance
- (e) Any other amenity or service.
- (f) Concessional supply of foodgrain except when given in lieu of part

of full salary payable.

- (g) Travelling allowance.
- (iii) Contribution made by employer towards employees---
- (iv) Any retrenchment compansation.
- (vi) Any ex-gratia payment male.

(vi) Any other allowance to which the employee is entitled for the time being.

Wages or compensation paid for strike period would not come within the ambit of definition of ' Salary or wages ' as it cannot be deemed to be wages in respect of work done in employment.

During the period of lay-off the contract of service is suspended and relationship of master and servant does not exist. Thus it cannot come under definition of 'Salary or Wages' if compensation is puid for the period of lay-off as the contract of employment, express or implied, is not fulfilled. "

Doubts regarding salary earners and wage have been dispelled by using 'Wage or Salary ' words as synonyms in the definition in the Act. Ra 4171-2a

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# The Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972 :

The initial statement of definition of wages is similar to the one given in Employees' Provident Funds (And Family Pension Funds) Acts, 1952, as it states that it means all emoluments earned by employee while on leave or duty in accordance with terms and conditions of employment.

These are paid or payable in cash.

It does not differ from Employees' Provident Funds (And Family Pension Funds) Act, 1952 in regard to definition of wages. The Payment of Gratuity Act also excludes the following components from 'wages' for calculation of gratuity.

- (i) Bonus;
- (ii) Commission;
- (iii) House rent allowance;
- (iv) Overtime wages;
- (v) Any other allowance.

# The Equal Remuneration Act, 1976 :

It is interesting to note that the word 'Remuneration' has been extensively and widely used to explain the term 'Wages' since the enactment of Payment of Wages Act, 1936, and it has been interpreted mostly in its dictionary meaning. And it is now that the Government has defined remuneration in the Equal Remuneration Act.

The definition says that remuneration means basic wage or salary and any additional emolument whatsoever payable, either in cash or kind, to a person employed in respect of employment or work done in such employment. If the terms of contract, express or implies were fulfilled.

The definition implies that there is no difference between basic wage and salary and that remuneration includes something more than basic wage or salary.

There has been some amount of difficulty as regards the differences between terms 'remuneration' 'Salary and Wages'. Are they the same thing or is there some difference in them ?

Although the term remuneration is used widely it could be taken to include all payments for services rendered while term 'wages' is ordinarily used to indicate that portion of remuneration of the employee which is paid to him periodically on the basis of a particular rate of payment fixed according to a definite period of time and for price rated workers, according to the number of pieces produced in the given time.

In Stroud's Judicial Dictionary, Vol. III, Page 2205, the word 'Wage' is defined in the following manner, Though the word might be said to include payment for any services in general, word 'Salary' is used to payment for ervices for a higher class and 'wages' is confined to the earning of labourers and artisans.

If an employee is receiving wages the question of its differentiation with salary has to be determined with regard to the period for which amount is settled to be paid. The opinion is definite that if remuneration is paid daily or weekly, it has to be called wages. But where it is monthly remuneration paid on the last day of the month or after that date and, where the remuneration, considering the general standard of payment is fairly high then it has to be understeed as salary.

It is evident that the concept of ' wages ' in different labour enactment is in consonance with the specific c bjectives and purposes of that enactment. Where doubts have arisen or the question of interpretation arose, the judiciary has spelled out the intentions of the framers of the law and introduced a lot of judge-made law, which in our country is a part of industrial jurisprudent now. The concept of ' wages ' has also become dynamic, which is manifest from the fact that the Equal Remuneration Act uses the expression ' Remuneration ' by giving it a wider berth instead of using the expression "wages Similarly. since executives/managerial personnel are also covered to some extent under the Payment of Bonus Act, that enactmen: uses the expression " Sa'ary or Wage". Even the collective bargaining agreements in some industries and specially the bipartite agreements finalised in many public sector industries have added new elements to "Wages" as for instance the Special Dearness Allowance in the National Coal Wage Agreement II, which is in fact the computed tringe benefit on "attendance bonus" at a given percentage. Thus as we match and make progress in the industrial relations and collective bargaining area, the corcept of "wages" and its elements/constituents is bound to undergo a drastic change. The future labour enactments may, therefore, take note of these changes.

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# **EMERGING INDUSTRIAL RELATION SCENE IN MAHARASHTRA**

In the decade of 1970 the Country has witnessed tremendous industrial development and rapid growth of Trade Union movement. This has necessarily influenced the pattern of industrial relations in the said decade. The tendencies which in general set the pattern of industrial relations in the said decade were :---

(a) "over consciousness" of "rights" and lesser realisation of "social obligations" by both the Industry and Labour;

(b) "Commercialisation" of arts, professions and disciplines and devaluation of virtues and graces;

(c) Increasing use of "coercive power" and frequent recourse to "rule of thumb" and "strong-arm" methods.

In the said decade both labour and the management were very much conscious about their rights and both neglected to realise their duties and obligations towards the society. Both lacked the feelings of National Solidarity and self interest dominated in their dealings with each other. Both adopted commercial approach and the moral values and virtues of life like honesty, integrity justice and truth lost their importance. Loyalty, Trust and Confidence veilded place to mutual distrust, suspicion and hatred. Respect of oldage sense of responsibility, politeness, sincerity and courtesy had become virtues of the past. Purely materialistic approach in industrial relations resulted into increasing use of coercive power and strong arm methods. Each felt that it is the use of coercive force which yields quick results. This type of approach towards industrial relations was the main cause of increased number of industrial strifes and work stoppages during the said decade. With this legacy of 1970's we have entered the decade of 1980's and the industrial relation scene in the country during the first year and the 5 months of the 2nd year of the current decade is not much different than what it was in the 1970's. Maharashtra is not an exception to the above general pattern.

As every one of us is fully aware, Maharashtra is one of the highly industrialised State in the Country. About 11 per cent of the total registered factories in the country are located in Maharashtra, and nearly 17 per cent of the total No. of workers employed in registered factories are employed in the State. The workers in the State are also well organised. There are about 3,254 registered trade unions in the State with a total membrship of about 19 lakhs workers which also includes the membership of the unions in agriculture, shops and commercial establishments and other service industries. Most of these Trade Unions are also affiliated to all shades of central organisations of workers. Because of these special features, the industrial relations activities in the State of Maharashtra are bound to be more hectic than in any other

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less industrially developed State in the Country. A study of the work stoppages situation in the last 4 years would however indicate that though the industrials relations pattern in Maharashtra was not much different than what it was in the rest of the country, it was not so alarming as it is generally sought to be projected: -

From the above figures it would be seen that during the four years from 1978 to 1981 on an average 52 to 55 work stoppages have been reported each month affecting on an average 13 thousand to 17 thousand workers every month. In relation to the total no. of registered factories in the State, the percentage of factories affected each month during the last 4 years was less than 1/2 per cent. Likewise, in relation to the total employment in all the registered factories in the State, the percentage of the no. of workmen involved each month was not more than 1 1/2 per cent. The position in the first five months of the year 1982 is however a little different and this is mainly because of the strike in the 60 Cotton Textile Mills in Bombay. The above facts and figures clearly indicate that in an industrially advanced State like Maharashtra where both the employers and workers are well organised, the industrial relations situation has always been kept within reasonable limits. This does not however mean that there is no scope for further improvement. The present Government is quite aware of its responsibilities and taking all necessary steps to contain labour unrest within reasonable bounds. With a view to

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restoring confidence of working class in the legal machinery. Government is taking steps to curtail delays in the disposal of court cases, on the basis of the recommendations made by the Kantharia Committee. Government is also keen to see that all the labour laws are properly enforced and to achieve the said object it is also taking steps to strenghthen the existing enforcement machinery. All these steps are being taken by Government to ensure better industrial relations which are essential for obtaining maximum production necessary for economic development. However as is well known, industrial relations are basically human relations. Government has no doubt an important role to play in maintaining good industrial relation, but basically it is the labour and the management who are directly concerned with it. Government can only provide guidelines and it is the employers and the workmen who have much bigger role to play in developing healthy relations. As mentioned earlier the tendency to adopt strong arm methods and to take recourse to coercive force for getting the disputes resolved is still on the increase. This is a challenge to all right thinking people. All efforts must therefore be directed by all those who are concerned with industrial relations to effectively curb such destructive tendencies. It is high time now for the employers to realise that workers are one of the most important factors of production and that maintenance of healthy and cordial relations is not an easy task nor does it happen by accident. It is a continuous process and demands constant vigilance. The old concept that man by nature is lazy and demands more wages for less efforts has given place to the new concept that workers performance depends on his ability to adjust with the work assigned to him, with his co-workers and with the surroundings where he works. What boosts his morale and increases his productivity is the need for recognition of his personality, security of Jcb and creation of sense of belonging to the organisation. Thus the "man" in the "workman" needs to be taken proper care of. He is to be given a fair and just treatment. The conventional methods of management to put more emphasis on rule of thumb has lost its relevance in the modern philosophy of management. The employers and the business executives must realise that power means co-active power and not coercive power. Co-active power means "jointly developed ability to achieve the desired effect power develops with knowledge and experience and it grows stale when knowledge and experience diminishes. The management personnel are leaders of present day society. They must be persons who can energise groups with their knowledge and experience and who can educate and train their subordinates and should not be persons who can get their work done by coercion and force. Similarly workmen must also realise the importance of 'labour' in national economy. They must also understand that they have certain obligations towards society and nation. 'Labour' is a perishable commodity. Man-hours once lost can never be regained. Work is not an hazard. It is an essential past of mans' life. It is a work which gives the man a status and bounds him to Society. It is thus by realisation of each others rights and obligations and by re-establishing the moral values and by discarding commercial approach, one can expect to built better industrial relation in the current decade. This is a challenge and we must be prepared to face this

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# Labour Legislation

# THE BEEDI WORKERS WELFARE CESS (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1981

# No. 47 of 1981

(Dated 15th December 1981.)

An Act to amend the Beedi Workers Welfare Cess Act, 1976.

Be it enacted by Parliament in the Thirty-second Year of the Republic of India as follows

1. Short title and commencement. (1) This Act may be called the Beedj Workers Waltare Cess (Amoudment) Act, 1981.

(2) It shall come into force on such date as the Central Government by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint.

2. Amendment of long title.—In the Beedi Workers Wolfare Coss Act, 1976 (56 of 1976) (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act), in the long title, for the words "tobacco issued for the manufacture of beedi — the words "manufactured beedis." shall be substituted.

3. Amendment of section 2.—In section 2 of the principal Act, after clause (b), the following clause shall be *inserted*, namely

" (c) words and expressions used but not defined in this Act and defined in the Central Excise and Salt Act, 1944 (1 of 1944), shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them in that Act

4. Substitution of new section for section 3.—For section 3 of the principal Act, the following section shall be substituted, namely :

"3 Levy and collecting of cess on manufactured beedi.  $\langle 1 \rangle$  With effect from such date as the Central Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint there shall be lovied and collected by way of coss for the purposes of the Beedi Workers Welfare Fund Act, 1976 (62 of 1976), a duty of excise on manufactured beedis at such rate which shall not be less than ter paise or more than fifty paise per thousand manufactured beedis, as the Central Government may, from time to time, fix by notification in the Official Gazette.

(2) The duty of excise levied under sub-section (1) shall be in addition to any cess or duty leviable on manufactured beedis (whether spelt as such or as beedis or in any other manner) under any law for the time being in force".

5. Insertion of new section 3.A.—After section 3 of the principal Act, the allowing section shall be inserted, namely :--

" 3A. Application of Act 1 of 1944 to cess.—The provisions of the Central Excise and Salt Act, 1944 or the rules thereunder, including those relating to

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refunds and exemption from duty, as in force from time to time, so far as may be, apply in relation to the lavy, collection and refund of, or exemption from, cess under this Act, as they apply in relation to the levy, collection and refund of, or exemption from, duties of excise in respect of manufactured beed is under that Act, ".

6. Amendment of section 7.—In section 7 of the principal Act, in subsection (2), clause (a) shall be omitted.

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# Gist of Important Notifications Under Labour Laws

# I. BOMBAY RELIEF UNDERTAKINGS (SPECIAL PROVISIONS) ACT, 1958

Declaration of relief undertaking under the  $A_{ct}$ .—(a) In exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act, the Government of Maharashrra has declared that the industrial undertakings called the Rajan (Textile) Mills Pvt. Ltd., Barahi (District Sholapur) to be relief undertaking shall for a further period of two months commencing on the first day of December 1981 and ending on 30th day of January 1982 (both days inclusive), to be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief, subject to fulfilling the conditions specified in the notification.

(Notification No. BRU-1081(7986)/IND-10, dated 30th November 1981, published in M. G. G., Part I-L, dated 7th January 1982, p. 106).

(b) The Government of Maharashtra, in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act declared that the industrial undertaking called the Bradbury Mills Ltd., Bombay to be relief undertaking shall for a further period of two months commencing on the 8th day of December 1981 and ending on the 7th day of February 1982 (both days inclusive) to be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief, subject to the conditions specified in the Notification.

(Notification No. BRU-1181/129845(8025)/IND-10, dated 7th December 1981, published in M. G. G., Part I-L, dated 7th January 1982, p. 110).

(c) Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the Act has declared the industrial undertaking called the W. G. Forge and Allied Industries Ltd., Bombay having its units at Thane and Kudal to be relief undertaking, shall for further period of one year commencing on 28th day of December 1981 and ending on 27th day of December 1982 (both days inclusive) to be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief subject to the conditions specified in the Notification.

Notification No. BRU-1081/(8048)/IND-10, dated 23rd December 1981, published in M. G. G., Part I-L, dated 28th January 1982, p. 446).

(d) Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 3 and 4 of the said Act, declared the industrial undertaking called Messrs. Kulkarni Foundries Limited, Pune, shall further period of one year commencing on the 29th day of December 1981 and ending on the 28th day of December 1982 (both days inclusive) to be conducted to serve as a measure of unemployment relief subject to the conditions specified in the Notifications.

(Notification No. BRU-1081/(8041)/IND-10, dated 28th December 1981, published in M. G. G., Part I-L, dated 28th January 1982, p. 448).

### IL BOMBAY INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS ACT, 1948.

Application of the Act to the Sugar Industry in Vidarbha region.—(a) The Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (4) of section 2 of the Act, shall, with effect from 1st January 1982 directed that all the provisions of the said Act apply to the following industry in all the local areas in the Vidarbha region of the State of Maharahtra watch are declared under clause (23) of section 3 of the said Act to be local areas by the Governmeni of Maharashtra in part I of the Government Notification, Industries and Labour Department, No. BIR-1065-(III)-LAB-1, dated the 2nd May 1965, namely

### The manufacture of sugar and its by-products including,-

(1) the growing of sugarcane on farms belonging to or attached to establishments engaged in the said manufacture or on farms, which immediately before the date on which the land comprised in such farms are taken possession of and vest in the State Government under section 21 of the Maharashtra Agricultural Lands (Ceiling on Holdings) Act, 1961 (Mah. XXVII of 1951), belonged to or were attached to such establishments, and which from the date are run or managed by a Corporation (including a company) owned or controlled by the State Government under that Act;

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(ii) all agricultural and industrial operations connected with the said manufacture or with the growing of sugarcane on the said farms ; and

(iii) all distilleries and breweries which are run by establishments engaged in the manufacture of sugar and its by-products, and forming an integral part of such establishment.

*Explanation.*—All sevices of employments connected with the conduct of the sugar industry shall be deemed to be a part of the industry, which engaged in or by an employer engaged in that industry.

### III. FACTORIES ACT, 1948.

Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by the proviso to subsection (i) of section 66 of the Act, in respect of the Ginning and Pressing Factories in the State of Maharashtra varies the limit laid down in clause (b) of the said sub-section (i), so that no women shall be employed in any factory except between the hours in any factory of 5-00 a.m. and 10-00 p.m. during the period from 1st July, 1981 to 30th June 1982.

(Notification No. FAC-1681/8229/Lab.4, dated 2nd November 1981, published in M. G. G., Part I-L, dated 28th January 1982, p. 399).

### IV. INDIAN BOILER ACT, 1923.

Exemption of boilers under the Act.—(a) Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (2) of section 34 of the Act has exempted the boiler bearing Nos. MR-9906 and MR-9907 belonging to the Rashtriya Chemicals and Fertilisers Ltd., Chembur, Bombay 400 074 from the operation of clause (c) of section 6 of the said Act, for the period of six months i.e. from 13th November 1981 to 12th May 1982 (both days inclusive.).

(Notification No. IBA-1081/CR-6052/Lab.-5, dated 7th November 1981, published in *M. G. G.*, Part I-L, dated 28th January 1982, p. 399).

### V. INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES ACT, 1947.

The Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by section 38 of the Act, and all other powers enabling it in that behalf is hereby Published as required by subsection (1) of the said section 38 for the information of all the persons likely to be affected thereby and notice is hereby given that the said draft will be taken into consideration after the expiry of one month from the date of publication of this notification.

### Draft Rules

1. These rules may be called the Industrial Disputes (Bombay) (Amendment) Rules, 1982.

2. In the Industrial Disputes (Bombay) Rules, 1957 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal rules "), for rule 82B the following shall be substituted, namely :---

"82B. Application for permission for closure.—(1) Application under sub-section (1) of section 25-0 regarding intended closure of an undertaking shall be in English and shall be submitted in Form XXIV-C, in triplicate, to the State Government either personally or by Registered Post Acknowledgement Duc.

(2) A copy of the application, alongwith its version in the regional language and in the language understood by the majority of the work men employed in the undertaking proposed to be closed down, shall be displayed conspicuously on the Notice Board at the main entrance or entrances in the Time-Keepers' Office and in the Manager's Office of the undertaking and it shall not be removed from the Notice Board before the expiry of minimum fifteen days.

(3) A copy of the application shall simultaneously be served either personally or by Registered Post Acknowledgement Due on the President or the Secretary or Secretaries of the Trade Union or Unions of workmen employed in the undertaking, wherever such union exists or unions exist.

(4) The employer concerned shall furnish to the State Government within a reasonable time such further information as the State Government may consider necessary and call for, for arriving at a decision on the application within a period of sixty days, as required by sub-section (3) of section 25-0.".

3. In Form XXIV-B appended to the principal rules -

(a) for the words and figures "Industries and Labour Department, Sachivalaya, Bombay 400 032", the following shall be substituted, namely :—

Industries, Energy and Labour Department, Mantralaya, Bombay 400 032.".

"4. The Industries Commissioner, Mantralaya, Bombay.

5. The Joint Director of Industries, Nagpur/Aurangabad/Konkan, Bombay/Pune Nashik, Pune (as may be applicable).".

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(a) in the title, for the words "notice for permission of closure to be given ", the words "application for permission of closure to be made " shall be substituted.

(b) for the word "Sachivalaya" the word "Mantralaya" shall be substituted ;

(c) in paragraph 4, for the word, brackets and figures "sub-section (7)" the word, brackets and figure "sub-section (9)" shall be substituted;

(d) after the Annexure, the following endorsements shall be added at the end, namely -

### Copy to :--

(1) The Commissioner of Labour, Maharashtra, Bombay,

(2) The Additional Commissioner of Labour, Pune/The Deputy Commissioner of Labour, Nagpur, The Deputy Commissioner of Labour, Aurangabad (as may be applicable).

(3) The Industries Commissioner, Maharashtra, Bombay.

(4) The Joint Director of Industries, Nagpur/Aurangabad/Konkan, Bombay/Pune-Nashik, Pune (as may be applicable).".

5. Form XXIV-D appended to the principal rules shall be deleted.

### VI. MINIMUM WAGES ACT, 1948.

Government of Maharashtra in exercise of the powers conferred by section 27 of the Act has intended to give notice to add to part I of the Schedule to the said Act, with effect from the 15th March 1932, the following employment and fixed minimum rates of wages under the said Act, viz

"Employment in manufacture of eatable tobacco (not being an employment falling under entry 3 in Part I of the Schedule)".

# Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for January 1982

# **BOMBAY**\*

# 468—A fall of 1 point

In January 1982, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Bombay Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 468 being 1 point lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Bombay Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 2 points to 516 due to a fall in the average prices of dry chillies, onion, vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari tobacco etc. group increased by 7 points to 484 due to a rise in the average prices of pan leaf, supari and katha.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 11 points to 569 due to a rise in the average prices of fire wood, electricity charges and charcoal.

Six monthly house rent survey ending December 1981 was conducted by the N. S. S. O. and index was complied by Labour Commissioner's Office on the basis of the data. The house rent index remained steady at 159.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group remained steady at 472.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 1 points to 369 due to a rise in the average prices of hair oil, tooth powder and ex. book.

### NANDED

#### 536-A rise of 5 points

In January, 1982 the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for Nanded Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was being 5 points higher than that in the preceding month. The Index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Nanded Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 6 points to 595 due to a rise in the average prices of turdal, moongdal, groundnut oil, fresh fish gur and other vegetables.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained steady at 637.

Six monthly house rent index compiled by chain method on the basis of the house rent survey conducted by office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. The housing index number increased by 11 points to 285.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group remained steady at 468.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 7 points to 396 due to a rise in the average prices of pan leaf and S. T. fare.
